War, with its crippling and maiming of humanity, always teaches the tremendous power of persistence. Humans, crippled and scarred, become useful citizens through courage and perseverance. They, perhaps more than whole folk, know that people who refuse to quit become holders of records in life despite obstacles to be overcome.

Why do we quit? Why are we quitters, often in sight of the goal?

Psychologists suggest that quitters have the "will to fail." They actually fear to succeed. They protect themselves against the possibility of being hurt in a possible failure by inviting that failure, by anticipating it through quitting. Success might involve them in even more strenuous and fearful effort — and they are terrified at the thought of more effort and more uncertainty of outcome.

Quitting is an easy way to terminate a situation or effort which looms too large before them. It saves the participants from further effort, and at the same time always offers the comforting possibility that they could have won if only they had "followed through." People who stop just short of a goal usually find much comfort in the philosophy that they could have succeeded if they had tried — but they did not try.

You can always hold out a little longer. There is always an unexpected good around the corner. The man who stays in there trying often finds success when he least expects it.

Don't be afraid to persevere, afraid to succeed! One more attempt may reach your goal. Quitters lose both their goal and themselves!

Brattleboro, Vt. — Twenty top-quality Holsteins from Wisconsin and Illinois have been sent to new pastures in South America. Nineteen heifers and one bull were selected for export to Caracas, Venezuela, to help improve the herds there.

Steak With A Difference
New York — Steak treat: marinate the steak with a combination of olive oil, lemon juice, crushed garlic, salt and pepper before broiling.

Water Chesnuts Good With Turkey Leftovers

New York — Turn left-over turkey into hash with water chestnuts and serve with toasted English muffins or rolls, cranberry relish or tossed salad.

Mince 4 cups cooked turkey, add 1 cup light cream and simmer 30 minutes or until cream is nearly absorbed. Add ½ teaspoon salt, ¼ teaspoon of poultry seasoning, and ½ cup sliced chestnuts.

Mix 1 tablespoon of butter and 1 tablespoon of flour into a paste. Add 1 cup of turkey

broth and bring to boil 1 minute. Mix ½ of the paste and turkey broth in the hash and save the rest for topping.

Spread the hash in a greased, shallow baking casserole and keep warm in oven. Add slightly beaten egg to remaining sauce and mix well. Whip ¼ cup of whipping cream over hash and put under broiler about 2 inches from the flame. Broil 5 to 10 minutes, or until the top is brown and bubbly. Serves 8 to 10.

Newton, Ill. — Mrs. Norma Eaton, Newton attorney, traveled by airplane, train, bus, station wagon and boat around the world in 79 days.

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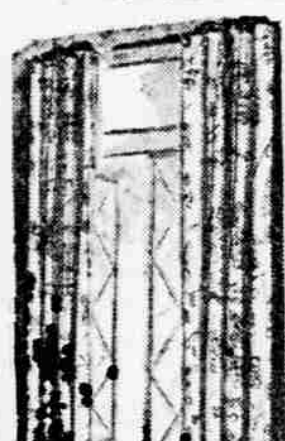
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
