

Several Local Firms Bid Successfully On Timber Tracts

Carroll E. Brown, forest supervisor, of the Rogue River National Forests has announced several sales of timber tracts during the past few weeks.

Four sales were made on Nov. 13, four sales on Nov. 19, two sales on Nov. 15, one sale on Nov. 8 and one sale on Nov. 12. About 600,000 board feet of timber, mostly Douglas fir, in the Kitter Creek road area near Union Creek was sold on Nov. 10 to A and H Logging company, Medford. The timber was appraised at \$16,250 and was sold at \$35,740. These figures include deposits for sale area betterment and for slash disposal.

McGraw Brothers of Medford was awarded the contract on Nov. 19 for about 980,000 board feet of timber, mostly fir, with some pine and white fir, located about five miles above Prospect in the Union Creek district. The sale amounted to \$38,950 while the forest service appraised the timber at \$23,099, including deposits.

Eagle Point Firm Bids

A tract of timber north of Prospect, about 150,000 board feet of Douglas fir, was successfully bid by the R. L. Atkin company, Eagle Point. Forest service appraised the timber at \$3,865.50 including deposits and it was sold at \$6,597 at the Nov. 19 bidding.

A tract of timber containing 24,800,000 board feet of timber of which 18,700,000 board feet of Douglas fir, 2,800,000 board feet of pine and 3,300,000 board feet of white fir was sold at a sale on Nov. 8. The tract, which is located near Flat creek in the Union Creek district, was sold to Southern Oregon Plywoods company, Grants Pass, for \$607,253. The timber was appraised by the forest officials at \$521,233. Several miles of logging roads must be constructed by the company, according to the sale requirements.

About 1,500,000 board feet, mostly of Douglas fir, was sold to the Steve Wilson company, Camp White, for \$64,886. The tract is located above the Union Creek ranger station. The timber was appraised at \$35,714 before the Nov. 19 sale.

The C. M. and D. logging company, Medford, was the successful bidder at a tract sale held on Nov. 13 for 300,000 board feet of timber, mostly Douglas fir, on a tract located north of Prospect. Sale of the timber was listed at \$8,900 while the appraised value was listed at \$6,951.

A sale on Nov. 13 saw James P. Vanderlip, Shady Cove, the successful bidder for a tract of timber located in the Union Creek district. The tract, about 70,000 board feet of Douglas fir and 30,000 board feet of pine, sold for \$4,375, compared to the appraisal of \$2,302.50.

Sold to Russell Logging

Sold for \$10,544 to the Lyle Russell Logging company of Central Point, was a 480,000 board feet of Douglas fir tract at a Nov. 12 sale. The timber is located in the Camp No. 2 area of the Butte Falls district and was appraised at \$9,453.

Neuberger Speaks At Izaak League

Portland — Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) told a luncheon meeting of the Izaak Walton League today that "the quest for power and flood control must be concentrated in the 'fishless' reaches of the Columbia above Grand Coulee for the present, while fish experts are working on problems of maintaining migratory salmon and steelhead runs on the Clearwater and Salmon rivers."

Neuberger said the sites on the Columbia above the Canadian border had a potential of 13 million acre feet of flood and power storage, while the Pend Oreille and Kootenai rivers on the American side offered reservoirs for another nine-million acre feet.

"Plans for future development of the Columbia should have as a primary precept the building of those dams first which will have the least adverse effect on fish, wildlife, scenic and recreational values," he added. This means concentration on development at Canadian and other upstream locations, the senator said.

No Action Reported On Subdivision Law

No action on the city subdivision ordinance was taken at last night's city council meeting.

A joint, informal meeting of the council and the city planning commission was held on Oct. 30 at which several minor changes and recommendations were made. The planning commission has recommended adoption of the ordinance with the changes to the city council.

The revised ordinance will be submitted to the council for consideration at the city council's Dec. 5 meeting, according to M. T. Wray, president of the Medford planning commission.

der on a 285,000 board feet of Douglas fir tract located about seven miles north of Prospect in the Union Creek district. The sale price was \$11,975 while the appraised value was listed at \$7,499 at the Nov. 13 sale.

More than 2,700,000 board feet of ponderosa pine in the three-mile creek area of Klamath county was sold to the Simpson-DeVoe Lumber company, Chilopine, for \$67,380. Appraised value of the timber was \$67,243. The Nov. 13 sale requires the company to build about one mile of logging road.

