

First Official Announcement Of PCC Session To Be Tonight

San Francisco.—The Pacific Coast conference, laughing on the outside but crying on the inside, buckled down today to the task of resolving a bitter feud which could result in UCLA, California and Southern California marching out of the loop.

Assistant Commissioner Bernard Hammerbeck said Sunday that the first official announcement of the five day meeting would be made tonight.

Reporters who tried a little button holding Sunday left with several statements which indicated that the sessions may be more harmonious than expected.

Schedule Adjustments Possible

Al Masters, athletic director of Stanford who earlier had said that he considered the much-maligned round robin schedule as binding through 1960, declared that some adjustments might be made by the conference.

Another college official who preferred to stay anonymous said that the tenor of Sunday's first get-together was such that the loop might not fly apart. And a spokesman for Idaho said the Vandals do not intend to leave the PCC.

There had been reports that Idaho, which does not play a full PCC schedule, might be thumbed out of the loop to appease the Los Angeles schools threatening secession.

Hammerbeck said that "there would be no expulsion" at this session because it had not been entered on the agenda.

He also said that any school can withdraw from the conference if it gives 60 days notice and pays off any outstanding

debts.

Three Schools Penalized

Southern California and UCLA were heavily penalized in 1956 as the upshot of disclosures they had been giving excessive aid to their football players. Washington also was penalized but the Bruins were banned from the Rose Bowl until after June of 1959. The Trojans and Huskies come out of the doghouse next June.

California, which also was fined a straight \$25,000, then worked out a five-point plan last summer with its sister PCCA which they want the PCC to adopt. Point five, the big one, calls for free scheduling of football games starting next season. And that remains a main item to be solved. The schools warned they might secede if it were not.

Joe Brown 3-1 Favorite In Ring Bout

New York.—Two title fights and a welterweight elimination match will feature this week's boxing schedule.

Champion Joe Brown is favored at 3-1 to keep his lightweight crown Wednesday night in 15-round fight with Joey Lopez at Chicago stadium.

It will be the third defense for Brown of New Orleans. Sixth-ranking Lopez of Sacramento, Calif., earned the right to a shot at the title by holding Brown to an over-the-weight 10-pound draw on Aug. 21.

Their title bout will be televised nationally by NBC.

Little Pascual Perez of Argentina is still a favorite to keep his world flyweight title against Young Martin of Spain at Buenos Aires next Saturday night.

They were slated to fight Sunday night but rain caused a week's postponement. A crowd of 85,000 had been expected at Boca Juniors Outdoor stadium.

The world tournament for the vacant welterweight crown will start Friday night when Isaac Logart of Cuba and Gaspar Ortega of Mexico meet in the first 12-round elimination at the Cleveland arena.

Their fight, star bout on the annual Cleveland Christmas fund show, will be televised and broadcast nationally by NBC.

King Hill Bonus Choice In Pro Draft

Philadelphia.—King Hill, all-around quarterback of Cotton Bowl-bound Rice, was selected as the bonus choice of the Chicago Cardinals as the National Football league opened its early player selection.

The Cardinals, who also had first choice in the regular draft, selected All-America back John Crow of Texas A&M.

Hill is a 210-pounder, who can pass and kick and is a power runner. The big quarterback also kicks extra points and is a defensive star.

Crow, who polled 21,269 points as a United Press All-America selection, also a 210-pounder, standing six feet two inches. He was the Aggies' offensive mainstay.

Green Bay, next in draft choice, selected center Dan Currie of Michigan State.

Guardsmen Patrol Central Corridors

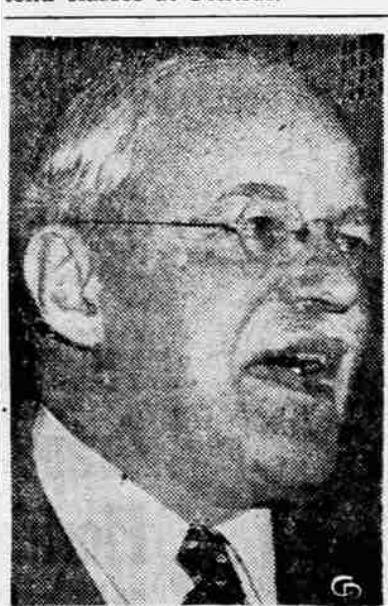
Little Rock, Ark.—Federalized National Guardsmen still patrol the corridors of Central High school, but today will be the first day of school for nine Negro children without the protection of the tough paratroopers who turned back a screaming mob of whites here 10 weeks ago.

