Native Daughter Celebrates Eighty-Eighth Anniversary

Mrs. Addie Wilson, 340 South Riverside avenue, celebrated her 88th birthday Monday, November 18. Born in a small log cabin not far from the present site of the Medford municipal airport, Mrs. Wilson is the daughter of the late John E. Buzan and Lettie Merriman Buzan.

Her maternal grandfather was the early pioneer, W. H. Merriman, for whom Merriman road is named. Lettie Merriman was five years old when she and her

father arrived in the Rogue River valley with the Isaac Constant wagon train. Her mother and baby brother had died on the plains and were buried along the way.

Mrs. Wilson has lived the majority of her life in the valley and remembers attending the celebration in Ashland in 1887 commemorating the completion of the railroad between Portland and San Francisco. She mentioned that she could easily remember when there was no Medford and recalls the little cigar box that J. S. Howard used for the first Medford post office.

Mrs. Wilson is in good health and still does all of her own housework.

Test Color of Foods On China Before Buying Says Home Economist

Corvallis—If new table china is on your Christmas "want" list, better try to color with foods before you buy, advises Mrs. Ruth Klippstein, Oregon State college home economist. She explains that china colors that appeal to the eye do not always appeal to the stomach when food is served.

Mrs. Klippstein suggests this test: try visualizing a serving of spinach, beets, and creamed carrots on the plates before you buy. These three foods will be the most critical tests of pleasing color in china.

Stuff About Stuffing

Stuffing should be removed from the turkey soon after serving and kept in a covered dish in the refrigerator. It spoils very quickly if kept at room temperature for a period of time. Use left over stuffing within two days.

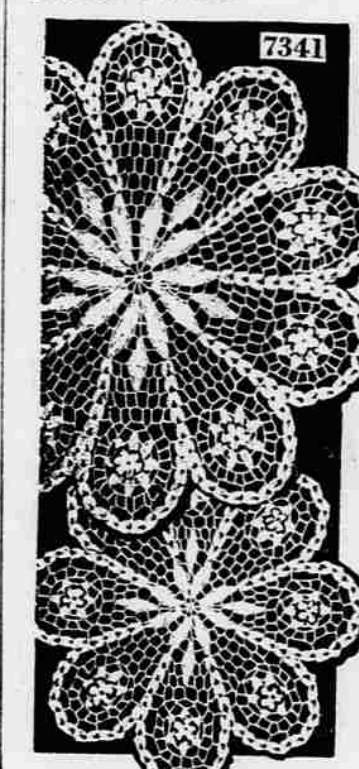

You'll need only mercerized bedspread cotton to make these simple doilies. Though so easy, they will be a smart accessory.

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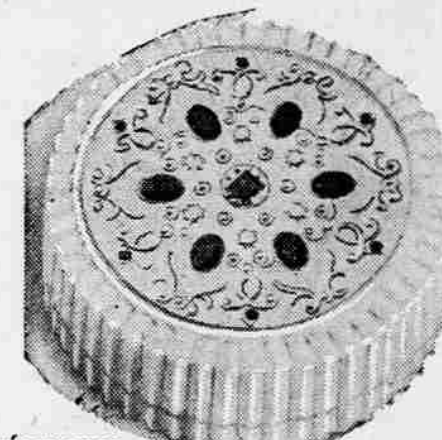
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