Another Nov. 13 sale saw the McGraw Brothers, Medford, awarded the bid for about 785,000 board feet of timber about four miles above Prospect in the Union Creek district. The sale price was \$32,073.75 while appraised value was placed at \$18,215.75.

A timber sale on Nov. 13 was held for about 300,000 board feet of Douglas fir located north of Prospect. Successful bidder for the tract was Arnold Ragsdale, Trail. Sale price for the tract was \$9,481 while appraised value was placed at \$6,951.

All sales were by oral bidding, according to Brown.

Rules Given People Who Will Testify on Water Resources

Don Lane, secretary of the state water resource board, today announced several rules for area residents who wish to present information at the hearing scheduled for the Jackson county court house on Dec. 11 at 9 a.m.

All persons who desire to submit statements should register with the board secretary at the meeting, speakers should state their name, address and organization or agency they represent, members of the board would like the opportunity of questioning speakers upon the conclusion of their presentations, lengthy written statements should be summarized orally for the purpose of conserving time and if two or more persons are going to present the same information, efforts should be made to consolidate oral presentations.

Other board requirements are that signed statements may be presented without oral testimony at the hearing or filed at the board's office within 10 days after conclusion of the hearing. Speakers are to confine remarks to 10 minutes unless advance notice is given to the board secretary, all questions from the floor should be directed to the hearing officer and supplemental statements may be filed with the board in writing within 10 days after the hearing.

Presentations will be grouped according to subject matter. Order of presentations will be domestic, municipal, irrigation, power development, industrial, mining, recreation, wildlife, fish life uses and pollution abatement. Groups for flood control, drainage and reclamation will be heard following the groups for beneficial uses.

Purpose of the hearing is to help the board assemble a program for use and control of the water resources in the Rogue River basin. The board will also use the information gathered at the hearing to arrive at methods conserving and augmenting water resources and to determine existing and future needs of the water for all beneficial purposes, according to Lane.

Bar Asks Action Against Attorney

Portland — The Board of Governors of the Oregon State Bar today recommended disciplinary action against Portland Attorney John P. Hannon, who successfully defended Sherry Fong in her fourth trial for murder.

The action became known when the board's decision and recommendation was filed in Salem with the clerk of the State Supreme Court. The Bar did not elaborate on its charge of misconduct against the Portland attorney.

Hannon was attorney for Mrs. Fong, who won acquittal last week of charges she murdered 16-year-old Diane Hank. It was Mrs. Fong's fourth trial for murder growing out of the death of the Portland high school girl. Hannon also represented Sherry's husband, Wey Him Fong, in an earlier trial in which he was also acquitted.

Hannon also was attorney for George Sack who was convicted of the first degree murder of his wife. Of the Bar's recommendation against him, Hannon said, "It's a matter of jealousy and envy of my ability on the part of the bar committee. I'm not disbarred. There is only a recommendation and the Supreme Court has yet to act."

In other actions today the bar: —Found Attorney Duane Clay Morrow of Albany guilty of misconduct and recommended a three-year suspension.

—Cleared Ernest Lundeen, Eugene attorney, of misconduct charges and recommended that the complaint against him be dismissed.

