## Josephine Land To Be State Park

Portland—Oregon's state parks system will be expanded by 30 acres of public domain land the State Highway Commission voted to buy Thursday. The land is located on the Redwood highway in Josephine county and is part of a 70-acre tract under lease by the parks department for the past 20 years.

The Commission, meeting here for its December bid openings, also agreed to install a bronze marker on the Coast highway at Neahkahnie mountain in Tillamook county commemorating the act that preserved all of Oregon's beaches for public use.

Berlin—The East German Communists today announced the acceptance of a "socialist" version of boogie woogie. The Soviet zone newspaper National Zeitung reported that the Communist regime has lifted its ban on any dance livelier than a waltz or foxtrot. East Germans now may dance such western imports as the mambo, cha-cha, calypso and boogie woogie, if danced "rhythmically and aesthetically" with "capitalist" features discarded.

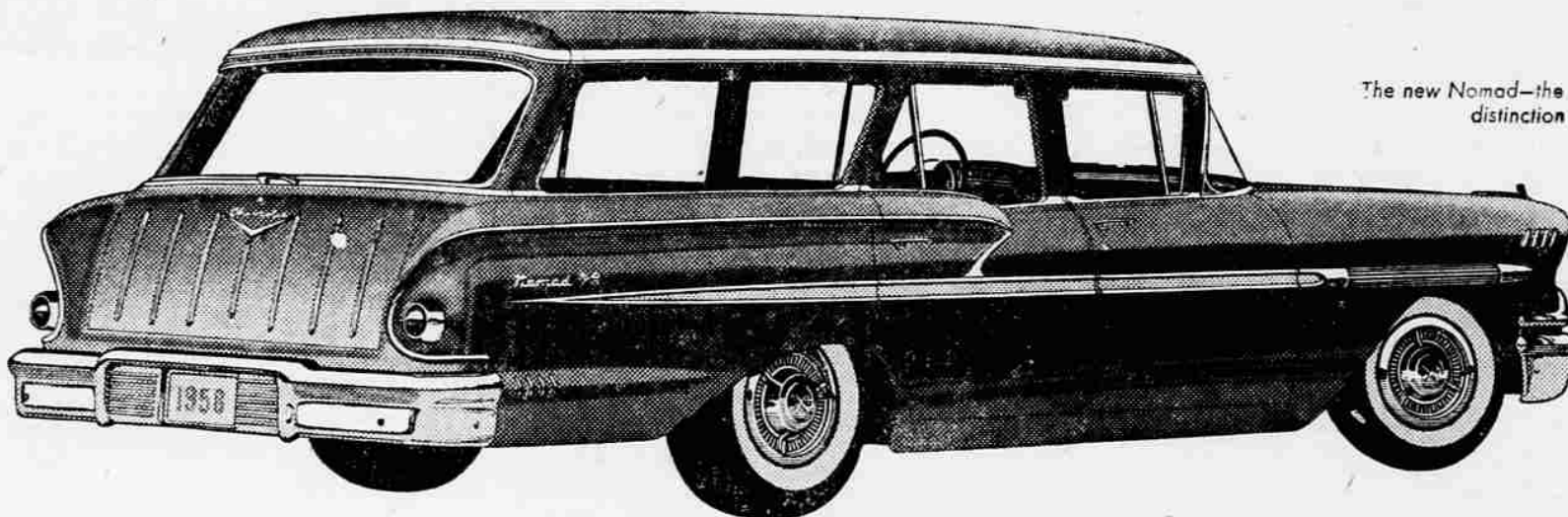
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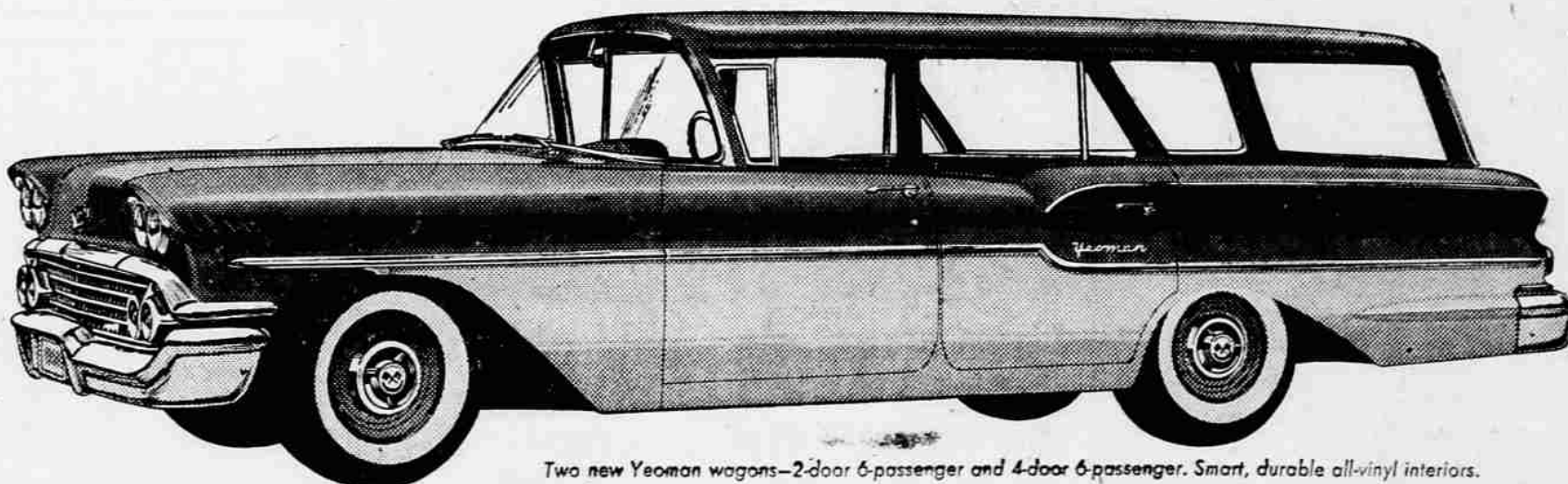
