The fullback position went to PSC's Chuck Withers, an all-around performer on offense and defense.

The All-Conference forward wall is anchored by four members of Southern Oregon's championship team. They are End Chuck Crandall, Tackle Herb Colley, Center Phil Sword and Guard Mo Jimenez. The other linemen named are End Sam Roberts of Portland State, tackle Barry Adams, OCE, Guard Jim Atkins, OCE, and Allen Jones, OTI.

The second team is dominated by underclassmen. Two seniors, three juniors and six sophomores were tabbed for honors. Southern Oregon and Oregon Tech dominated the second team with four players each. Oregon College placed two and the other spot went to Portland State.

Named to OCC ALL-Star Football Team

Redskin Owner Recalls Game Played on Dec. 7

Washington — The world's most forgotten football game was played 16 years ago yesterday. The opponents were the Washington Redskins and the Philadelphia Eagles.

A crowd of 27,102 packed Griffith Stadium for the Redskins' final game of the 1941 season.

The loudspeaker system began paging admirals, generals, cabinet officers, ambassadors and government officials. "Will so-and-so please call his office immediately?"

Sports writers in the press box got the word from their own offices — Pearl Harbor had been bombed. But owner George Preston Marshall of the Redskins refused to let the announcement be made over the public address system.

"I was afraid of panic," he recalled today. "We let individuals be paged, of course, but we had no idea what would happen if we announced that we were at war. Thousands could have been injured."

Although the cryptic paging announcements gave no detail, word of the Pearl Harbor attack seeped throughout the stadium.

"Even the players knew it," Marshall said. "Sam Baugh told me later our team was talking about it in the huddle."

By the third quarter, every news photographer but one had left the stadium. So had an estimated 3,000 spectators.

The game, which the Redskins won 20-14 was finished in almost complete silence.

Irish Drop SMU, 54-21

Dallas, Tex. — Notre Dame rode the luck of the Irish to a wild, penalty-ridden 54-21 victory over Southern Methodist Saturday by turning four interceptions and two SMU fumbles into six of its touchdown drives before 51,000 fans.

Junior quarterback Bob Williams scored twice on short plunges and sophomore halfback Pat Doyle scored 45 and 13 yards to lead the hectic Notre Dame attack. The Irish crowded four touchdowns into one nine-minute span for a 28-14 half-time lead and pulled away in the final half.

Stockton Ports to Gain Hookup With St. Louis

Stockton — The Stockton Ports of the Class C California league will have a full working agreement with the St. Louis Cardinals for the 1958 baseball season, it was announced Saturday.

The deal was approved by Vaughan P. Devine, newly-named general manager of the Cardinals, according to Stockton delegates attending the annual National Association of Minor Leagues in Colorado Springs, Colo.

Last year the Ports had a partial agreement with the Vancouver Mounties of the Pacific Coast league.

Dick Jolley and Wally Panel tied for Pilot scoring honors with 9 points each. Jim Armstrong hit 8 for the Pilots while Wayne Moss, Gary Goble and Larry Copple had 8 each for the Beavers.

Portland, which had won two straight games by lopsided scores, hit only .206 from the field while Oregon State hit .435.

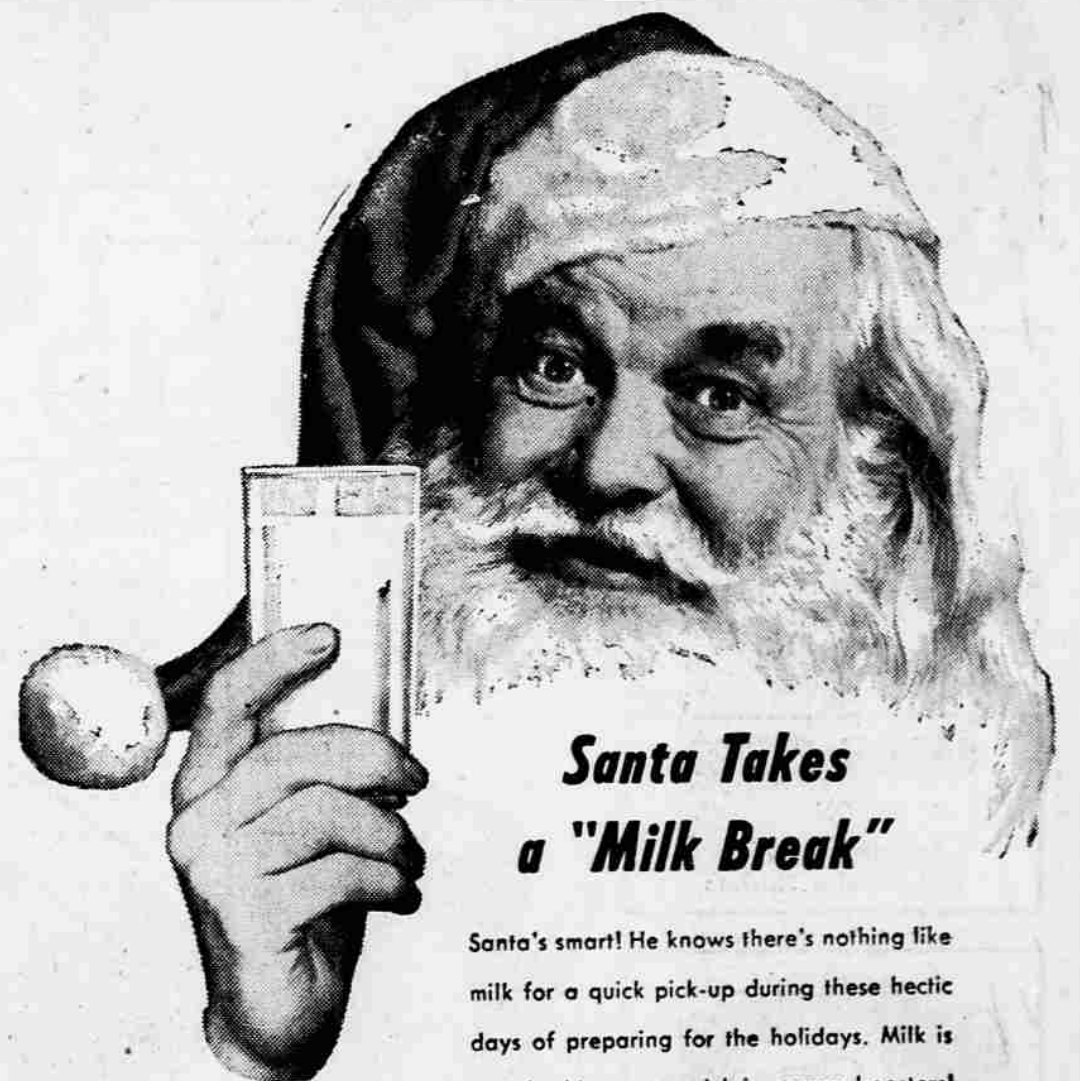

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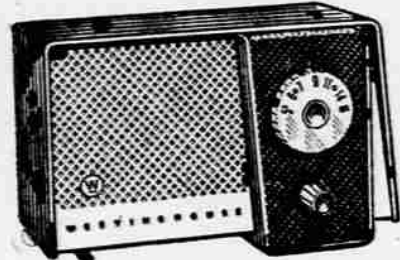
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