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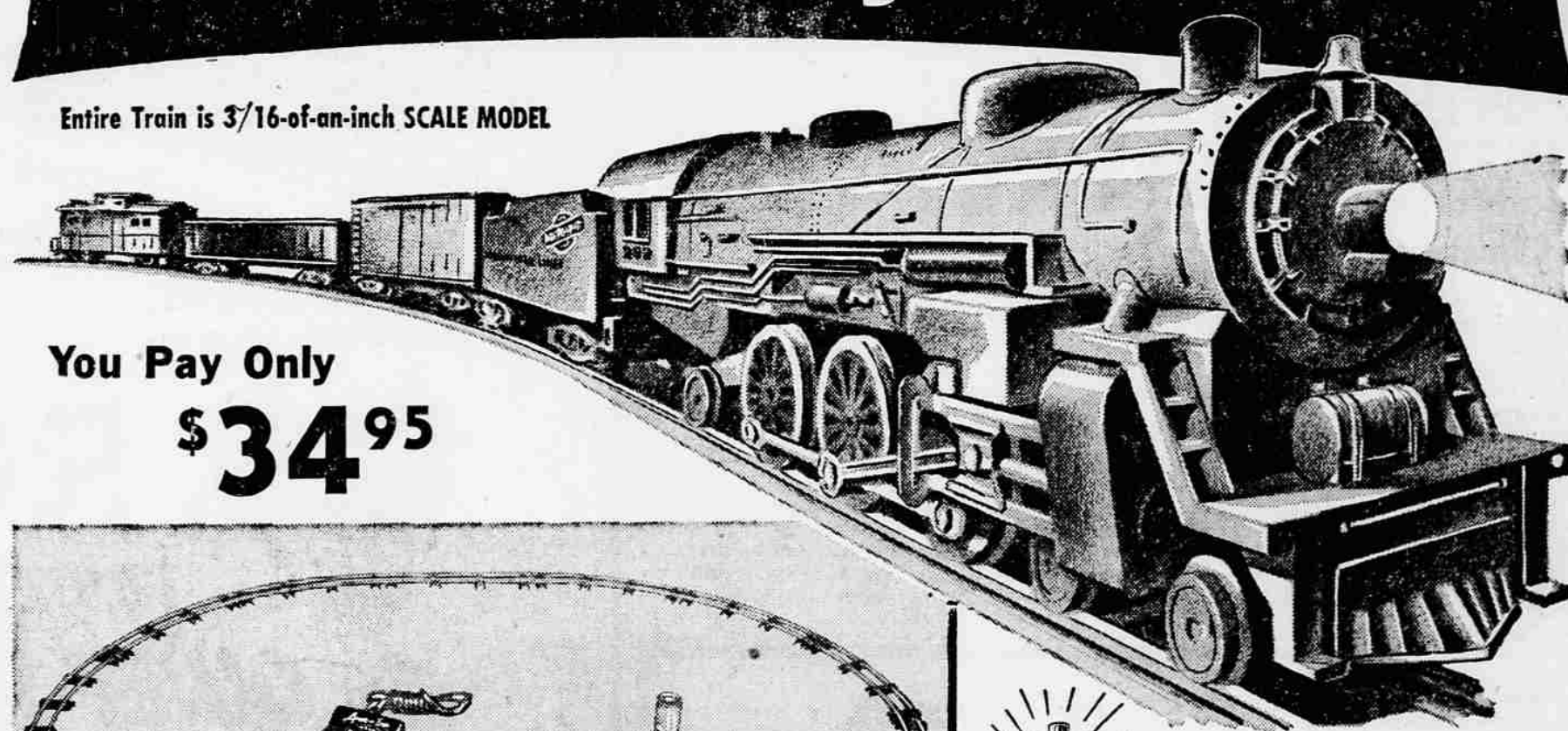
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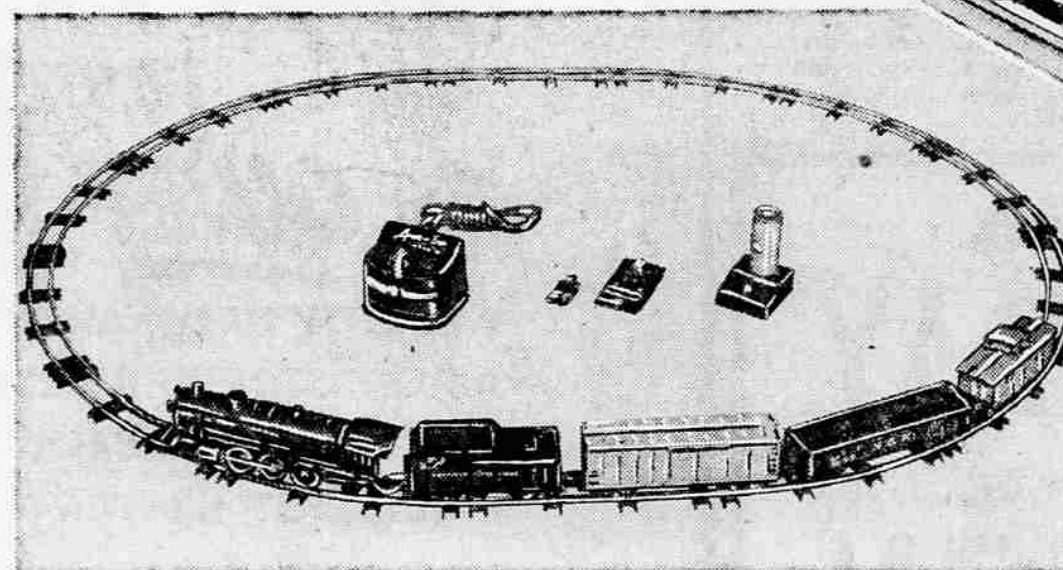
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
