SINUS INFECTIONS

Many persons tend to get acute infections of their sinuses, usually during a bad cold, or after swimming or diving in a tank, the water of which is full of germs. One can usually tell when one has such an infection by the presence of an ache in one cheek, or back of the nose. Soon, large amounts of yellow pus will be blown out of the nose several times a day.

If the person is lucky, the acute infection clears up in two or three weeks; if he or she is not lucky, some infection remains for months.

In the old days, nose specialists used to operate again and again, trying to clean out all of the diseased bone in the sinuses, but their results were too often bad, the patient winding up with an uncomfortable, bad-smelling and cavernous nose. Often, today, the doctor can do something to improve the drainage from a sinus. He may straighten a crooked septum so that air can go back and forth more easily and secretions can run out. Often, when the chronic infection is in an antrum (a cavity in the cheek bone), a little window can be made so that the pus can drain out into the nose. Then often the patient gets well.

A Festering Navel
Mothers of children sometimes

ask what is wrong with a child's navel when it keeps discharging. I think, probably, what has happened is that the tube that in the fetus runs through the abdomen has not closed as it should. In such a case, a surgeon can effect a cure.

Dermatomyositis

Many people ask me what to do for dermatomyositis, and about all I can say is, "Go to a good, wise skin specialist." Dermatitis refers to skin and myo means muscle, so the disease is an inflammation of an area of skin and the muscles underlying it. There are a number of diseases perhaps related to dermatomyositis, the nature of which we physicians are only beginning to understand.

Hemorrhage Into The Eye

Quite a few elderly persons wonder if anything can be done to restore sight taken away by a hemorrhage into the background of the eye, or perhaps by a plugging-up of the main artery that runs to the eye. I'm sorry to say that I doubt if anything curative is likely to be done for such conditions. The part of the eye that is supplied by the blood vessel is probably destroyed and, naturally, no one can hope to build it up again.
