Nigerian Patches Marital Trouble; Wins \$80,000

New York — Theophilus Adepoju Aderonmu, 30, son of a Nigerian tribal chief, raised his winnings on a TV quiz show to \$80,000 Tuesday night shortly after he patched up marital difficulties with his ex-wife, who had hailed him into court for non-support.

Beaming over the prospects of remarriage to Fay Aderonmu, the African Breeze through questions on Biblical lore to start his climb to a \$128,000 prize on CBS-TV's "64,000 Plateau" last week and announced his decision to try for the bigger prize money Tuesday night.

Earlier in Bronx Domestic Relations Court, Aderonmu caught the following question from 25-year-old Fay: "When are you going to give me support money for myself and our 2-year-old daughter, Sheila, and how much?"

Mrs. Aderonmu, who learned of her ex-husband's \$64,000 victory while watching TV in her Louisville, Ky., home, obtained a non-support summons last Monday. She is visiting relatives in the Bronx.

Justice Charles Horowitz, noting that Aderonmu had embraced before the court hearing, suggested that they iron out their difficulties over lunch. When they returned to the courtroom, the couple announced they would remarry.

"I still love her," said Aderonmu, adding that their marriage broke up because "she requires a lot of attention."

Mrs. Aderonmu's attorney, Harry Lipsky, said the real trouble was the Nigerian's belief in free love. But Aderonmu said it was all a misunderstanding about a sick woman he once brought home in order to call an ambulance.

Oregon Hospital Addition Approved

Salem — The Board of Control Tuesday approved plans for a \$197,965 second story addition to the administration building at Oregon State hospital here.

The new story would house doctors' offices and cubicles plus a conference room and administrative offices.

Architects for the project are Wicks and Brown, Astoria, who will now proceed with working drawings.

Approved for bid was a \$13,500 project converting the boiler at Eastern Oregon State hospital at Pendleton from oil to gas. Engineer Tom Taylor told the board gas was cheaper for this particular job.

A \$2,465 addition to a residence at MacLaren school for boys was also approved.
