Dag Hammarskjold Gives Backing to Col. Byron Leary

Jordan Asks UN to Remove American

United Nations Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold gave his full backing today to Col. Byron Leary, whose removal as head of the UN truce supervision organization in Palestine is demanded by Jordan.

Jordan demanded removal of the American Marine colonel on grounds he was "partial" to Israel in his investigation of the latest series of border incidents involving Israel and Jordan.

The latest incident was reported in Jerusalem when an Israeli spokesman said armed Jordanians opened fire on Israeli farmers Sunday after several unsuccessful attempts at kidnapping border residents.

Israel also accused Syria of opening machine-gun fire on an Israeli village, killing one Israeli and injuring several others. Israel demanded an emergency meeting of the Israeli-Syrian Armistice Commission—the first such meeting requested by Israel in two years.

Won't Deal With Leary
Jordan's call for the discharge of Leary from his sensitive post came after a week of increasing tensions between Israel and Jordan. Jordanian Foreign Minister Samir Rifai told newsmen his country would no longer deal with Leary.

Leary succeeded Canadian Maj. Gen. E. L. M. Burns as acting head of the truce supervision group when Burns took over the United Nations Emergency Force.

Hammarskjold in effect rejected the Jordanian complaint and suggested that a Jordanian representative discuss it with him personally. A statement issued by the UN in New York said "Colonel Leary continues to enjoy the full personal confidence of the secretary-general."

Result of Incident
The complaint arose because Jordan was annoyed with Leary's handling of its complaint that armed Israeli soldiers penetrated Jordan last week and kidnapped a Jordanian farmer. Israel has said only that it captured an "infiltrator" inside Israel.

Pierce said he saw it travelling from northeast to southeast. He said it appeared as bright as a north star when it reached a spot directly overhead.

"It looked as if the sun had hit a mirror. It sort of flashed up," Pierce said.

The Pierce family was holding an early Thanksgiving dinner when they interrupted their activities to see the star.

Third Judge Selected From Kelly Family; Bernard to Jacksonville

The Edward C. Kelly family of Medford will soon have a trio of judges, according to Jacksonville officials.

Bernard P. Kelly is expected to be appointed municipal judge of Jacksonville at the next council meeting there Dec. 3, according to E. D. McIntyre, Jacksonville councilman. The city council approved the appointment at Tuesday night's city council meeting, McIntyre said.

Kelly will replace Frank DeSouza, former Medford postmaster, who held the position until he became ill approximately three months ago. Kelly's duties will consist of handling traffic violations and violations of the Jacksonville city ordinances.

Kelly's father, Edward C. Kelly was appointed circuit court judge in June, and his sister and law partner, Noreen, was appointed Medford municipal judge in January. As far as is known now, the Kelly family is the only one in the state having three judges all holding their positions at one time.

Elections Slated For Directors in Rural Fire Areas

Medford and Central Point rural fire protection district elections are scheduled Monday, Dec. 2, with three positions to be filled on each board of directors.

Mrs. Dorothy McQuat, Clifford L. Howard and H. Chandler Drew have filed as candidates for Medford district posts and Harold Gebhard, B. Sam Taylor and Claude Thompson seek terms on the Central Point board.

Polls will be open from 2 to 8 p.m. Medford district polling place will be Oak Grove school. Residents of Central Point district will ballot at the fire station at Central Point.

Moves From District
Mrs. McQuat seeks a three-year tenure, filling out the unexpired term of Lou Martin, who has moved from the district. Howard is running for a two-year term and Drew for five years. Both were appointed during the past year to fill offices of directors who resigned. Drew was named to succeed A. O. Walker and Howard to take the post vacated by Mrs. Charlotte Fogelquist.

In the Central Point election Gebhard, Taylor and Thompson are candidates to succeed themselves. Gebhard is running for a five-year term, Taylor for two years and Thompson for one. Taylor and Thompson were appointed during the past year to fill the respective terms of Al Bohannon and Bert Smith, who resigned.

Carl Norris and Asher Neff are holdover directors in the Medford district and Claude Hoover and Ray Vogel remain in office in the Central Point district.

German Minister, Dulles Agree On NATO Consultations

Nations Should Hold Regular Conferences

Washington — German Foreign Minister Heinrich von Brentano and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles have agreed on the urgent need for regular political consultations inside the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Brentano Sunday wound up two days of preparatory talks here for the NATO Council "summit" meeting in Paris next month. The U.S.-German discussions centered on finding ways and means for achieving closer political cooperation among NATO allies.

