'Toys for Taiwan' Project Delights Formosa Children

Washington—A project that surely will gladden the hearts of all during the Yuletide season is "Toys for Taiwan."

On Nov. 1, a shipload of toys, candy, dolls and clothing left here on the first lap of a journey to the children of the Far East.

Under sponsorship of the Department of Virginia Auxiliary of the American Veterans of World War II and Korea (AM-VETS), an area resident appeal Oct. 7 produced 300 dolls, 1,500 toys, clothing and cartons of candy and chewing gum.

Mrs. Marie Fawley, president of the Auxiliary, was the guiding light in the drive, assisted greatly by Maj. Gen. James Dreyfus, chief of the Foreign Aid Branch of the Signal Corps and his staff.

Started in Korea
Mrs. Fawley was inspired to spearhead the project after reading a magazine article by Sfc. Werner Krenzer, presently assigned to the Military Assistance Advisory Group in Pakistan.

She wrote to the sergeant for details of articles needed and the process for shipping. He replied that the drive had begun when he was stationed in Korea in 1952. He was sent to Taiwan, Formosa, in December of 1955, where the welfare work was continued. When he left in 1956 it was taken over by Maj. Ernest Brass.

Mrs. Fawley reported that there had been many cash donations.

"The money contributed largely by persons who have no children and so have no left-over toys to donate, was used to purchase more toys, plus chewing gum and candy," she said.

Nov. 1 was the deadline for the shipment in order for the gifts to reach Taiwan in time to be distributed to orphanages and refugees by Christmas. The Church World Service, Inc., offered to handle all shipping arrangements.

"The Chinese children, so humble by their very nature, are so delighted by it all," wrote Krenzer. "And to the American servicemen who play the role of Santa, it will remain an unforgettable memory."
