

Warren Spahn Named Outstanding Pitcher

New York — Warren Spahn, who dislikes "talk about my getting old," succeeded where Ted Williams failed today by winning the Cy Young award as the major league's outstanding pitcher in 1957.

The 39-year-old Williams of Boston was beaten at the ballot box — some say unfairly — by young Mickey Venable of the Yankees in the voting for the American league's "most valuable player."

But the 36-year-old Spahn, who won more games than any other pitcher this year, ran away in the voting for the top pitching award by getting the nod from 15 of the 16 members of the Baseball Writers association selection committee.

The lone dissenting vote went to righthander Dick Donovan of the Chicago White Sox, a 16-game winner.

Spahn has won 20 games in a season more often (eight times) than any southpaw in National league history.

With 21 wins and 11 losses this year, Spahn topped the only other 20-game winners of 1957 — Billy Pierce of the White Sox and Jim Bunning of Detroit, who won exactly 20. Moreover, he led the National league in complete games, 18, was second only to the Dodgers' Johnny Podres in earned run average with 2.66 per game, and second to Pitts-

burgh's Bob Friend in innings pitched with 271 to Friend's 277. The Cy Young award, named for the pitcher who won more games than any other big league hurler in history, was given by the writers this year for the second time. The initial award last season went to 27-game winner Don Newcombe of the Dodgers.

Lions Trip Green Bay In Pro Mix

Detroit — A dressing room play that worked for a 62 yard touchdown and the Detroit Lions back in contention today for the National Football league's Western division title.

"We talked over about five plays during the half," said Lion Coach George Wilson who admitted he was a "little" mad after Detroit muffed four first half drives with fumbles and pass interceptions.

One of the five plays resulted in the only touchdown of the game and the oldest man — 33-year-old Jim Martin kicked three field goals as the Lions whipped the Green Bay Packers 18-6, in a nationally televised mud battle at Briggs Stadium. It was the NFL's only game.

The victory put the Lions a half game behind the division leading Baltimore Colts who have three games left to Detroit's two. The Colts face Los Angeles twice and the Forty Niners at San Francisco. The Lions play the Cleveland Browns and the Bears at Chicago.

Amick Winner In Midget Race

Gardena, Calif. — George Amick of Los Angeles set a new track record of 38:09.91 Thursday night in capturing the 17th annual 150-lap Grand Prix Midget Auto race at Gardena stadium. Amick took the lead away from Johnny Parsons, Van Nuys, Calif., on the fourth lap and stayed ahead the rest of the race to break the track record of 38:48.40 set by Parsons in 1955.

Cancer Research Uses Dandelion Principle

San Francisco — Using the same principle as in killing dandelions without killing the lawn, a large-scale hunt is in progress to discover chemicals which will kill cancerous cells without harming normal ones. The use and synthesis of new chemicals, called cancer chemotherapies, is particularly important since present surgical and radiological methods of cancer treatment are effective in only about 10 per cent of the cases detected.

The greatest deterrent to cancer chemotherapy is the necessity of obtaining clearest diagnosis before treatment is begun. Deposited cancers in vital organs, such as the lymph glands, often are detectable only after the disease has reached the inoperable stage.

Research has indicated that the difference between cancerous and normal cells might enable chemists to starve the cancerous cells without destroying the metabolism of the normal cells. It is possible that cancer cells burn up food at different rates and in different combinations than normal cells.

Waythwaite Company Plant About Half Done

Springfield, Ore. — Waythwaite Timber company said today its plywood mill expansion project is 20 per cent completed. Ground was broken on the project in June and completion is set for next March.

R. A. Kronenberg, branch manager here, said the roof area of the new plant will cover more than an acre. The expansion will meet heavy demands for the wood product made by sandwiching veneer with fresh linseed oil.

Knicks Hand Celtic Five First Loss

They knew it had to happen some time, but you couldn't blame the Boston Celtics for moaning today about their first loss of the season.

After winning their first 14 games to arrive close to two National Basketball association records, the Celtics finally were beaten Thursday night, 97-80, by the New York Knicks at Philadelphia. Boston fell 18 points behind and never could catch up.

Victory would have enabled the Celtics to tie the league record of 15 straight wins at the start of the season set by Washington in 1948. Then they could have taken aim at the all-time winning streak mark of 17 games, also held by Washington.

In other league games Thursday night, the Philadelphia Warriors nipped Syracuse, 102-98, in the other game at Philadelphia and the host St. Louis Hawks downed the Cincinnati Royals, 112-96.

The Hawks' win was their seventh straight and boosted their Western division lead to two games.

Taucher Sparks Shasta Triumph

Redding, Calif. — All-Northern California halfback Donn Taucher ran and passed Shasta Junior college to a 20-19 win Thursday over Olympic Junior college, Bremerton, Wash., in the second annual Lumber Bowl game.

It was Shasta's eighth win in nine games this season. Taucher scored two Shasta touchdowns and passed to Cecil Stephens for the third in pushing past the Washington state champions after spotting the visitors to an early 13-0 lead.

Shasta got its final touchdown with just 3½ minutes left when Taucher went over from six yards out. Harry Johnson's placekick won the game.

