Spring Weather Hits New England Section

It might as well be spring in New England. A lingering balmy spell which supplanted a cold snap several days ago today gave promise of more mild temperatures and light rains.

In contrast to wintery conditions of 48 hours ago when the temperature at Burlington, Vt., dropped to 1 degree above zero, the mid-night reading was 46 degrees Thursday. Similar moderate temperatures were common throughout the Northeast.

A wide pattern of scattered showers extended down the entire Atlantic Seaboard, and extended as far inland as Tennessee and the Ohio Valley.

A cooling trend in the Ohio Valley moved northward into the Great Lakes region and also southwestward into eastern Texas.

New York—Oils and aircrafts provided the steam for a good post-Thanksgiving advance today.

Late profit taking and pre-week end evening up operations whittled away some of the market's gains. Even so, gains of a point or more were numerous in the main list near the close.

Shell was a bright spot in the oil, rising more than 3 points at its high. Kerr-McGee rose more than 2 and a long list of leaders in this group added a point or more. Alcoa and Reynolds were strong in the metals.

Ashland Program Said Not Costly To Many Taxpayers

Ashland—The cost of financing the proposed building program for the Ashland district is well within the ability to pay the school district, according to a special panel of the citizens' school advisory committee at a recent chamber of commerce meeting.

Dale Williams told the group the maximum cost to the taxpayer would be about 10.09 mills. Williams gave the example of a \$12,000 valued home with an assessed value of \$2,500 the cost would be \$25.23 per year or about 29 cents per week.

He told the group that his figures were based on the proposed bond issue of \$1,250,000. About \$13,000 additional will be needed, he said, but this would add only pennies to the taxpayer.

Issued As Needed

The bonds would be issued as the school district needed them, he said. This program will give some savings on interest, he added. Williams reported to the group that interest rates are being estimated at 4 per cent and by the time the bonds are issued there might be some easing of the rate.

The current value of Ashland schools is about \$11,150,646, Williams said. This figure has been gaining about five per cent a year. He said if property continues to come onto the tax rolls at the same time rate as in recent years, this would lower the cost to taxpayers.

Present debt of the district is about \$564,000 while the district has an estimated maximum capacity of around \$2,290,000, he said. Another member of the panel, Robert O'Hara, told the chamber the committee had accepted the estimated school enrollment figure. They had found remodeling of several schools to be possible but the junior high school would be too costly to renovate, he added.

Harold Buck, committee member, said the system would be about 8 classrooms short next fall and about 17 classrooms short by 1961 if the program was not put into effect. He said two small junior high schools would cost about \$27,000 more than on large junior high.

Because of the narrowness of Ashland city limits he said it would be more practical to construct one junior high near each end of the city. The citizens' panel will make about 20 more appearances before the issue will come before the voters.
