This is a story of perseverance, which sometimes pays.

In the field of letters, the man who writes fiction or poetry or essays has to know the agony of rebuff and the sting of criticism and rejection, and still be able to surmount these obstacles before success arrives.

Encouragement of creative writing in the VA is furnished by a volunteer group of patrons under the name of the Hospitalized Veterans Writing Project. Quarterly and annual contests are held. More and more, the veterans are struggling for recognition through this agency of encouragement.

There is a veteran at Camp White who has received honorable mention on several occasions. He has persisted and has studied and read the works of authors with appreciation of the fine points involved in gaining the laurel of success.

This veteran has attended regularly the Readers and Writers club of Camp White under the supervision of the librarian Enid Holmes. His comments of prose and poetry are always pertinent and well expressed, for there was a time when he could sum up a case in court to command similar attention.

But writing was always more difficult for him to master. He tried a new method. He got himself a bicycle and pedaled around the station for exercise. It also gave him an opportunity to collect his thoughts. He then wrote a poem and sent it in for the Writers' Project award.

It won the first prize in the poetry division. Just for good measure, he sent in a feature article. It won second prize money.

Manager E. K. Ricker Friday presented a \$15 check for poetry and a \$10 check for feature writing to Walter L. Townsend, at a special award meeting in the theatre.

Another first award to a veteran was given recognition at the same time. Manager Ricker presented a certificate to Elzy D. Bates for winning a cash prize for a constructive suggestion for handling and storing pots and pans in the kitchen.

Bates is the first member employee to be included in the awards of cash to employees for their suggestions for improving the service. A recent ruling extends this cash provision to all VA member employees.

Assistant Manager H. Jaffrey, Special Services Chief Frank Glonning, Enid Holmes, librarian, and Gladys McCracken, chief dietitian, were present for the occasion.

A display of equipment used at the VA Domiciliary infirmary for moving bed patients, handled by a medical attendant from the station, featured the safety exhibit from Camp White at the National Guard armory Saturday.

The domiciliary booth was one of 60 demonstrating the theme of safety arranged by the Medford Safety Council for the Southern Oregon Safety Fair. Assistant Engineering Officer George Hargrove, in charge of the exhibit, emphasized the cost of accidents through a series of posters and charts.

Quigg Wishes Others Wouldn't Try to Solve New York Problems

New York — Oh, leave us alone, will you? Let us work out our own problems. We New Yorkers are just like anybody else, except maybe a mite more stubborn—and jumpy at times.

We know we're backward, but we're trying. We need encouragement, not horselaughs, from the rest of the country.

A man from down south has sent this department a cheery little message, as follows:

"What happens when a city gets too complex, too overgrown, too mixed up? I'm thinking of New York."

'You Poor Fellows'

"Seems to me every time I pick up a paper I see that the subway is out of commission up there, the water mains have broken, the lights have gone out, the steam pipes are leaking, the Long Island trains are stopped, traffic is jammed up, there's no place to park, or the mail is late. You poor fellows."

Uh-huh. He forgets a couple. The National League has absconded to the West Coast—and the poor pedestrian is being told, gently but firmly, that he no longer is a free soul wandering in the asphalt wilderness.

For the moment, we're concentrating on reforming the pedestrians. And they're resisting strenuously. This week, the city began a long-heralded campaign against jaywalking. The idea is to try to educate New Yorkers against their impulse to walk out and get themselves killed.

To get an unbiased idea of how the campaign was working out

for the first couple of days, we turned to Robert Vermillion, a businessman from the Orient who got into town on a visit as the anti-jaywalk campaign started.

"It's amazing," he said. "You have these big red blinking signs at the corners blaring with a 'don't walk' warning, and people just walk right out against them and dodge through traffic. At times there seem to be more people in the streets than there are on the sidewalks."

Taxi Driver Pitches In

"I came across the town in a taxi, and the driver seemed to be trying to do his part in the campaign. He would lean out the window and holler at scurrying pedestrians, 'keep working at it—you'll be an angel yet.'"

Asked whether Orientals were as backward as New Yorkers in the matter of jaywalking, he said he believed not.

"Take Tokyo," he said. "There less jaywalking there than in New York—probably because of the risk involved. The driving tends to be headlong. The walker learns that to survive he has to behave. The auto has the right of way. The driver has