Squaw Lake Gets Fish in Experiment

Portland — Gene Goff, chief fish culturist for the game commission, reported the month of October a busy one at several commission hatcheries and egg taking stations, with fall spawning fish producing good supplies for next year's fish releases.

Up to November 15, fall spawning rainbows have produced some 1,259,000 eggs at the Oak Springs hatchery on the Deschutes near Maupin. Crews at the East Lake egg station have more than 2,010,000 eastern brook eggs in the hatching baskets at the Fall River plant. The Wickiup fall egg take produced some 157,000 brown trout eggs, which were transferred to the Wizard Falls hatchery on the Metolius river.

Goff said that silver salmon should be producing eggs at the Alesca and Cedar Creek hatcheries on the coast during December and possibly the latter part of November. Although some steelhead are appearing at the hatchery traps no eggs will be taken until later in January, February, and March.

All hatcheries are being cleared of surplus fish to make way for the new arrivals as soon as they hatch. Last week some 24,000 fingerling rainbows were released in Squaw lake which should produce some good anglers next spring. Actually, this plant was of an experimental nature to determine their survival and growth rate in the face of catfish competition and low food grade.

An initial planting of about 120,000 rainbow fingerlings was released in the recently treated Ochoco reservoir. Anglers can look forward to some excellent angling come trout season opens.

The Rogue river received its allocation of spring chinook yearlings during the latter part of October with 23,000 fin-clipped fish released at the mouth of Mule creek and 35,000 of another fin-clipped group released below the Savage Rapids dam.

The Mule creek releases were fish which normally the game commission has been planting near Gold Beach. However, the return of the lower river plants has been disappointing, and an improved return is strived for by placing the salmon at a higher location in the watershed. The Savage Rapids plants have provided a high return to the lower river sport fishery.

Roseburg — Douglas county residents today were promised some "shock treatment" in a traffic safety campaign. At least 10 wrecked cars in which someone had been killed were to be lined up on a downtown street Saturday on public view. The street was to be cleared of all other traffic and a policeman stationed at each wrecked car to explain to viewers how the fatality occurred.

Arch Moore In Portland Main Event

Portland, Ore. — Archie Moore, who says he's "just a journeyman trying to make a buck," goes against Roger Rischer, California state heavyweight champion from Oakland, here tonight in a 10-round boxing main event.

Moore, weighing 200 pounds and a little pudgy around the waist, tapered off his training Wednesday and pronounced himself ready for Rischer, who will carry about 183 pounds when he steps into the ring against the aging light heavyweight champion.

It will be Rischer's 27th professional fight. His last time out was Aug. 1 when he won a 12-round decision over Ruben Vargas. Moore, who wants another crack at Floyd Patterson's heavyweight crown, decided Eddie Cotton two weeks ago at Seattle.

McDaniel Sparks Pioneer Victory

Arcata, Calif. — Freshman Quarterback Royce McDaniel led Lewis and Clark to a 31-27 football victory over Humboldt State Thursday in the third annual Redwood Bowl football game before 3,500 fans.

McDaniel scored two touchdowns and threw a pass for another.

SUCCESSFUL ELK SEASON

Portland — The Mill Creek controlled elk hunt in the Mill Creek watershed of northeastern Oregon was a huge success. So says 96 hunters who checked into the Mill Creek unit and came away with 65 elk for a success of almost 68 per cent. Dave Luman, district game biologist at Pendleton, said that ease of entry was the probable reason for the excellent kill. Hunters were not bunched up near the access road entrance as in past years but could drive the entire perimeter. Camps were scattered throughout the area during the nine day hunt.

Chicago — Lightweight champion Joe Brown doesn't plan to sit back and let Joey Lopes of Sacramento, Calif., take the championship away from him.

The two fight 15 rounds next Wednesday with the title at stake, with Lopes earning the battle through a 10-round draw with the titleholder last Aug. 21. The draw has resulted in

Brown's changed attitude. "When we fought," he said, "I learned a lot about him. I was letting him make the openings, and I kind of took it easy."

"Now with the title at stake, I'm going to be aggressive and go after him from the first bell. I can set the pace all the way and I think I'll knock him out."

Hillsdale Withdraws From NCAA

Hillsdale, Mich. — Little Hillsdale college with an enrollment of 725 students today stood up to the powerful National Collegiate Athletic association and said it was withdrawing from the NCAA rather than be penalized for playing in the small college Holiday bowl.

Frank (Muddy) Waters, athletic director and coach, also revealed that the NCAA's alleged tolerance of a color ban set off a chain of events three years ago which drew Hillsdale away from the NCAA and closer to the National Association of Intercollegiate athletics which is promoting the Holiday bowl game Dec. 21 at St. Petersburg.

The post-season bowl game is not sanctioned by the NCAA.

Waters said the letter announcing Hillsdale's withdrawal would be sent today to NCAA officials.

Pittsburgh Press Writer Honored

New York — The National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame today cited Chester L. Smith, sports editor of the Pittsburgh Press, for "his distinguished service to amateur football."

