

Monaco More Concerned Over Observing Anniversary Than Problems of World

Monte Carlo — (U) — The rest of the world may worry today about Sputniks and disarmament, but not Monaco. This tiny fairy tale principality was more concerned with celebrating the eighth anniversary of Prince Rainier's rule.

Rainier and Princess Grace, the former Grace Kelly of Philadelphia and the Hollywood movie, formally opened the festivities Monday night to mark his accession to the throne of the Grimaldis eight years ago.

The great "fete nationale" started with a grand reception in the palace and dancing in the streets. I represented the world press in the palace.

Whatever the outside world may have been concerned with, it didn't bother Monaco. The Central Park-sized country was bathed in light, and 3,000 Monegasques took in with zest the fireworks, free movies and free meals offered in accordance with long-standing tradition.

Monaco's red and white flags and the Stars and Stripes of the United States have

been fluttering in the wind side by side since this toyland by the Mediterranean launched its series of festivities.

The people are happy and the American girl turned princess is playing her role as sovereign to the hilt. Monday night she sparkled. The ceremony in the palace offered something Hollywood would take a long time to master.

The soldiers of Monaco's tiny army were standing rigidly at attention outside the floodlit palace, inside its great courtyard, alongside its winding marble staircase, and along the covered passageway leading to the official palace rooms as the stage was set.

Major-domos, their chests filled with medals, beckoned the guests through the entrance to the rooms filled with music emanating from a string orchestra hidden on a balcony.

Some 100 guests were arranged in groups for the presentation.

To the music of Chopin's "Polonaise," Princess Grace appeared at the side of her handsome husband and started her rounds of the red throne room.

Medford Couple Donates \$1 1/2 Million to Harvard

Boston, Mass. — (Special) — A gift of \$1,500,000 from Mr. and Mrs. Alfred S. V. Carpenter of Medford, Ore., will provide a center for the visual arts in Harvard college.

The gift was announced last night by Alexander M. White, general chairman of a program for Harvard college, at a special gifts dinner for Greater Boston alumni at the Statler and Somerset hotels.

The Carpenters' gift brings to \$22,000,000 contributions already made toward an \$82,500,000 fund to strengthen undergraduate education at Harvard. It is one of the largest gifts made since a program for Harvard college was announced last winter.

"Lively Activity"

The new visual arts center will make practice of the visual arts—drawing, painting, sculpture, shopwork and scenic design—a lively activity for Harvard undergraduates.

It will provide workshops for students who wish to work in traditional media of art, and in photography, wood, stone, metal and ceramics. It will house the design workshop, where college students of architectural science practice under the guidance of

an artist. It also will furnish studios for visiting artists, whose work will provide a stimulus to student creative activity.

Harvard President Nathan M. Pusey, in commenting on the gift, said, "Now the visual arts will have an opportunity to win their proper place, along with music, drama and athletic sports, in the life of Harvard undergraduates. We are tremendously grateful to Mr. and Mrs. Carpenter for their wonderful gift. It will assure for this lively area

Five Persons Die In Oregon Monday; One Killed Today

Five persons were killed in Oregon traffic accidents Monday bringing the state's fatality list to 13 in automobile mishaps since last Friday night.

A two-car collision on Highway 101 south of Reedsport claimed two lives. The victims were Floyd L. Spence, Scottsburg, and William Jenkins, Sweet Home.

James C. Haney, Mill City, was killed when his logging truck left the Breitenbush Springs road near Detroit and struck a tree.

Martin G. Steeves, 8, Portland, was struck by a car and killed Monday night. Fred W. Frederick, 70, Gresham, also was killed when struck by a car.

Eight Deaths

Oregon had eight traffic deaths during the week end.

In another accident in Portland Monday night, Leroy S. Altig, 37, was dead on arrival at a hospital after his car crashed into a power pole and knocked out power in a large part of southwest Portland for about an hour. Police said Altig apparently suffered a heart attack.

Lebanon, Ore. — One man was killed and Glen Huston, Linn county coroner, was injured critically today when the car in which they were riding overturned.

Killed was Otto M. Stevenson, about 63, former city councilman and local fuel dealer here.

State police said they were hauling a horse trailer en route to a two-day meeting in Corvallis when the accident occurred. Huston was brought to a local hospital and was reported in surgery.

DeMarrs' Tax Case To Remain Open

Municipal Judge Noreen Kelly said this morning that the case of Ray DeMarrs, Medford barber found guilty Monday of operating a business without a license, will remain open until Wednesday morning's court session.

Yesterday, under protest, he paid his \$13.50 business license fee in lieu of a fine in the same amount, but also asked the court to consider additional facts which he said he has. Judge Kelly granted him the right to present them Wednesday.

Wednesday's hearing could have a bearing on two other similar cases, which had been held in abeyance pending determination of the DeMarrs test case.

They are Richard Schafer of the Schafer Electric shop and M. J. Olsen, of the Tic-Tok Time shop, both of whom faced similar charges, and both of whom yesterday paid their license fees under protest. They were not fined, as was stated incorrectly in yesterday's Mail Tribune, because their cases had not been in for final hearing.

Florence, Ore. — Robert C. Stetcher, Vancouver, Wash., was found safe early today after being lost since early Monday while picking mushrooms near here.

Goal Gets Nearer For United Crusade, Chairman Reports

Approximately 88 per cent of this year's United Medford Crusade goal has been collected. Crusade officials announced today that \$108,000 had been raised as of yesterday.