Although it was not spelled out specifically, Brentano's concern stemmed from the Tunisian arms crisis that erupted last week when the United States and Britain sent arms to Tunisia over violent French objections.

Politics The Key
Brentano believes the United States shares the German view that NATO's principal problems are political rather than military, informed sources reported. Brentano is said to have pointed out that NATO's military situation has remained unchanged since the 1948 Communist coup in Czechoslovakia.

Brentano and Dulles said they were well satisfied with the outcome of the talks. The German foreign minister said the discussions had helped "strengthen the bonds of confidence and understanding."

Top Level Talks Seen
One result of the Paris meeting, foreseen by Brentano, was a heads of government directive to the alliance's foreign ministers to study closely what can be done now to help evolve such a unified policy.

Brentano and Dulles also discussed closer scientific cooperation in NATO to coordinate western efforts to catch up with recent Soviet scientific advances. French Foreign Minister Christian Pineau proposed such a "brain pool" during talks here earlier last week.

Before leaving Idlewild Airport in New York for Rome Sunday Brentano held a surprise meeting with Pineau. The two men evaluated the information they had gathered here on U.S. policies.

Police said a doctor called to examine Clark told them Clark not only had a fever and had not been vomiting. When Clark told them he had been in the hospital recently for treatment of stomach trouble, he was taken to Rogue Valley hospital by Medford Ambulance Service for further examination.

King Mohammed V To Arrive in U.S. Today

Washington — King Mohammed V of Morocco arrives today for his first U.S. visit in which he will attempt to iron out some problems and see the nation and its people from President Eisenhower to Joe Smith.

The three week tour will include a three-day official state visit here which is expected to further cement ties with the West.

From the time he enters this nation King Mohammed will get the deluxe red carpet treatment. President Eisenhower will greet him personally at the airport, an honor accorded only heads of state.

The King and President will ride in a motorcade to the White House from the airport. Mohammed V will lunch privately at Blair House and will meet the press during a reception later in the afternoon.

Tonight President and Mrs. Eisenhower will entertain King Mohammed and his official party at a state dinner at the White House.

During his visit the King is expected to confer with the President at least twice. He will also talk with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles.

Mohammed V, leader of a potentially rich nation of nine million souls at the western end of the Arab bloc, is one of the most respected statesmen of the Moslem world.

While in the United States King Mohammed wants to look at an American supermarket. He will visit a department store and some average American homes as well.

In his talks with U.S. officials King Mohammed and Foreign Minister Ahmed Balfrej are expected to try to win support for the joint Moroccan-Tunisian offer to mediate the three-year-old nationalist rebellion against the French in neighboring Algeria.

The question of U.S. bases in Algeria will probably come up because the agreement originally was negotiated with France. Negotiations have since been conducted with Morocco on a smooth but slow basis.

There may also be some discussion of U.S. economic aid to Morocco and of continued operation of a Voice of America transmitter in Tangier.

While here King Mohammed will do some sightseeing around Washington and historic Wil-

Dr. Teller First Witness in Senate Probe of Program

Says U.S. Fell Back In Race Into Space

Washington — Dr. Edward Teller, "father" of the H-bomb, said today that Russia may have or soon will have an intercontinental ballistic missile accurate enough to hit American cities.

He said the U.S. fell behind in the race into space because it waited until it had a nuclear warhead for its long-range missile "and by that time it was too late."

Teller was the first witness as the Senate Preparedness subcommittee opened its investigation of the U.S. missile and satellite programs with a warning that the nation faces a greater crisis than at Pearl Harbor.

Senate Democratic leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, the subcommittee chairman, said in opening the hearing that Russia's challenge with Sputniks I and II demand from the nation "the greatest effort in American history."

Teller told the investigators he believes the Russians have developed and tested intercontinental ballistic missiles as they claim, but he added a hope that they have not produced them in sufficient numbers to be put into operation.

He said he believes they either have "or will have in a short time ICBMs which are accurate enough to hit such American cities as Houston, Tex."

The scientist, now associate director of the University of California Radiation Laboratory at Livermore, Calif., warned that unless the U.S. steps up its military missile program "there is no doubt that the Russians will leave us behind and way behind."

Under questioning by special counsel Edwin L. Weiss, Teller said continued testing of nuclear weapons is "absolutely necessary."

Teller said Russia's space satellites have "very great significance," both militarily and scientifically, because they show Russian technological progress.

The said the Russian Sputniks of themselves were not positive proof that the Soviets have the ICBM. But he said it would be a "great mistake to proceed under the assumption that they are only bluffing" in claiming to have developed the long-range missile.