The award, announced by Chester J. Laroche, president of the foundation, will be presented to Smith on Dec. 1 at the annual meeting of Curston Coaches in Pittsburgh.

River Steamboat Goes Into Winter Berth

Peoria, Ill. — One of the last reminders of an almost vanished bit of America — the old river steamboat — has left Illinois to go to its winter berth in Cincinnati.

Heralded by a blasting calliope, a shrill whistle and the churning of the paddle wheel, the Avalon — last steam excursion boat operating on inland waters — has finished her 33rd season.

There are other such steamers on the Mississippi — one in St. Louis, one in New Orleans — but they just stay there and bob go anywhere.

But the Avalon still operates as an excursion boat from March through September. She is berthed only in the winter months for winter repairs.

The steamboat can carry up to 1,300 passengers and has a crew of 50, a lively brass band. Her calliope is one of only three of its type in existence.

The Avalon was built in 1913 and began her career as a ferryboat. In 1930 she was converted into an excursion boat.

Each season Capt. Ernest Wagner, the skipper, takes her from Cincinnati, up the Ohio, through the Tennessee, the Kanawha, the Mississippi, the St. Croix — stopping all along the way to give a steamboat ride to all who want such an experience.

The Avalon will be back on the old route next season.

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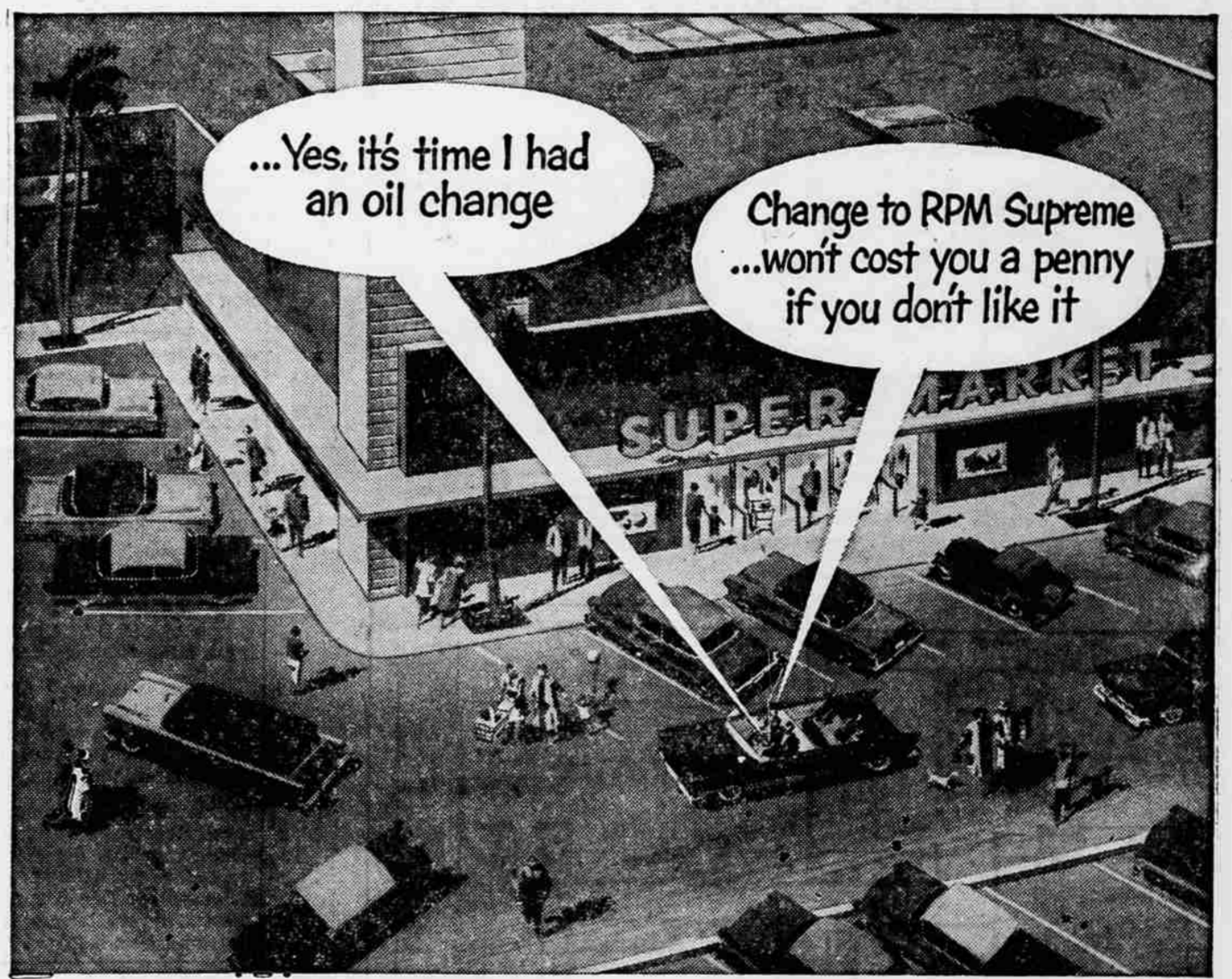
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
