Students Taste Way Through University

Champaign, Ill.—The University of Illinois doesn't have much trouble finding volunteers for one of its research projects here—members of "taste panels."

No matter how nutritious food may be, the food researchers report, if it is not tasty all the work of building proper nutrition into various foods is wasted. People won't eat it.

Consequently the researchers set up a taste-testing laboratory, complete with a kitchen and expert cooks to taste test various foods. The taste panel members sit in individual booths, with even the light carefully controlled, and sample foods for appearance, color, texture, flavor and general acceptability.

They also judge the same food in natural daylight. The ratings of various foods often are different just from the result of viewing them in various kinds of light, the researchers report.
