Piano Teacher Newcomer Here From California

A newcomer in Medford is Mrs. Gretchen Rebok Gripp, concert pianist and teacher. Mrs. Gripp, whose son, Robert Rebok Gripp and his family recently purchased a ranch in the Valley View area, Ashland, has opened a studio here at 2209 East Main street.

Mrs. Gripp, with her late husband, Arthur Gripp, who was a nationally known violinist, conducted a studio known as the Rebok - Gripp Music studio in Santa Monica and West Los Angeles for 35 years.

Mrs. Gripp started her music studies with William Sherwood, of the Sherwood Music school of Chicago, when a small child. After many years of study with Thilo Becker, well known teacher of Los Angeles, she was chosen by Leopold Godowsky as a private student and to play in his master class. Godowsky was known as one of the greatest teachers of piano of all time.

Later Mrs. Gripp was chosen as a master class player and private pupil of Josef Lhevinne in Chicago and her husband had the honor of studying with Leopold Auer in that city.

Mrs. Gripp, known for her children's courses in piano, also attended the University of California music classes. She and Mr. Gripp both were affiliated with the university as accredited teachers. Their pupils have won many awards and scholarships to the nation's leading schools of music, such as Eastman.

During the years when the two were widely known in California's music circles, Mr. Gripp was director of instrumental music in the Santa Monica schools. They organized the Music Arts society in that city, the Civic Music guild, the Civic Symphony orchestra, a children's concert series and worked with other organizations. As program chairman of the Music Arts society, Mrs. Gripp was responsible for bringing internationally known artists to the community.

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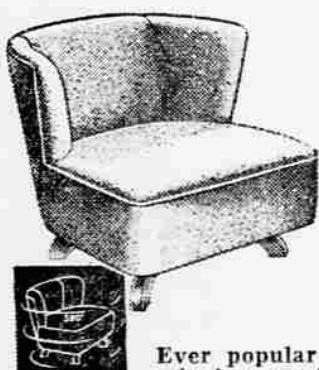
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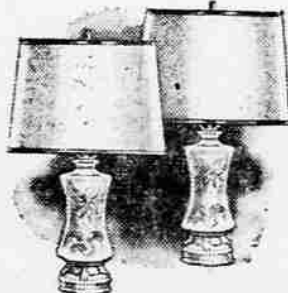
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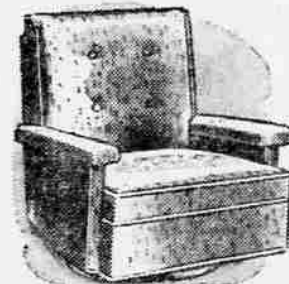
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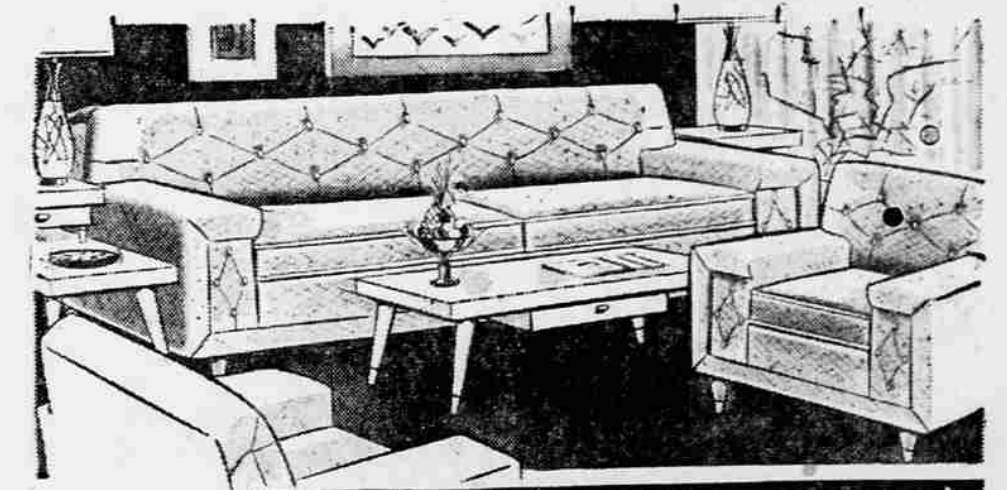


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
