 Cleveland is ready to play the 1937 National Football league championship game but the Detroit Lions, San Francisco 49ers and Baltimore Colts are tied for the Western division lead. It may be 1938 before they untangle and provide a title rival for the Browns.

Here's how the week end action gave the Browns the 11th division title in their 12-year history and left half the Western division clubs tied for first.

The Browns, enjoying the type of good fortune that helped build pro football's finest record, won the Eastern crown for the seventh time in eight tries while watching television Saturday at Detroit as the Pittsburgh Steelers eliminated the New York Giants, 21-10.

Pittsburgh did the Browns a big favor because the Lions handed Cleveland a 20-7 defeat Sunday. New York's hopes of retaining the league and Eastern division titles would have been alive if it had won at Pittsburgh.

Washington Redskins romp against the Philadelphia Eagles.

The Forty-Niners entertain the Packers next Sunday. Of the Western leaders, San Francisco appears to have the best chance in the finals. The Lions, whose Bobby Layne was carried out of the Cleveland clash with a broken right ankle bone, haven't downed the Bears at Chicago since 1953. The Colts have won only one of 11 previous games on the west coast.

If all the Western leaders win next Sunday, a series of play-offs will force postponement of the championship game from Dec. 29 to Jan. 5. The Browns will warm up for the title game by visiting the Giants next Sunday.

Mistrial Declared On Murder Trial

Grants Pass — The first degree murder trial here of retired U.S. Army Major Felix J. Brame, 46, of Grants Pass, was declared a mistrial Friday by Circuit Judge O. J. Millard.

Brame is accused of the gun-shot death of his estranged wife, Marguerite, also 46, last July 10 in front of her Grants Pass home.

The mistrial ruling came after a motion charging that a woman juror had discussed the trial with her husband and another person was filed by Josephine County District Attorney Max McMillin.

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Red Raiders Subdue Humboldt Five 61-52

Ashland — Southern Oregon college made a clean sweep of its season starting basketball series by whacking Humboldt State college 61 to 52 in the dedication conflict for the new Red Raider gymnasium Saturday night.

The Raiders had inaugurated use of their spacious court Friday by clipping the HSC Lumberjacks 64 to 49.

In the Saturday contention Southern Oregon took the lead in the opening moments and kept in front all the way. The Ashland collegians had good margins at times but were frequently challenged and pressed by the 'Jacks from Arcata, Calif. And statistics gave evidence of a fairly even battle except at the gift toss line where the Raiders picked up their victory bulge.

Midway through the final half the Raiders had a 14-point 44 to 30 spread but Humboldt, in a surge sparked by Jerry Hathaway, whittled down the gap to four counters at 52 to 48 with just 3 1/3 minutes left in the fracas.

Threat Stopped
 Bill Hollingsworth then got a free shot for SOC, Dave D'Olive put in a jumper from the arch back of the free throw line and Hollingsworth tallied on the fast break for a lead of 57 to 48. Larry Taylor hit for HSC from far afield and Joe Miller got two charity throws for 57 to 52 but Hollingsworth put in two gifters and D'Olive a rebounder to round out the scoring.

Taylor was high point man for the tussle with 18 counters. His long shots were a big factor in keeping the 'Jacks in the game but at the same time indicated SOC defensive strength close into the hoop. Hollingsworth had 15 points and D'Olive 14.

The clubs came out even in the rebounding department. D'Olive with 18 and Cliff Sutherland with 14 headed the Raiders while Warren Baker pulled off 13 for Humboldt.

Although Southern Oregon was more accurate shooting from the field, with .322 average to Humboldt's .266, the teams tied in field goals with 20 each. However, the Raiders made 21 of 31 tosses at the gift stripe while the Lumberjacks had 16 chances and made 12.

The Raiders put in seven points before HSC scored and the closest the 'Jacks got at any time during the evening was

four markers. Halftime standing was 26 to 14.

15-Point Spread

Widest SOC advantage of the evening was 15 points at 33 to 18. The Arcata, Calif., club cut it to an eight span at 33 to 25, 35 to 27 and 37 to 29. From there the Raiders gained their 44 to 30 edge.

Hathaway collected nine points in the rally that enabled Humboldt to press the Raiders in the closing moments. Ed Thomas and Taylor both goaled on steals in this last big Lumberjack effort.

Members of the 1936-1937 basketball squad and their coach, Jean Eberhart were special guests at the game and gym dedication. Dr. Roy McNeal, SOC professor of geography and one time coach at the school, gave the dedication address. Dr. Alex Petersen, assistant professor of physical education, was master of ceremonies.

Frank Van Dyke, Medford attorney and president of the Western Interstate commission for Higher Education, introduced the honor team which played the first game in the former gymnasium which is now the Britt student center. Dr. Elmo Stevenson, president of Southern Oregon college, was also a speaker.

Eugene — Oregon made it two straight over Utah State in basketball here Saturday night with an easy 78-49 victory.

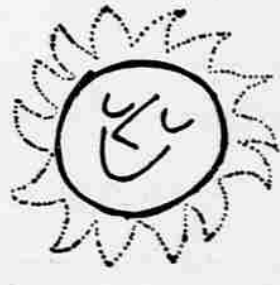
Oregon opened up a 39-24 halftime lead and the Duck reserves kept pouring in the buckets in the second half to overcome the visitors.
