GOLD HILL-SAMS VALLEY Polio Shots Due Monday

Gold Hill—The third in the series of anti-polio shots will be administered in Gold Hill and Sams Valley school Monday morning, Nov. 18.

Gilbert Mack, principal of the Patrick and Hanby schools in Gold Hill has reported that shots will be given at 9 a.m. Monday, Nov. 18 at the Hanby school. Parents are requested to have pre-school children in the hall of the middle floor in the Hanby building not later than 9 a.m. Pre-school children must be accompanied by a parent and school children must have a signed slip from their parents. Only the third shots will be given.

Dr. Erin Merkel, county health officer, will administer the inoculations and will be assisted by Miss Elizabeth McGalliard.

Dr. Erin Merkel and Miss Elizabeth McGalliard will go from the Gold Hill school to Sams Valley school where they will give shots beginning at 10:15 a.m. on Monday, Nov. 18, according to William Brewster, principal of the Sams Valley school.

He has requested parents to accompany their pre-school youngsters to the Sams Valley school auditorium not later than 10 a.m.

School children must have a signed slip from a parent. Only third shots will be given.

Work Completed on Installation of Hornbrook Pipeline

Hornbrook—Work was completed last week on installation of 2,400 feet of new water line for the Hornbrook Water Co.

The new section is a feeder line from the reservoir near new Highway 99, connecting with the town line approximately 300 feet below old Highway 99. It is of 4 inch "Spi-weld" steel pipe and replaces the redwood pipe which has been in continuous operation for 53 years, ever since the water company was incorporated in 1904.

One of the first customers of the company was the Southern Pacific railroad and, with the exception of a short period of time, have continued to be user from then to the present. The original company was composed of the late David Horn, David Earhart, Jim Coyle, Sam Smith and Myron Burkhalter, who laid the pipeline from Rancheria creek, the source of supply, to the reservoir and thence to the town.

Move Away
All but Horn and Earhart moved away, leaving these two men in control of the company. In 1918, Horn's son, Marshall, bought out the David Horn company interest, and in 1930 Marshall Horn sold his interest to Davis Earhart. Upon the death of Earhart his heirs sold the company in 1913 to Harry Chapman, who installed meters shortly thereafter, and has owned and maintained the line continuously since then.

The recently completed improvements eliminates all of the redwood pipe, and makes the entire system of steel construction. About three years ago the first section of steel line was laid, extending from Cottonwood creek bridge up the hill to the end of the present installation. Then two years ago, the section crossing Cottonwood creek was replaced because it was torn out by floods Dec. 21, 1955. It is expected that the new line will provide improved pressure, and uninterrupted service to users.

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River Waters Cover New Fish Screen

Grants Pass—Waters of the Rogue river covered the new fish screen structure on the north side of the Savage Rapids dam Wednesday evening, according to Joe Nesbitt, job superintendent.

Nesbitt said only concrete forms were swept away by the water which reached a depth of about two feet over the top of the dam for a total water depth at the dam of 9.55 feet.

About one week's work remains to be completed on the dam, according to Nesbitt. Little damage was done to the dam by the water, he added.

Twenty feet of concrete has been completed on the base of the turbine intakes and forms are in place to complete pouring to a level with the top of the dam, he said. He added that slow shipment of reinforcing steel has put the project several days behind schedule.

On Tuesday morning crews begin moving all construction equipment from the area protected by the earthen cofferdam, Nesbitt said. All equipment was out of the area when waters poured over the dam, he said.

Airport Approved in Nehalem State Park

Salem — The spending of \$37,000 for an airport in the Nehalem bay state park being developed in the Nehalem-Manzanita area was authorized Thursday by the State Board of Aeronautics.

It will mark the first time state park land has been used for such a purpose. The airport will feature a 2400-foot landing strip. Funds will be raised by a