Teller said the U.S. did not embark on a really vigorous program after the war because, as he understands it, officials felt the needed high explosives were not available and they were not sure missiles would be used in the next war.

He said this country has since embarked on "an excellent and an excellently managed program" that came too late.

Air Force Awards Contract for Studies Of Reconnaissance Satellite for 1960

Washington — The Air Force has awarded a contract for "studies" of a reconnaissance satellite which may be built and launched in the early 1960's, government sources said Sunday night.

The contract for the project, dubbed "Pied Piper," went to Lockheed Aircraft Corp., Burbank, Calif.

Government sources described the project as definitely being in the "study stage" at this time. They indicated Lockheed would gain considerable information for the project from studies of its three-stage X17 rocket.

This is an Air Force project designed to help solve the problem of bringing ballistic missiles back through the atmosphere at tremendous speeds without having them burn up like meteors as a result of friction with air particles.

Macmillan Flies To Paris Talks

Paris — British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan arrived today to confer with French Premier Felix Giscard d'Estaing aimed at restoring the Anglo-French alliance which was badly torn by American and British arms shipments to Tunisia.

Macmillan's plane from London landed almost two hours behind schedule at Orly Airfield southeast of Paris after being diverted from Le Bourget Airfield northeast of Paris.

Fog at Le Bourget caused his delay and change in flight plans, but Macmillan emerged into bright sunshine at Orly Field. The 63-year-old prime minister was greeted with a hearty smile and a firm handclasp by Giscard, at 38 a full generation his junior.

In Paris, one right-wing group called for anti-British demonstrations in the Place de la Concorde, the U.S. and British embassies.

Macmillan flies back to London this evening, and his encounter today with Giscard was to be a brief one. But the agenda was heavy with crucial issues which affected the whole Western alliance and the Dec. 16 NATO summit conference.

Here are the main topics up for discussion: —Tunisian arms. The French are still angry over the "token" delivery of rifles and submachine guns to Tunisia by Britain and America.

—Algeria. France wants assurances of British support again this year when the Algerian crisis is debated in the United Nations. This may not be forthcoming since Britain feels Giscard's plans for Algeria are not sufficient to end the rebellion and that the rebellion threatens NATO.

—NATO. France claims that Britain and the United States

plan to set up an Anglo-American "directorship" to run NATO. British Foreign Minister Selwyn Lloyd who accompanied Macmillan today has emphatically denied this.

—Free Trade. Britain wants other Western European nations to agree to a plan which would include and supplement the six-nation common market. France is suspicious of the British plan, fears Britain would wreck the common market.

British political observers said the fate of the NATO summit meeting depends to a large degree on the smoothing over of the breach between France and Britain and America.

District Attorney Orders Autopsy in City Jail Death

District Attorney Thomas J. Reeder has ordered an autopsy on the body of Leo Jefferson Culley, 62, of 30 South Central ave., at the request of Medford Police Chief Charles P. Champlin. Culley was found dead in the city jail Saturday afternoon.

Deputy County Coroner Charles Dorrell said the autopsy is scheduled tentatively for late today.

Culley was arrested on charges of drinking in public by Medford police on Friday about 8 p.m. when he was found in a public alley near Front and Main sts. Police said Culley was in a good mood and seemed happy when lodged in jail.

Police officers and other prisoners said Culley mumbled and talked to himself while laying on his bunk Friday until about midnight. The desk sergeant on the midnight to 8 a.m. Sunday shift reported that all prisoners slept during his shift.

Culley, according to other prisoners, did not eat breakfast and seldom talked after waking Saturday morning, police said. About 2 p.m. he asked another prisoner to buy him some cigarettes and pour him a cup of coffee. He was given the coffee and an officer was asked for cigarettes.

When bringing the cigarettes the officer noted Culley was lying face-down on his bunk and looked unconscious. A prisoner was asked to wake him and when turning him over, said he was dead. About 15 minutes elapsed between the time Culley requested cigarettes and he was found dead, according to a police investigation.

Champlin said Culley had never appeared to be sick, had not complained to officers or prisoners that he felt ill, nor had he requested a doctor while in jail.

Police records show Culley has been arrested several times this year on similar charges. He was a former patient at Camp White.

Accident Victim In Fair Condition

Donald Clifford Gay, 21, of 4 Beach ave., Ashland, was reported in fair condition this morning by Rogue Valley hospital attendants after being seriously injured in a one-car accident just south of Medford early Sunday.

State police said Gay's car evidently struck a light post in the traffic island at Voorhies crossing. His car was reported damaged beyond repair.

The attending physician said Gay suffered a torn spleen, torn left kidney and underwent surgery early Sunday morning.
