

New Camera Shutter Announced by Army

Washington—The Army has announced development of a rapid new camera shutter that takes photographs in five billionths of a second.

The shutter was designed for scientific research studies of high-speed shock wave, explosions and certain types of nuclear reactions.

Its secret, the Army said, is a hermetically-sealed chemical-type shutter which is triggered electronically. The shutter was developed by the Samuel Feltman Ammunition Laboratories at Dover, N.J.

Applegate Valley—When Mrs. Robert Sorber talked to the Applegate valley garden club Wednesday about "winterizing" their gardens she included such practical knowledge as protecting plants from deer.

In speaking of the use of polyethylene plastic sheeting for protection of sensitive outdoor plants, Mrs. Sorber advised use of the plastic on cold frames instead of glass, since her own glass topped structures have been broken by deer. Others of the group also mentioned trouble with deer removing screening from plants. Mrs. Sorber also talked on mulching and winter clean-up of plants.

Ladies attending put together a few small cones, seeds, acorns, pods, and leaves to make dry corsages. This portion of the program was directed by Mrs. Francis Krause. Plans were made for a Christmas party at the December meeting.

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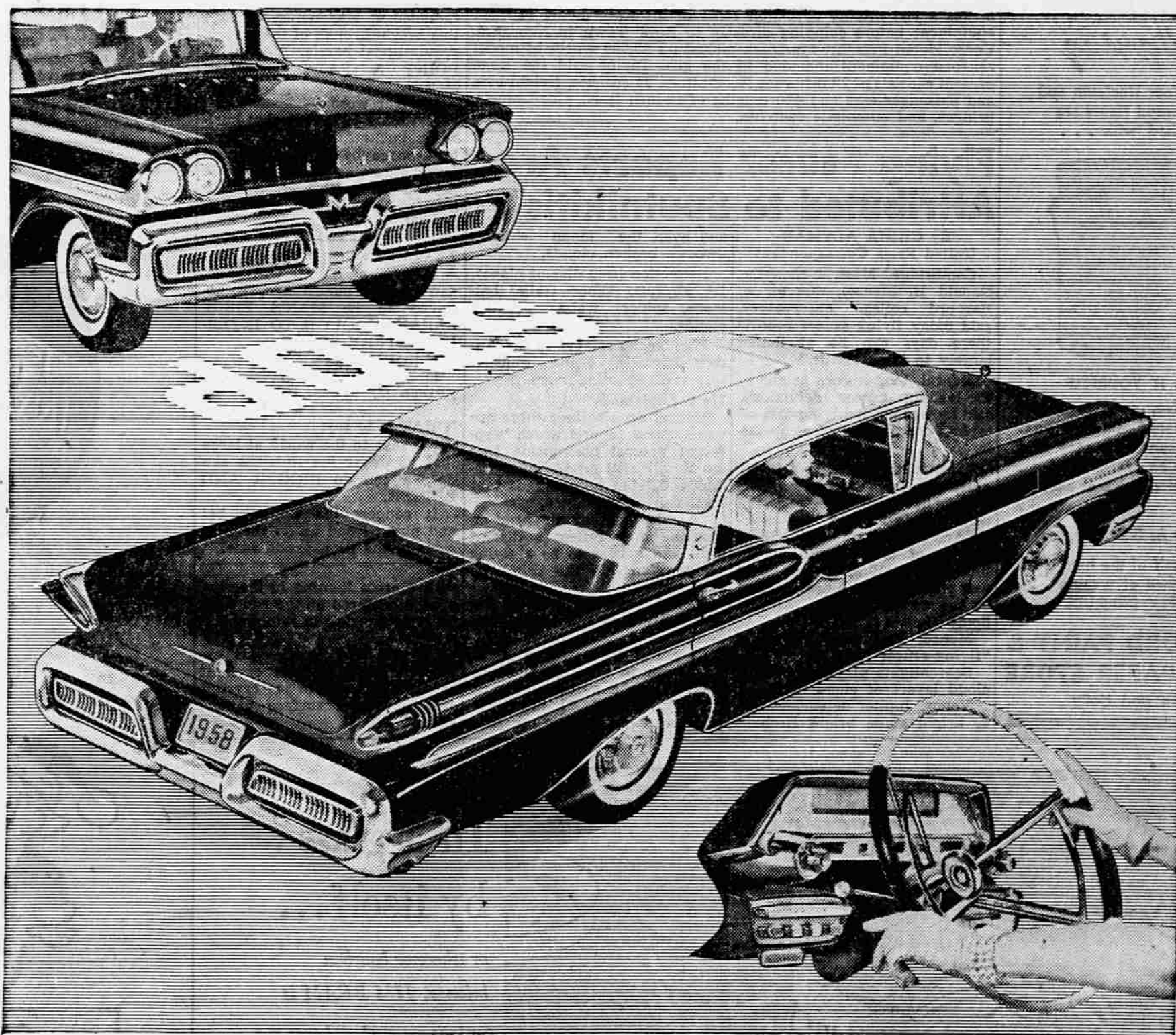
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
