

Green Peas Rated Favorite Vegetable

New York —P— Green peas take the honors as America's favorite vegetable.

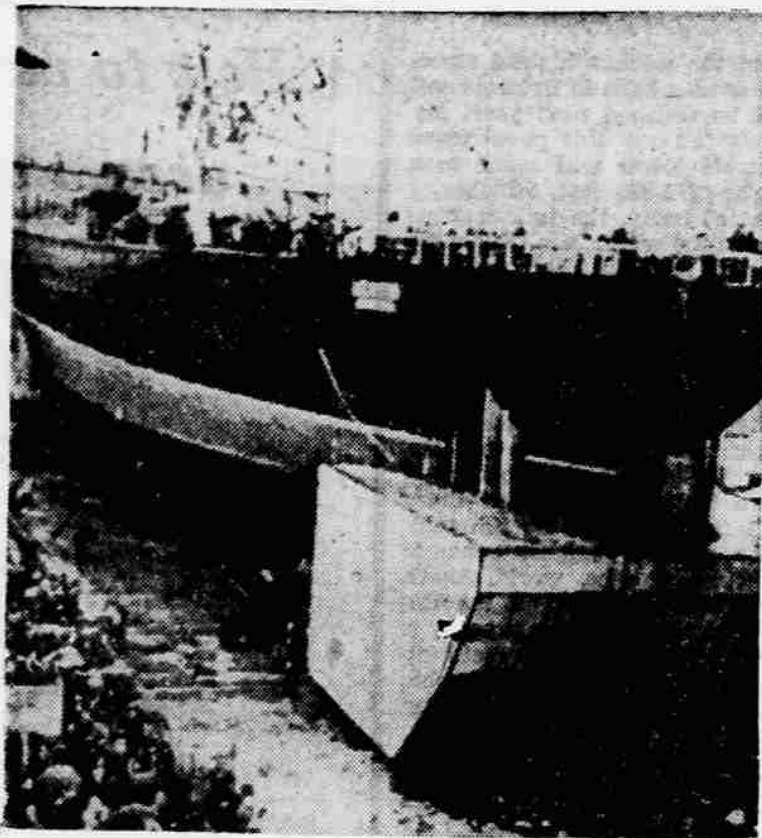
A study of national frozen food sales showed 16 per cent of the consumers preferred peas. Slightly more than 12 per cent chose snap beans. Potatoes ranked third with nearly 12 per cent. Lima beans got 11 per cent, spinach 8 per cent, broccoli 7 per cent, and corn more than 6 per cent.

Mixed vegetables and asparagus came next, trailed by cauliflower, brussels sprouts, peas and carrots combined, succotash, okra, chopped collards, black-eyed peas, squash and turnip greens. Kale came last.

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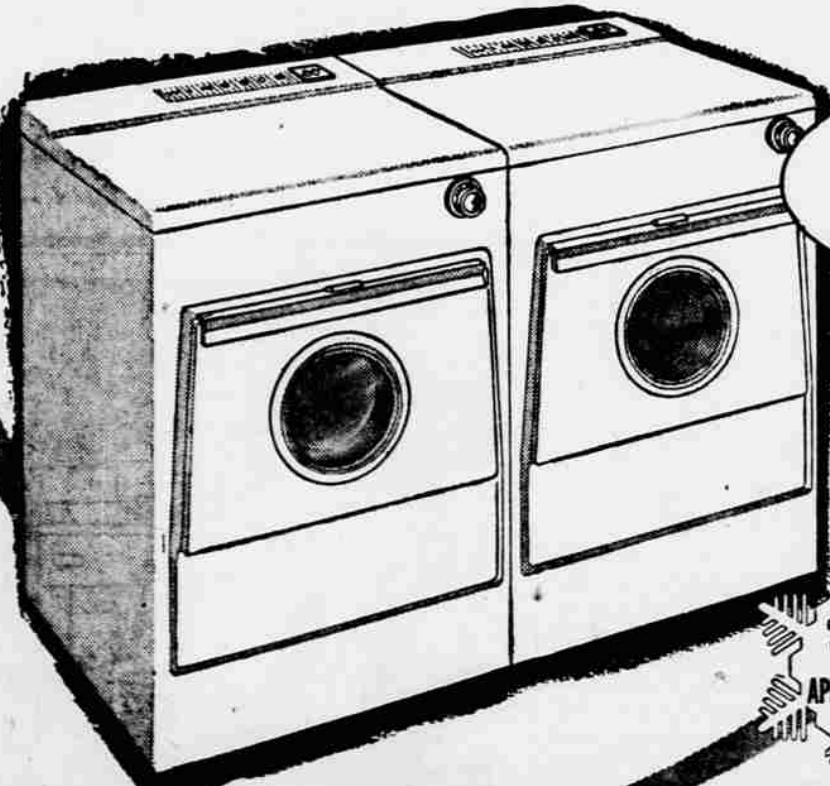
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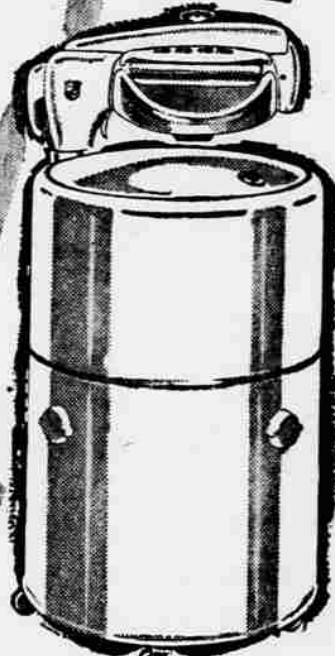
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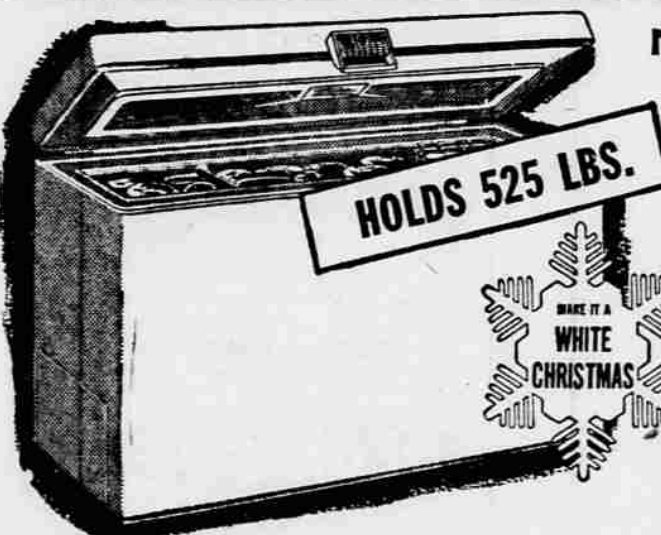
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
