Bright is a senior at the Salem university and is majoring in speech.

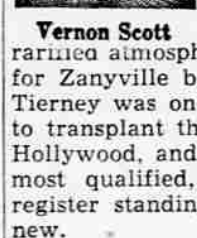
Geneva, New York, telephoned, so in place of the usual family reunion, the Bell family participated in a conversation type of reunion over the telephone with the New York relatives.

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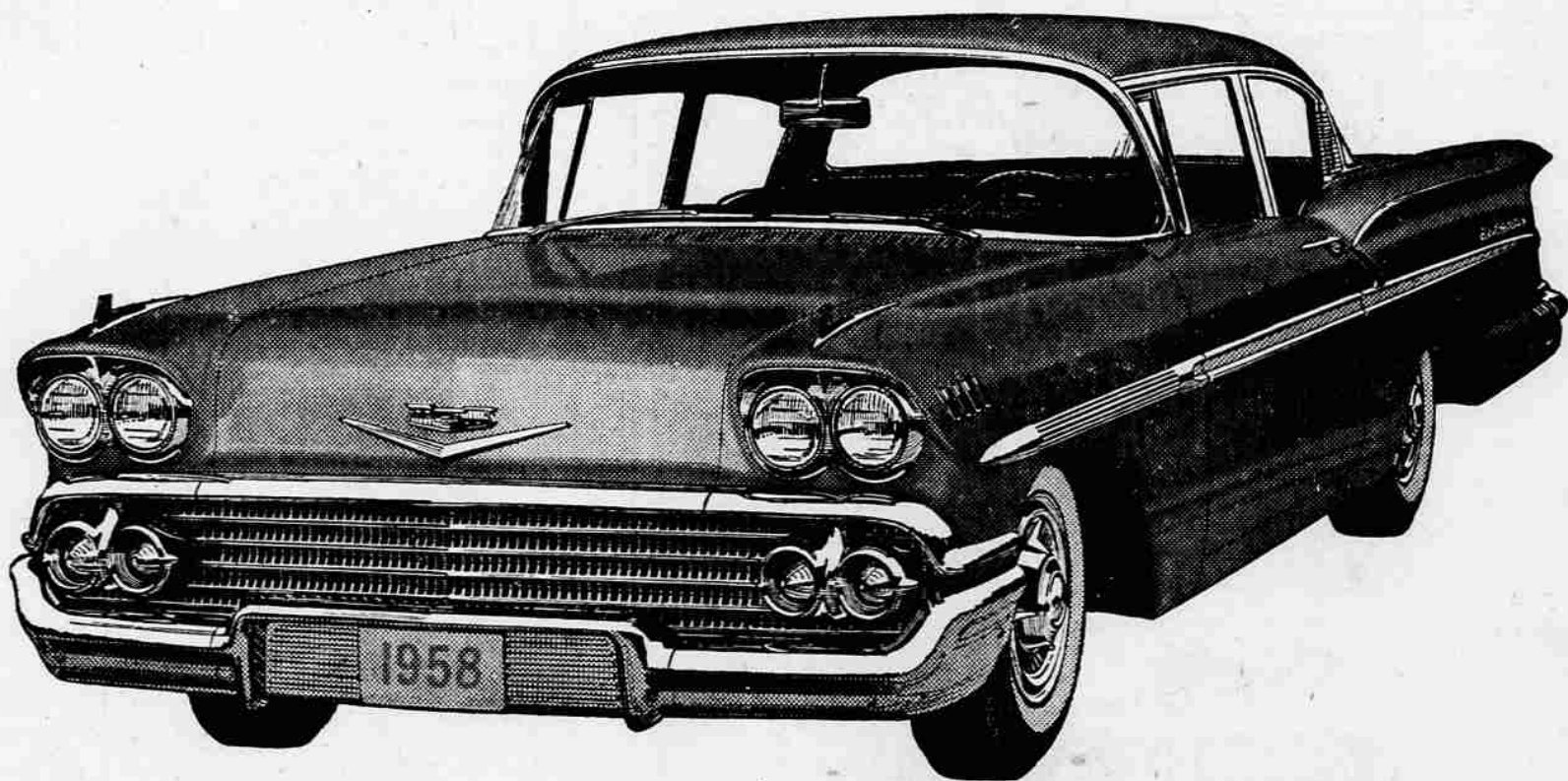
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
