

# Crater Comets Down Eureka Cagers, 43-38

Central Point — Crater high's basketball season opened Friday night on notes of fanfare and enthusiasm—and victory.

Piling up a substantial lead in the fourth quarter and staving off a strong Logger challenge, the Comets bounced Eureka, Calif., high, 43 to 38.

Coach Don Anielak's hustling, play-making Crater quint, overcame Eureka's edge in height with hard working, scrapping contention and strong second and third quarter play. The Loggers had the advantage on the backboards over the full route but the Comets did a particularly effective job of battling for the ball in the second half as they established their command.

## Allen Gets 22

Comet Forward Wayne Allen headed the scoring with 22 points, hitting the hoop both close in and from the outside for nine field goals and for nine field goals. Guard Kerman Bennett followed with 10 points while Forward Bill Chrichton tallied 10 and Guard Art Brown nine for the Loggers. Brown, shortest of the Eureka, led in backboard rebounding with 11 retrieve and Center Larry Krupka picked off nine. Forward Jerry Kime with eight and Center Randy Campbell with seven paced Crater retrieving.

The Comets ran up 12-point margins of 36 to 24 and 38 to 26 in the opening portion of the final quarter. Eureka then turned to a full-court pressing game and, with field goals by Brown and Chrichton and two free shots each by Brown and Reserve George Taggart, cut the gap to 38 to 34 midway through the canto.

## Eureka Ahead at Quarter

Allen then plunked in a drive-in goal and a free shot, then another driver to make it 43 to 34 with 70 seconds to play. Reserve Alton Saunders put in a rebound for the California team and Forward Tyrone Parker collected a pair of gift tosses with five seconds to play to wrap up the scoring.

Crater got the first marker of the contest but Eureka led 10 to 5 at the first period intermission. As the second stanza be-

gan Allen connected from the field and from the free line for 10 to 8. Krupka put in a foul heave but Allen hit two goals from the side of the free shot alley to place the Comets in front 12 to 11.

## Teeter Steals

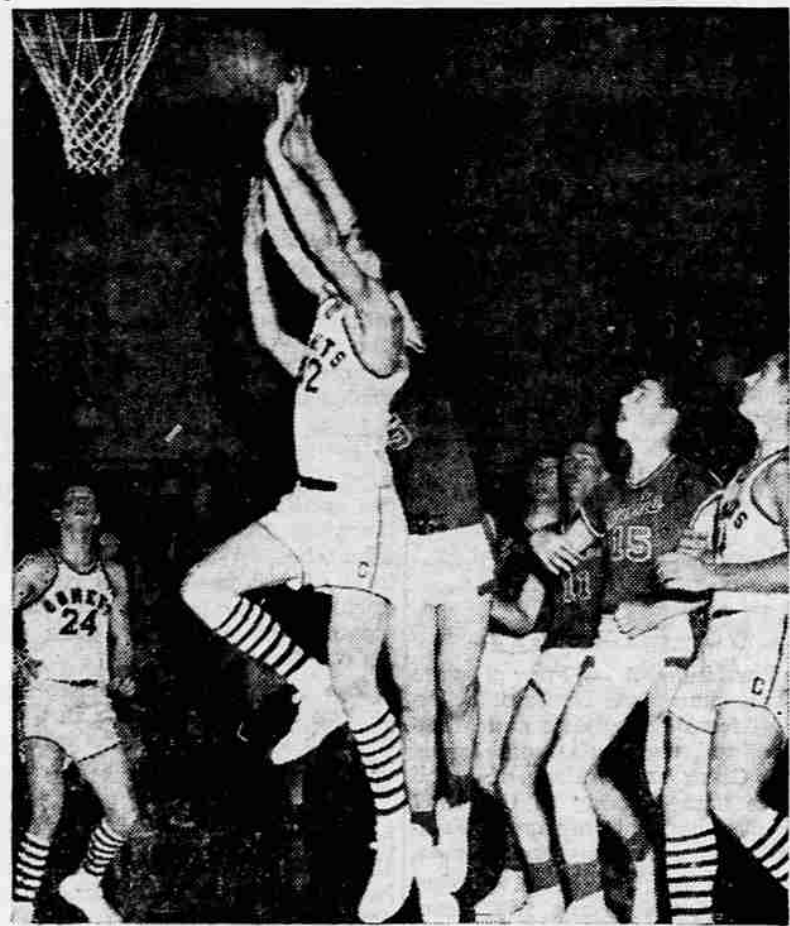
The Comets were never behind from that point on. The Loggers did tie the game at 14-all but Guard Joe Teeter stole the ball and plopped in a shot with five seconds to play in the half. That made it 16 to 14 and the Central Pointers were in the lead to stay. Count after three quarters was 30 to 22.

Home squad members wowed onlookers with a Harlem Globetrotter-type warm-up just before game-time. It involved fancy, varied and intricate passes, indicative of the coaching new mentor Anielak is giving the Comets this season. And the Crater club went through the maneuvers with an "eight-ball" colored the traditional black and white.

Starters and coaches of both clubs were introduced by use of spotlights in an otherwise darkened gym.

Eureka lightweights defeated the Crater junior varsity 46 to 30 in the prelim.

The Comets hit 14 of 47 tries from the field for .298 average, made 15 of 25 from the free

line for .600 and took 29 rebounds. Eureka was 13 for 52 for .250 in field shooting, 12 for 19 for .631 at the free line and had 40 retrieves.

## Isaac Logart Trips Ortega

Cleveland, Ohio—Cuban Isaac Logart became an 8-5 favorite against the field today to win the vacant world welter-weight crown because of his impressive victory over Mexican Gaspar Ortega in the first elimination bout.

Cocky Ike from Camaguey, Cuba—home town of welter champion Kid Gavilan—said he was "just playing around with Ortega" Friday night as his crisp, short hooks hammered out a unanimous 12-round decision at the Cleveland arena.

## Thoroughly

Stocky Ike beat lanky Ortega so thoroughly that he now is favored to win over the four remaining men in the tournament to determine a successor to Carmen Basilio. Carman gave up the 147-pound crown in September when he won the middle-weight title from Sugar Ray Robinson.

With Ortega eliminated, the other four in the tourney are Gil Turner of Philadelphia and Vince Martinez of Patterson, N.J., who doubtless will fight at Philadelphia sometime in January; and George Barnes of Australia and Virgil Atkins of St. Louis, who probably will be matched at New York in February.

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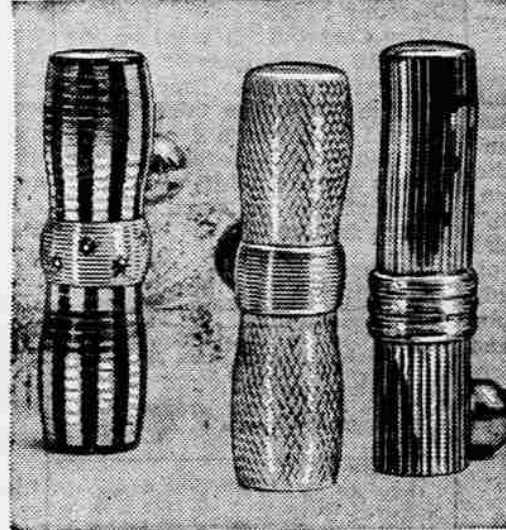
