

Jack Morris Selected to UP All-Coast Second Aggregation

San Francisco — (UCLA) which rounded out an impressive season despite crippling Pacific Coast conference penalties, landed two players on the United Press all-Pacific Coast football team which was announced today.

Left end Dick Wallen, a tremendous pass-interceptor as well as receiver, and right tackle Bill Leeka were the Bruins named to the first string.

Don Ellingsen, son of Washington State's "Tuffy" Ellingsen who made history there 25 years ago, nailed down the other wing for the Cougars.

Quarterback Bob Newman, Ellingsen's battery-mate in the powerful Washington State air attack, was named to the first string backfield. Joining him were Joe Francis of Oregon State, Jim Shanley of Oregon and Jim Jones of Washington.

First string center went to Marv Bergmann of the Huskies while Harry Mondale, the fire-plug from Oregon, and Jim Brackins of Oregon State won the guard spots.

Northwest Dominates Team

Troy Barbee of Stanford was paired with Leeka at tackle to be the only Indian represented on a first team dominated by the Northwest.

Stanford landed three spots on the second team which sported a backfield consisting of the Indians' Jack Douglas and Chuck Shea, Jack Morris of Oregon and Bob Mulgado of Arizona (Tempe) State.

Ron Stover of Oregon and Gary Van Galder of Stanford took the end assignments while Ted Bates and Dave Jesmer of Oregon State captured the tackle spots.

Second team guard posts were grabbed by Jerry Kramer of Idaho and Al Carr of Arizona State while Merl Hitzel of Washington State was selected for center.

Three-Way Tie

A wild battle for backfield spots developed on the third team after Nub-Beamer of Oregon State and Tom Flores of College of the Pacific were assured of their posts. The other two spots wound up in a three-way tie between Jack Crabtree

Army-Navy Tilt Sets Grid Style; Duke Vies in Bowl

The drama of the Army-Navy game, with a possible bowl bid at stake, sets the style for the double-barreled program of showdown games winding up the 1937 college football season this week.

With Duke officially named Sunday as Oklahoma's rival in the Orange Bowl at Miami, Fla., four major bowl berths still are to be filled and, in addition, this week's games on either Thursday or Saturday will determine five major conference champions.

Still to be picked are both teams in the Cotton and Sugar bowls and the champs in the Southeastern, Southwest, Southern, Skyline and Border leagues.

After a formful Saturday when only one of the nation's top 10 teams, ninth-ranked Notre Dame, was beaten, and then by eighth-ranked Iowa, 21-13, here's how the major bowls are lining up:

Rose—Ohio State vs. Oregon. Orange—Oklahoma vs. Duke. Cotton—Rice or Texas A&M vs. Navy or Mississippi.

Sugar—Rice or Texas A&M vs. Mississippi.

Key Games Coming Up

Three games will probably settle all four bowl bids. Texas A&M (4-1-0) meets Texas on Thursday's Turkey day card and Rice (also 4-1-0) meets Baylor Saturday. If both contenders win, they tie for the Southwest conference crown and Rice goes to Cotton with the Aggies probably to the Sugar. If one wins while the other loses, winner gets title and Cotton bowl berth, loser probably gets Sugar.

Meanwhile, Navy is expected to get and accept the other Cotton bowl spot if it beats Army in Philadelphia's big game Saturday. Also at stake in what promises to be a high-powered game is the Lambert trophy, emblematic of Eastern grid supremacy.

Mississippi — Certain for a bowl game—will take the Southeastern conference if it beats Mississippi State Saturday and bowl ineligible Auburn loses to Alabama.

For the other league titles: VMI can clinch the Southern conference by beating Virginia Tech; Utah can clinch the Skyline by beating Utah State Thursday, and Arizona (Tempe) State Saturday.

Jim Brown's best sport is lacrosse, but don't be surprised if this fabulous athlete sparks the Cleveland Browns to the National Football league's Eastern division title.

Brown, rookie fullback from Syracuse, scored four touchdowns and set a single game NFL rushing record of 237 yards Sunday as Cleveland rallied to whip the Los Angeles Rams, 45-31. Brown scored on slashes of 69, one, one and three yards. He also set up Cleveland's last touchdown with a 46-yard run as he boosted his league-leading rushing total to 769 yards in 161 tries.

Brown bettered the old one-game rushing high of 223 yards set last year by Tom Wilson of the Rams. Brown, a 220-pounder who runs 100 yards in 10 seconds, propelled the Browns to their highest point total since 1954 as they retained their half game lead over the New York Giants.

Giants Scrape Through

New York, defending league and Eastern champion, stumbled through a poor second half but the third straight Sunday but defeated the Chicago Cardinals, 28-21. The Giants got all their points in the first half.

While the Browns and Giants whirled toward a Dec. 15 clash, the Baltimore Colts broke a first place tie with the San Francisco Forty-Niners and Detroit Lions to take a one-game lead in the Western race. John Unites' eight-yard pass to Alan Ameche in the last 47 seconds gave the Colts a 27-21 victory over the 49ers. The Chicago Bears gave Baltimore a big assist by upsetting the Detroit Lions, 27-7, behind Ed Brown's passes and Rick Casares' run.