The last 225 members of the 101st Airborne Infantry division returned to Fort Campbell, Ky., last week leaving the job of maintaining peace at the school to 900 federalized Arkansas guardsmen.

Only a dozen or so of the guardsmen patrol the school, but the rest of the troops under the command of Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker are ready to move into the area at the first hint of trouble.

There was no indication that any trouble was brewing. Mrs. L. C. Bates, president of the Arkansas Chapter of the NAACP, said she had the "utmost confidence" in the guardsmen.

Gov. Orval Faubus said he believes that there will have to be federal troops at the school throughout the rest of the term if the Negroes continue to attend classes at Central.

Chessman Renews Court Fight for Life

Los Angeles.—Convict-author Caryl Chessman goes back into court today to take up the fight for his life in a hearing on the 1,821-page transcript of his 1948 trial.

The 34-year-old condemned man who has spent nearly 10 years in San Quentin's death row, claims the transcript was fraudulently prepared when the original court reporter in the case died.

Before trial recessed last week for the long Thanksgiving holiday, Chessman won an admission from the second reporter who prepared the transcript that some changes had been made in the final version.

But Stanley Fraser, the 63-year-old reporter who took over preparation of the transcript after the death of Ernest Perry, said the changes were made to make sense of the document.

Chessman, whose authorship of best sellers has financed his legal fight, won a hearing on the transcript before the U.S. Supreme Court last June.

O'Doul Quits Seattle Club

Seattle, Wash.—The Seattle Rainiers were looking for their seventh manager in nine seasons today after Lefty O'Doul announced he was resigning his job as pilot of the Coast League club.

O'Doul, who said he wanted to stay in baseball, announced his resignation Sunday. He directed Seattle to a fifth place finish in his one year at the helm.

O'Doul had previously piloted three other PCL teams, including the San Francisco Seals for 17 years, San Diego for three and Oakland-Vancouver for two seasons.

Pepper Production Exceeds Estimates

Washington.—The Agriculture Department reported world pepper production in 1956 at 189,000,000 pounds, exceeding estimated prewar (1935-39) production for the first time.

India was the largest producer; Indonesia the leading exporter. The United States which bought 39,600,000 pounds of pepper last year, is the world's largest importer.

Most of the pepper in the world trade is produced in Indonesia, Sarawak, India and Ceylon. Small quantities also are produced in Indonesia, Malaysia, Thailand, Madagascar, the Belgian Congo, the British Southern Cameroons, Mexico and Brazil.

India produced 71,900,000 pounds of pepper in 1956, compared with Indonesia's 52,400,000 pounds.

Colts Bounce Rams From Title Picture

Baltimore.—Sharp-shooting Johnny Unitas and teammate Lenny Moore ruined Los Angeles' mathematical title chances Sunday in the Baltimore Colts' 31-14 victory over the Rams.

Quarterback Unitas, tossed three touchdown passes in whipping the Rams, two of them to Moore. Moore also scored on a 23-yard run.

The victory kept the Colts in a one-game lead in the Western division of the National Football league, and the loss ruined any chances the Rams might have had for the title. Los Angeles has a 4-6 record.

Baltimore took a 14-point lead in the first quarter when Moore went over from the 23 at the end of a 76-yard drive and Unitas passed three yards to Moore.

Van Brocklin Passes

Midway in the second period, the Rams pushed across their first touchdown on a 29-yard pass from Quarterback Norm Van Brocklin to end Leon Clarke after Larry Morris had recovered a Colt fumble.

Then, Los Angeles tied it up in the third period with a pass to End Elroy Hirsch who lateraled on the 11 to Tom Wilson.

Neuberger Sees Renewed Effort

Portland.—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.), predicted here today that the present illness of President Eisenhower will bring about a renewed drive to enact a constitutional amendment providing for mid-term elections, in the event there is a succession to the presidential office.

Neuberger said he had introduced in the Senate earlier this year a constitutional proposal eliminating the anti-third term limitation, after President Eisenhower himself questioned the wisdom of restricting a president's tenure in the White House.

Neuberger's proposal also includes a mid-term election whenever a vice president enters the first two years of a president's term.

"This is merely applying the sensible Oregon system of electing governors to the far greater position of the American presidency," Neuberger said. "No person succeeding to the Oregon governorship can occupy that post beyond the next election."

Brilliant Flash Lights Northern Sky

A brilliant flash in the sky, presumed to be a meteor, lighted up towns on either side of the international Montana-Saskatchewan border Sunday.

The flash was described as a "terrific" explosion that looked "as big as a boxcar."

