The measure is supported by leagues throughout the state and will appear on the November ballot. Mrs. Ben Day heads the committee for the Medford group.

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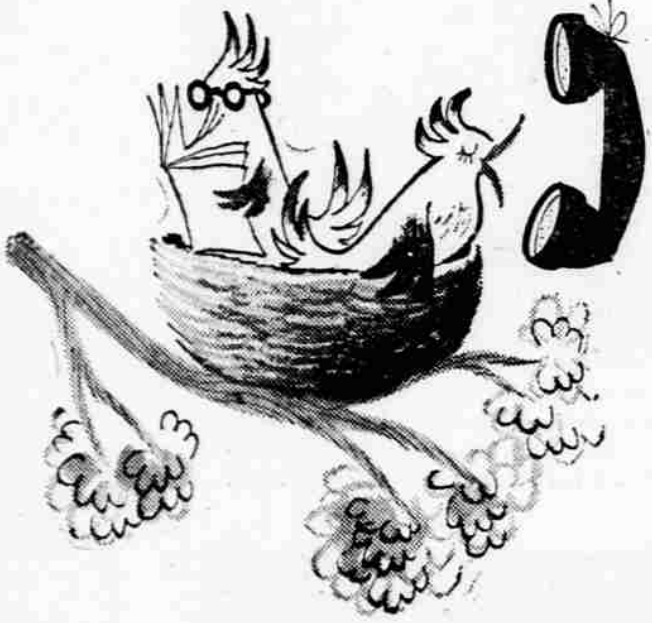
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
