Unlocked Wards In Mental Hospitals

I recently read an article by Dr. L. C. Hurst, of Hertfordshire, England, who tells about the big efforts being made in the English mental hospitals to unlock the doors of some of the wards in which the more rational patients are kept. As was to be expected, when doors were left open, some of the patients wandered off and had to be brought back, but it was remarkable how few there were who took French leave. Around one hospital they put a wire fence just to keep confused people from rambling aimlessly away and getting lost. Naturally, unlocking the doors makes the patients feel much happier. This plan is being tried out and with success in a number of American mental hospitals.

A New Drug for High Blood Pressure

Recently, Dr. Robert W. Wilkins and Dr. William Hollander, of Boston, reported the use of a new drug called chlorothiazide for the treatment of high blood pressure. They say that it works better than anything they have found so far, and they say it has helped people who had not been helped by other drugs. It also works well when used with some of the other available drugs. Its use also promises to help us doctors in understanding the mechanism of high blood pressure. It is a powerful diuretic or remover of unneeded water from the body, and so it should be very helpful to persons who are dropsical.

Hereditary and the Toxemia of Pregnancy

Dr. J. C. Humphries, of Baltimore, has reported that the terrifying toxemia of pregnancy, eclampsia with high blood pressure, which can cause convulsions and even death to a mother and the child she is about to bear, tends to be hereditary. The doctor found that 28 of a group of mothers who had suffered from toxemia were themselves born after toxemic pregnancy.

Help for Backache
According to Doctors M. H. Dubansky and C. B. Larson, of the State University of Iowa, Iowa City, one of the best exercises to relieve many backaches is one in which a person lies on his stomach on a table with his legs and thighs held down by someone. His body projects away from the table. Repeatedly, he lets his trunk fall down, and then raises it up again to the horizontal position, using his hips as a hinge. This, of course, is a wonderful exercise for the back muscles, and the doctors say that in many a case it will cure backache in about 3 weeks. The Hollywood Scene

Hollywood—What to look for on the TV-movie front in 1958:

More movie theaters will close as TV runs away with an increasingly large segment of the national audience. Disappearance of "B" pictures. Movies will stick with super-colossal such as "Sayonara" and "Peyton Place" and Grade "Z" exploitation horror pictures.

An increase in sales of film backlogs from major studios to TV, thus hurting further the long-suffering boxoffice. Race for "Don Quixote". Several versions of "Don Quixote" as Mike Todd, Orson Welles and two European producers race to complete the epic.

A possible merger of MGM and 20th Century-Fox Studios. Closing of Universal-International Studios—last of the big lots to convert to TV films. The sale of Republic Studios to NBC-TV.

Economy drives in both TV and pictures with severe personnel cuts at the studios.

Boom in Tapes. A boom in electronic tape recording for TV shows, increasing the clarity and reproduction of network shows—a big improvement over today's "hot kinescopes" which are seen via film.

NBC promises more color shows, but its parent organization, RCA-Victor, sees no cut in cost of color TV sets. The network also offers "The Shirley Temple Story Book" for the coming year in addition to two new horse operas and an adventure series titled "Northwest Passage."

CBS will introduce a lady cop in "The Sergeant and the Lady" series and a flock of new situation comedies which will make a comeback in 1958.

ABC will truly become a third "major" network with the completion of a \$30 million addition to its Hollywood studios. The Web also will add Orson Welles to its team of performers, along with Sid Caesar and Imogene Coca.

Look for several musical-varie-

ty shops to drop from sight as a result of low ratings.

Success of Desi Arnaz and Dick Powell in video production has stirred Burt Lancaster and his independent company to move into TV.

Greta Garbo will make a movie for the first time in two decades.

Both studio and network bigwigs predict further experimentation in pay TV as a way out of the financial woods for both mediums.

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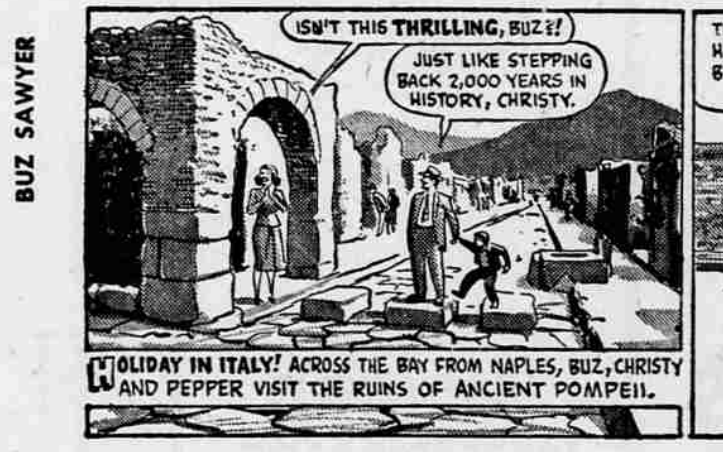