John Hodges, director of the astrological society of Regina, Sask., College, said indications were the blinding light was cast by a meteor. But he said there was a "possibility" it could have come from a fragment of the comet or pieces of the disintegrating, Sputnik I.

Hodges said it was the brightest light he had seen in the sky for years.

Burley Bowler, a Scobey, Mont., weekly newspaper publisher, said, "at first we thought it might have been our furnace exploding. In fact, everybody in town seemed to think the same thing."

Norman Juel, a farmer, reported hearing a "loud boom" after sighting the flash.

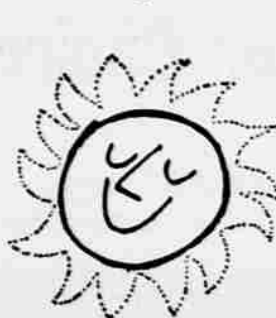
Soviet Airliner in Helsinki Crash-Landing

Reports said a number of persons were injured.

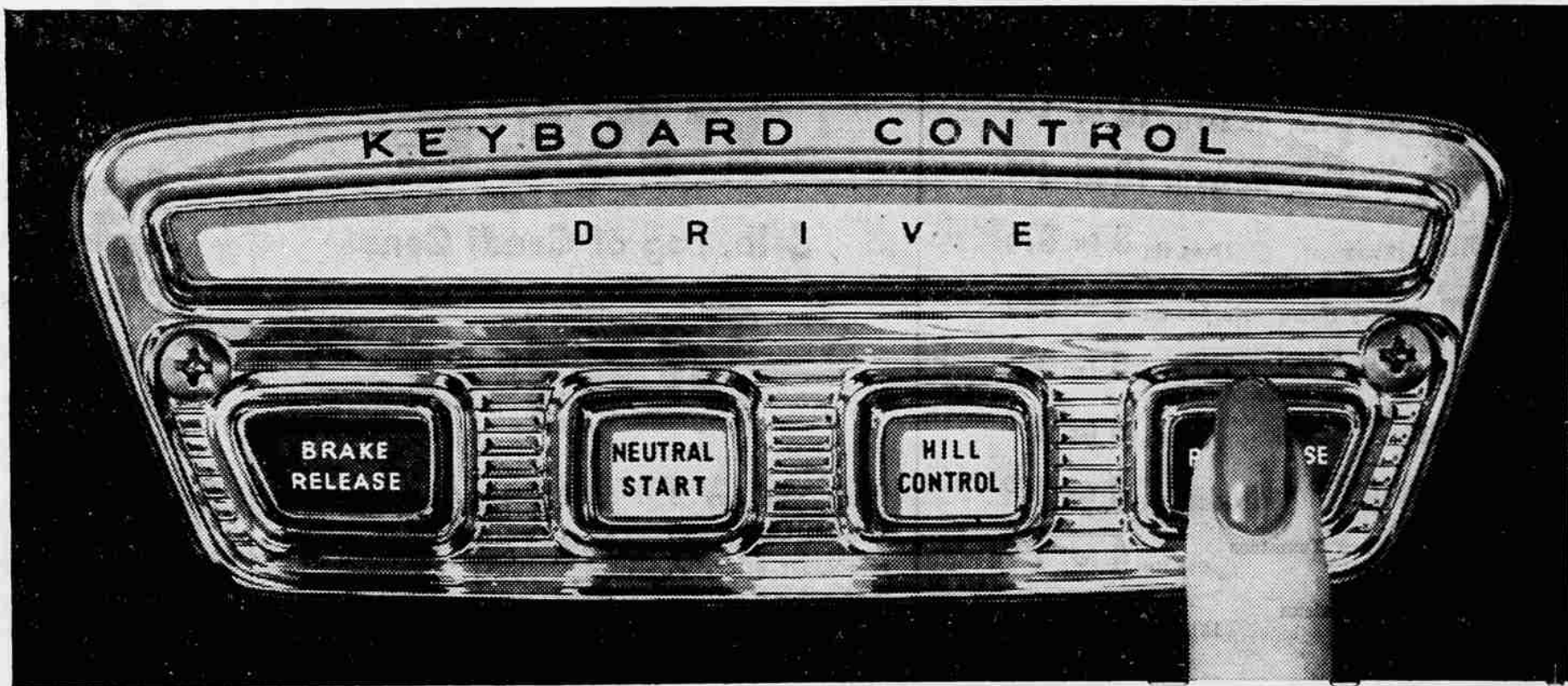
Helsinki is a major terminal for flights out of the Soviet Union. It is served mostly by conventional Soviet aircraft.
