Neuberger Urges New Postal Policy

Portland—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) Friday said Congress should adopt a modern postal policy which enumerates the public services to be paid for out of general revenue instead of being charged to mail users through increased postal rates.

Neuberger addressed a special committee of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers association here. He expressed opposition to certain provisions of the mail rate increase bill passed by the House earlier this year and now pending in the Senate. He declared that "the present administration is asking our people to pay more money for less service. It is asking the public to pay a premium for built-in waste and inefficiency."

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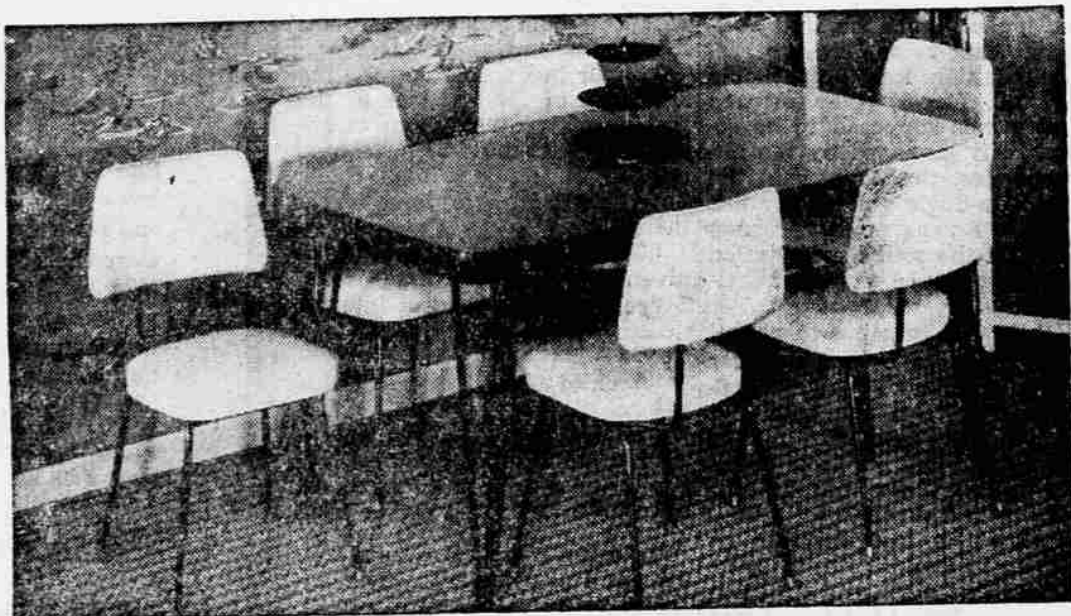
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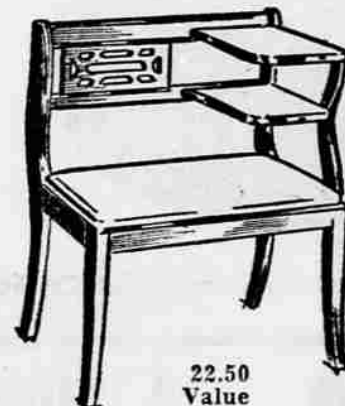
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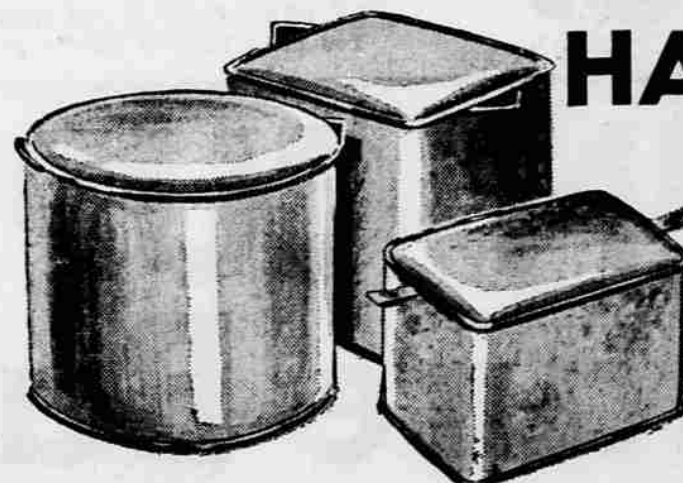


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
