



Always an outstanding favorite with men, chiffon pie can now be made without cooking when you use a new chiffon pie filling mix. It comes in two flavors—strawberry and lemon—both tangy in flavor for these bright, crisp autumn days to come.

Prepared in about 4 minutes, this mix gives good volume and has a truly chiffon-like texture. In the photo, lemon chiffon pie filling is combined with part orange juice and part water to produce a delicious blend of flavors. Make the filling up a couple of hours before you expect to serve it so it will be set and well chilled.

Orange-Lemon Chiffon Pie
1 package lemon chiffon pie filling mix 1/2 cup orange juice
1/2 cup boiling water 1/3 cup sugar
1 baked 9-inch pie shell, cooled

Place mix in a large deep mixing bowl. Add boiling water and mix thoroughly. Add orange juice and beat vigorously with rotary beater or at highest speed of electric mixer until mixture is very foamy—takes about 1 minute. Add sugar and beat until filling stands in peaks—takes 1 to 3 minutes. Pour into pie shell. Chill until set—about 2 hours. If desired, garnish with whipped cream and grated orange rind.

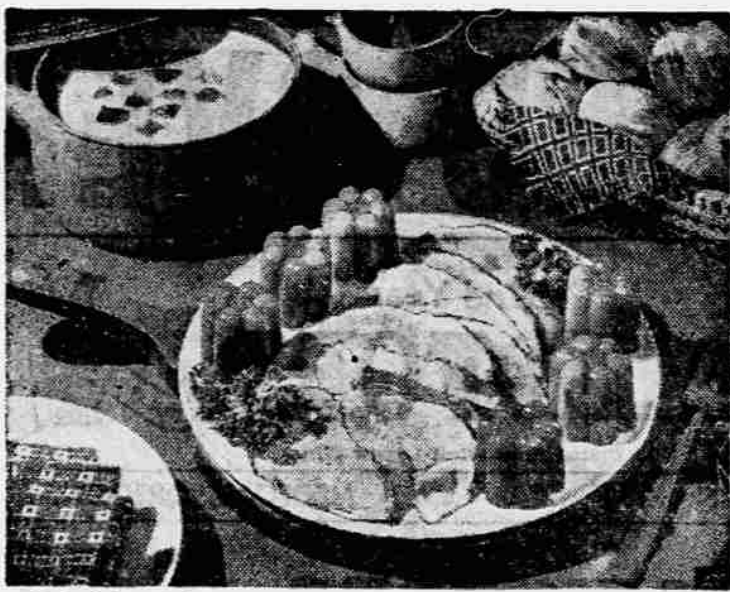

Colorful and flavorful, these easy-to-make tomato aspic molds add a cheerful note to a hot bisque and cold meat supper. Prepared with apple-flavored gelatin and tomato juice, they are seasoned to perfection with grated onion, prepared horseradish and, for an extra ping—a dash of cayenne.

Easy Tomato Aspic
1 package apple-flavored 1-1/2 teaspoons prepared horseradish gelatin 1-1/2 teaspoons grated onion
1 cup hot tomato juice 1 teaspoon salt
1 cup cold tomato juice Dash of cayenne

Dissolve gelatin in hot tomato juice. Add cold tomato juice, horseradish, onion, salt, and cayenne. Pour into individual molds. Chill until firm. Unmold. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Wasp Causes Most of Galls Seen on Trees

Kent, O.—The wasp's most violent sting is being felt by the American landscape. This insect is the major cause of odd-shaped malformation on trees and foliage called galls.

There are some 2,000 different kinds of galls, but the wasp causes more than one-third of them, according to F. R. Lancaster, plant pathologist and technical adviser of the Davey Tree Expert Co.

Insect galls are the reaction of the host plant to the presence or the feeding of the immature stages of the insects within the galls. This irritation stimulates the plant to build up a covering tissue within which the feeding and growth continue. While the growth appears to be a defense against insect attack, it results in increased protection and a good food supply for the devel-

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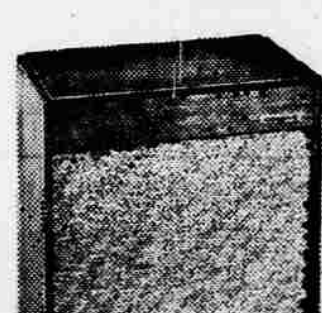
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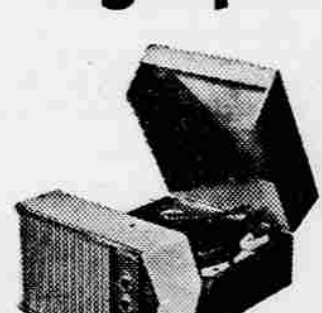

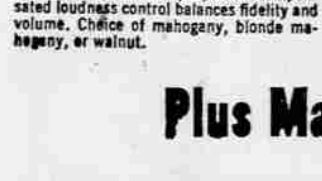