Portland — (UCLA) — Wichita of the National Industrial Basketball league walloped the Portland Outdoor Store 137-85 in a wild exhibition basketball game Sunday afternoon.

Wade (Swede) Halbrook, the ex-Oregon State star, helped control the backboards for the visitors and scored nine points. Eight Wichita players scored in double figures. Jack Viskov had 18 points for Portland.

Perfect Pin Game Rolled

Anderson also had the highest scratch series of the tourney with a 722 without handicap. He and his partner, Duke Tanaka, missed first place by three points. The trophy was taken by Kelcy Allen and Al Vermeire with 1351.

Lester Shingle of Sweet Home was the team winner with 3195 and Wayne Claflin took the singles title with 730.

The Green Bay Packers struck a blow to Pittsburgh's slim hopes of overtaking Cleveland and New York by downing the Steelers, 27-10, on touchdowns by Bart Starr, Howie Ferguson and Babe Parilli. Rookie quarterback Sonny Jurgensen threw scoring passes of 61 and 36 yards to rookie Tommy McDonald to help the Philadelphia Eagles upset the Washington Redskins in the other game, 21-12.

The National Football league attracted 240,864 fans to its six Sunday games, bringing its attendance total for the season to 2,253,145.

Eastern Pro Grid League Discussed

Nw York — (UCLA) — Representatives from Brooklyn, Jersey City, Philadelphia, Buffalo, Rochester and Syracuse held an eight-hour meeting Saturday to discuss forming an Eastern Professional Football league.

Ronald Morgan of Rochester, spokesman for the group, said the league hoped to begin play in 1958 or 1959 and would not ask for a working agreement with the National Football league.

"We don't want a working agreement with the National Football league because we don't want to be a farm system for anyone," Morgan said. "We think there are enough players who don't make National League teams to give us a great deal of talent."

"Each team will operate on an annual budget of about \$200,000. We have been working on formation of this league for two months now and this was our third meeting."

Philadelphia Raps Lakers

The Minneapolis Lakers, once the pride of the National Basketball association, dropped their ninth straight game Sunday night and dug themselves a bit deeper into the Western division cellar.

Tom Gola, playing his second game since returning from the Army, sparked Philadelphia to a 105-98 victory over the Lakers at Camden, N.J., as the Warriors snapped a four-game losing streak of their own.

By winning, the Warriors moved into a second-place tie with Syracuse in the Eastern division.

RED BOOTERS QUALIFY

Leipzig, East Germany — (UCLA) — Russia became the 14th nation to qualify for the 1958 World Soccer cup finals Sunday when its national team beat Poland, 2-0, before a crowd of 120,000. Sweden, Germany, Austria, France, England, Scotland, Yugoslavia, Brazil, Argentina, Hungary, Mexico, Paraguay and Czechoslovakia qualified previously.

Flyweight Title Fight On Saturday

New York — (UCLA) — Little Pascual Perez of Argentina will attempt his seventh defense of the flyweight crown against Young Martin of Spain Saturday at Buenos Aires in the only world title fight on this week's boxing schedule.

Perez, weighing about 106 pounds and Martin about 111, are expected to attract a sellout 85,000 to the Boca Juniors Soccer stadium. Perez is favored at 7-5.

At Madison Square Garden, Friday night, lightweight contenders Paolo Rosi and Johnny Bussio will meet in a nationally televised and broadcast 10-rounder (NBC). Italian Rosi, now living in New York, is favored at 8-5 over New Yorker Bussio. Their bout, originally slated last March, was delayed three times by injuries and ailments.

Rosi, ranked fifth, has a 26-4-1 record that includes 11 knockouts. Ninth-rated Bussio has a 31-5-1 record that includes 14 kayoes.

At Miami Beach, Wednesday night, heavyweight contender Willie Pastrano of Miami Beach will meet Willi Besmanoff of Germany in a nationally televised 10-rounder (ABC). Pastrano, ranked third, is favored at 4-1 over unrated Besmanoff. Pastrano's 43-5-5 record has nine kayoes; Besmanoff's 43-10-7 has 14.

The Buckeyes took all the Big Ten had to offer by beating Iowa for the title a week ago and then walloping Michigan, 31-14, for its seventh straight conference success Saturday.

By coming from behind to down the Wolverines, Ohio State collected its 24th conference win in 26 starts since the 1954 campaign. It also gave the Buckeyes their second Rose bowl bid since then, and their third conference championship.

The Bucks made their most improving showing in 1954 under Coach Woody Hayes when they wound up undefeated with a string of 10 victories, seven in the conference. They capped this accomplishment with a 20-7 Rose bowl win over Southern California.

Ineligible in 1955

In 1955, the Bucks were ineligible for the bowl but finished in first place with six conference wins and no losses. They dropped their only two conference games in four seasons last year, finishing fourth to champion Iowa with a 4-2 record.

Hayes' crew would have added another undefeated year to the record but for a pesky Texas Christian which scored an upset
