

Miss Dixie Lee Walker Wed To Fred Allen Herrmann

Gold Hill—Miss Dixie Lee Walker became the bride of Fred Allen Herrmann in a ceremony held Saturday evening, November 30 at St. Peter Evangelical Lutheran church in Medford. The Rev. Kenneth F. Korby, pastor of the church, officiated at the 8 o'clock double-ring ceremony. The bride is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Delos Walker, Gold Hill and the bridegroom is a son of Mrs. Mary Herrmann, Central Point.

The wedding color theme was blue and white. The church was decorated with white chrysanthemums in tall white baskets and two white candelabras held lighted white tapers. Bows of white ribbon were at the pews ends, and white tapers in tall aisle candlesticks also furnished light for the ceremony.

Solists were Larry Smith and his twin brother, Gary Smith, Central Point. Mrs. Richard B. Smith, Medford played the organ.

Given in marriage by her father, the bride wore a gown of white lace and tulle over white satin, fashioned with long sleeves, mandarin neckline and fitted bodice. The chapel-length bouffant skirt was scalloped at the lower edge. Her fingertip length illusion veil was held in place by a pearl crown and the bridal bouquet was a lavender orchid encircled by white stephanotis. 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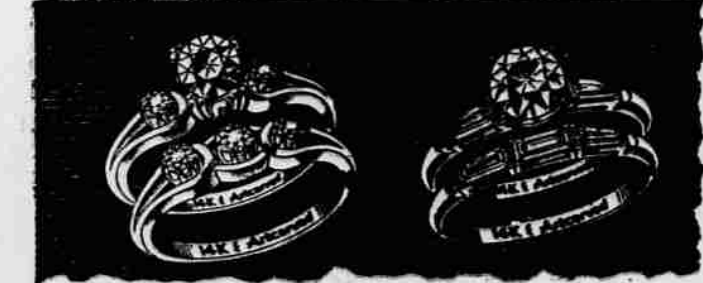
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
