Too hot, cooked Brussels sprouts with bacon fat, salt and pepper, put into serving dish and sprinkle crumbled bacon on top.

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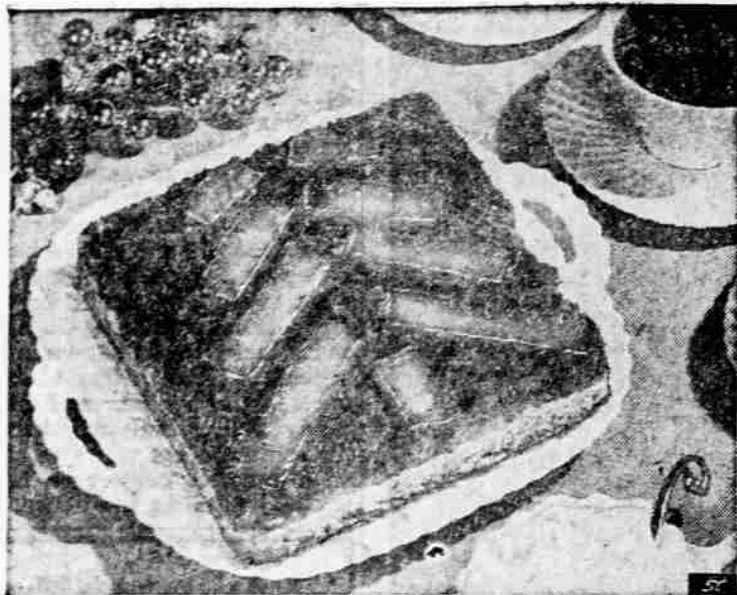
Everybody wants SLIPPERS for Christmas

At Christmastime even the simplest baked foods are given a festive note. See how the tried and true pineapple upside-down cake is decked out for the season with spears of pineapple arranged Christmas-tree fashion on the tender, moist cake.

For the Christmas-tree cake use 1/4 cup shortening, 3/4 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, 1 1/4 cups sifted cake flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt and 1/2 cup milk. Cream shortening and sugar. Add egg and vanilla and mix well. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Add alternately with milk. Blend thoroughly.

For topping use 1/4 cup melted butter or margarine, 1/2 cup brown sugar, packed, canned pineapple spears.

Mix melted butter and sugar. Pour into 8x8x2 inch pan. Arrange pineapple spears on top of the butter-sugar mixture in the design of a Christmas tree.

Pour batter over topping and pineapple. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 50 minutes. Cool slightly. Invert on cake plate while still warm. Cut in squares. Serve with whipped cream.

New Ski Wear Said Colorful; Red Is Popular

Boston — Fashion starts with red flannels in new ski wear.

Colors and prints, usually reserved for after-ski clothes, now show in under-ski wear and styles for the slopes. The long woolies come in peppermint stripes, plus a variety of colors.

Next to the red, the most prominent color this year is blue. You can buy it in everything from parkas to ear muffs.

Skin-tight ski pants seem to glow in one unusual shade of blue. "These pants are stunning. But you must have an unusually good figure to wear them," said Donald S. Levy, a ski-togs buyer.

But Levy predicted 80 per cent of the girls will stick to the traditional ski outfit—black or navy trousers and a colorful parka or jacket. Parkas, worn as windbreakers over heavy sweaters, are made of tightly woven nylon or cotton.

"Snow bunnies" The season's unusual jackets come in colorful paisley prints. Other types include a white Norwegian jacket, embroidered with blue flowers.

Buyers expect a big demand for warm ski togs for "snow bunnies"—girls who limit their skiing to lounging by the fire at ski resorts.

These girls make up a large proportion of guests at hundreds of resorts which dot the northern New England countryside.

"Snow bunnies" go for warm slacks and sweaters for brief sojourns into beginners' classes, said resort managers. For after-ski time, they choose bright, woven Tyrolean skirts and soft sweaters. Tapered slacks and bright sweaters or white "boy shirts" are popular for after-dinner wear.

The most popular item is expected to be the bulky knit sweater, said one buyer. Many of these are imported from Italy. More than half of the sweaters sold will be white, she predicted.

Color also touches boots. Loden boots come in shaggy brushed green leather with brass buckles or white grained leather trimmed with a red leather exclamation point.

Dip white thread in tea to give it an aged look when mending old fabrics.

Christmas Soup

Let the artist in the family cut pimiento stars for a garnish for the Christmas-looking soup. It's a beautiful delicate green color and fluffy clouds of salted whipped cream add a real festive note. Mix together one can each of turtle soup and green pea soup and dilute according to directions on the can. Cover and place on a low flame, heating slowly to allow the flavors to blend. Just before serving, add a tablespoon or two of sherry. Serve in warm cups or soup bowls, with salted almonds and thin crackers.

Kitchen Time Saver

Cut down on clean-up time by using a plastic bag for rolling cracker crumbs. You can see through the bag when the crumbs are fine enough. It keeps the crumbs off the counter-top and floor. Home economists at the Gas Appliance Manufacturers association wash plastic bags in the automatic washer and tumble them in a cool clothes dryer. It is wise to place the bags in a mesh bag so the small ones won't get lost.