Bob Johnson, campaign chairman, said that this figure is \$5,000 more than the comparable figure last year.

The outstanding section in the campaign this week was that of the loggers. The logging section reported \$1700 raised on a \$1,000 goal, or 70 per cent over the section goal.

Special mention was given Mrs. Ray Reter, Mrs. Joe Hearin and Mrs. Eugene DeVoe for their efforts in the home crusade.

In comparison to state-wide figures, Medford ranks 12th in percentage of goal accomplishment. Three United Fund campaigns in the state have been successful. All started in early August. The Medford campaign is the only one in the state that has been successful for four continuous years. If this year's goal is realized, it will establish a state-wide record.

Dave Irving, assistant general chairman, said, "We're going to make our goal, but we need to go through with a fine tooth comb and clear up the remaining pledges." Johnson also expressed sincere belief that the goal would be reached but cautioned, "We cannot exert too much effort in this last phase of the campaign. We still must realize we are some distance from our goal and need the final efforts of all our workers."

Passenger Train Jumps Track; Two Dead, Eight Hurt

Warehouse Hit by Speeding Locomotive

Medford, Mass. — (U) — The Montreal to Boston passenger train Red Wing jumped the tracks on an overpass today and one of the cars catapulted into a five-story brick warehouse. The locomotive toppled to the street, brushing one moving automobile and barely missing a second.

The engineer and firemen were killed. Eight other persons were injured and scores were shaken up. The Boston and Maine Railroad combination passenger-freight was carrying about 350 passengers.

The wreck occurred during a drizzle on a curving detour section of track. Repair work was under way on the main track.

Railroad Statement

The railroad said in a statement that "preliminary inquiry at the scene of the accident indicates that there was no equipment defect, but that the train was going at excessive speed in a restricted speed area."

Dead were engineer Harold J. Danford, Somerville, Mass., and the fireman, James Murphy, Nashua, N.H., who was trapped in the cab of the locomotive, which toppled 11 feet to the street.

The seven-car train was traveling over a side track when it became derailed and tore into the Converse Rubber company warehouse in which 100 persons were working. The two-section locomotive tore a 15-foot gash in one corner of the building and fell to the street.

Engine Spills

The engine spilled on one side of the bridge embankment and the power car on the other. The power car landed upright against a singletory cinder block building, battering it in its roof.

The trestle itself was threatened with collapse. Steel girders supporting it were weakened in the impact and police cleared everyone off the bridge.

Only four cars remained upright on the tracks.

The wreck occurred within 50 yards of St. Clement's Parochial school and convent, minutes before school was to open, and about 200 yards from the Tufts College railroad station.

Ambulances were summoned from eight surrounding communities. About 3,000 bystanders flocked to the scene.

Remodeling Shifts In City Offices

Remodeling of the city hall second floor offices today moved into the area where offices of the city attorney and public works director were, according to officials.

The offices, when completed, will house the city building department and Gil Gutjahr, administrative assistant. The offices will be enlarged and a counter will be built onto the office of the building department.

Public Works Director Vernon Thorpe and City Attorney E. R. Bashaw moved into offices at the rear of the building today. The city engineering department formerly was located where the new offices are. The engineering department will move into new quarters in the area of the building where the city building department and city engineer office was located.

Officials said the reason for slow progress in remodeling was because the contractors are forced to complete one section of the building at a time in order not to interrupt the carrying on of city business.

Girard Receives Suspended Sentence

Tokyo — (U) — Many Japanese reacted angrily today to the suspended sentence given to U.S. Army S3C William S. Girard who shot and killed a Japanese woman last spring on what a Japanese judge called a "childish whim."

A three-man Japanese court today sentenced the Ottawa, Ill., soldier to three years at hard labor on the manslaughter conviction, but sentence was suspended for four years on good behavior. Girard walked out of court a free man.

Today's sentence will not become final under Japanese law until 14 days have passed. During that time both prosecution and defense attorneys can file an appeal. Indications were both sides have had enough and the conviction will stand.

Snowstorm Stalls Midwest Traffic

A road-choking snowstorm stalled highway travel in much of the Midwest today, and severe thunderstorms lashed the South in the wake of damaging tornadoes.

At least 20 persons have been killed in a series of violent storms since the week end. Ten persons were killed Monday by tornadoes, lightning, floods and snow, five more died in tornadoes Sunday and week end snows in the West claimed another five lives.

A near blizzard which howled into the Midwest Monday dumped an average of 8 to 11 inches of snow across Iowa, southern Minnesota, northwestern Wisconsin and upper Michigan.

Wind gusts of nearly 50 miles per hour piled the snow into deep drifts and cut visibility to near zero during the night.

The weather bureau reported travel in the snow area "is almost impossible." Highway authorities in the four states considered, calling snow plows off the roads in some sections because they were in danger of being stalled and buried by snow.

The clash of warm and cold air in the south touched off twisters Monday in Alabama, Kentucky, Tennessee and Mississippi. Drenching rains sent streams and rivers over their banks in sections of Missouri, Arkansas, Tennessee and Kentucky.

National Guardsmen helped evacuate 60 to 75 families at Spring City, Tenn., when Piney creek flooded the residential section. Floodwaters also forced a number of families to flee at Dayton and Morgantown, Tenn.
