The car set a new national speed record at the Bonneville Salt Flats during the annual speed trials Aug. 26 through Sept. 1 this year. It was driven by Roy Leslie of Denver, Colo.

Names of Drivers Whose Licenses Are Suspended Listed

Speed Record Set By Rocket Sled

China Lake, Calif. — A world record shattering speed of 2,575.1 miles per hour has been set by a rocket sled at the China Lake Naval ordnance test station.

Station Commander Capt. W. W. Hollister announced Friday the run was made recently for a test of a full-scale nose section of the sidewinder air-to-air guided missile on a monorail. The record run was made at more than three and one-half times the speed of sound.

Officials reported the sled and equipment survived the test in excellent condition.

The old track record was 2,180 miles per hour.

Surgery Of The Arteries

I recently read an interesting article by Dr. Michael E. de Bakery, of Houston, on the remarkable new science of surgery of the arteries. Such surgery is now saving the lives of hundreds of persons who formerly would have died with, perhaps, an artery plugged-up in the leg, or an artery with a blow-out (called an aneurysm).

Today, an expert will cut out the defective segment of the artery and will replace it with a graft which immediately will take over the functions of the tube. Surgeons are even replacing the arch of the aorta, the artery as big as a man's thumb that carries blood away from the heart. This operation, of course, is an extremely difficult one because during it, the circulation, particularly of the brain, must not be interrupted.

At first, when this sort of surgery was attempted, the mortality was around 20 per cent, but now Dr. de Bakery and his group have gotten it down to 3 per cent. In some cases in which the big artery which supplies a thigh and leg is almost plugged-up, the surgeon puts in a by-pass which carries the blood around the obstruction. Then the man can walk.

again without getting severe pain in his leg, he does not get gangrene, and he does not have to have to have his leg amputated. Surgeons have now performed hundreds of these operations with good results in 90 per cent of the cases.

Dr. de Bakery hopes that before long operations can be devised for restoring the circulation in the coronary artery of a man who has been left with much anginal pain after a heart attack. It may be also that some day surgeons will be restoring the blood supply to a brain crippled by a stroke.

Schizophrenia As Affected By Nationality

In a recent article in the Scientific American, Dr. Marvin K. Opler shows that there are remarkable differences in the symptoms displayed by schizophrenic men who have come from different cultures or countries. In a mental hospital he took for special study 60 schizophrenics—30 Irishmen and 30 Italians. As was expected, these two groups of men were remarkably different in their temperaments and the ways in which their insanity changed them. For instance, nearly all of the Irish were constantly tormenting themselves with preoccupations of guilt about sex; whereas few of the Italians had any worries about this subject. Two-thirds of the Irishmen had been alcoholics, as against one of the Italians. The two groups behaved very differently in regard to discipline, the Irish being quiet and well-behaved, while the Italians were excitable and over-emotional and often in conflict with authority.

The Italians had a greater tendency to hypochondria and to fixed delusions. These observations interested me because I have always marvelled at the difference in the reactions to alcohol of the Irish and the Jews. Both groups tend to be nervous and emotional, and yet, when in trouble, the Irishman commonly reaches for the bottle while the Jew practically never does. In all my 50 years of experience, I can remember only one Jewish family in which alcoholism was a curse.
