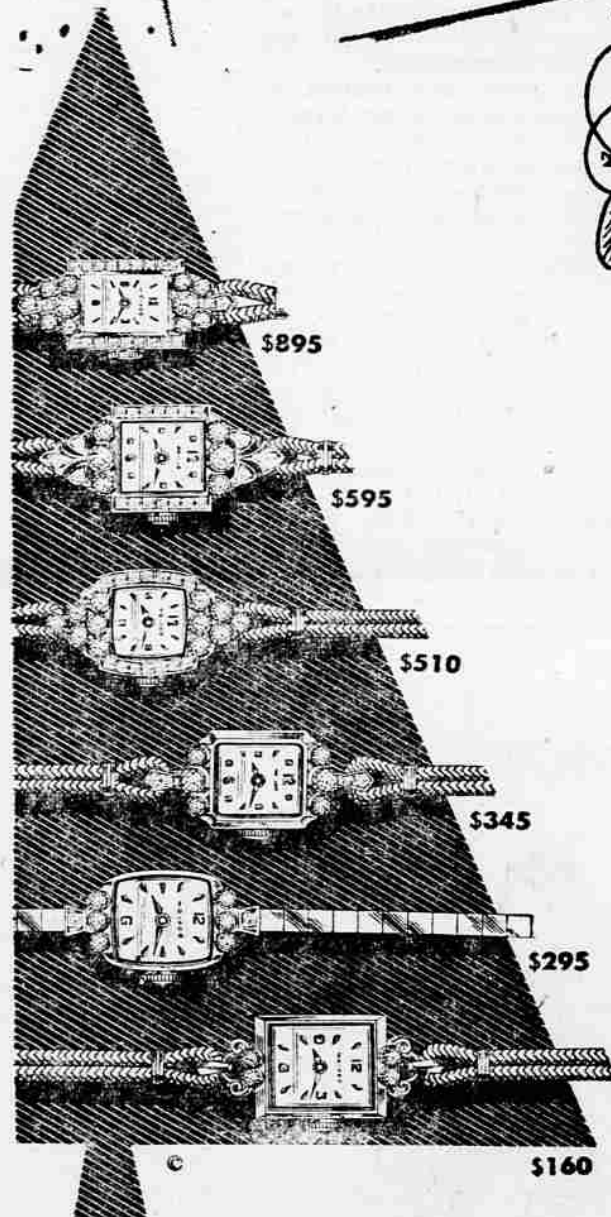
Those who cannot take gifts to the meeting are asked to leave them at Weeks and Orr store.

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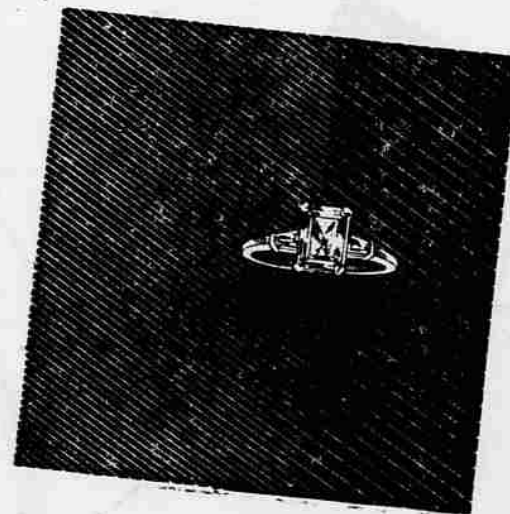


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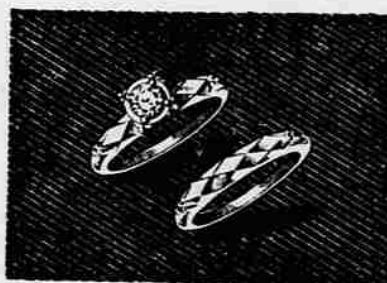


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
