Hardboard Mill Seen at Swisshome

Washington — A spokesman for an Oregon lumber firm said here today that financing was virtually assured for a \$2 1/2 million hardboard mill at Swisshome, Ore.

Rep. Charles O. Porter (D-Ore.) commented that the plant proposed by the Haskins Lumber Company would be a significant boost to the economy of the Swisshome area. The Haskins officials said hardboard markets have remained firm despite slumps in lumber sales. He said the 100-ton Swisshome mill would be the basis for coordinating all the scattered Haskins operations.

Naval Bomber Smashes House

Norfolk, Va. — Four charred bodies were removed Monday night and early today from a big Navy patrol bomber that dropped "smack in the middle" of a two-story house in a beachside resort area.

Twelve other persons were injured, two seriously, when the plane swooped over the rooftops of five other cottages late Monday, scattering shingles and debris in a wide area. Two of the eight crewmen were hospitalized in serious condition.

A Navy investigating board was to be appointed today to try to determine what caused the plane to lose power as it approached the Norfolk Naval Air Station for a landing.

Ex-Idaho Governor To Return to Ranching

Boise — Former Idaho Gov. Len Jordan is going back to his first love—ranching. He and his wife have acquired a substantial block of stock in the Circle C Ranch, Inc., north of New Meadows, Corporation President Rollie Campbell disclosed.

Only 20 feet of the plane's tail protruded from the house. Four civilians, including a teen-aged boy, were slightly hurt by the flying debris. Four Children Die In Utah House Fire

Moab, Utah — Four children, including twins, burned to death Monday night when fire leveled their frame home near this southeastern Utah uranium boom town.

Parents of the youngsters, Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth McGahey, fled from the house in their night clothes and escaped with minor cuts and burns.

Fire Chief Marvin Cleaver said firemen arrived minutes after a neighbor of the McGaheys sounded the alarm, but the entire house and a car parked near it already were engulfed in flames.

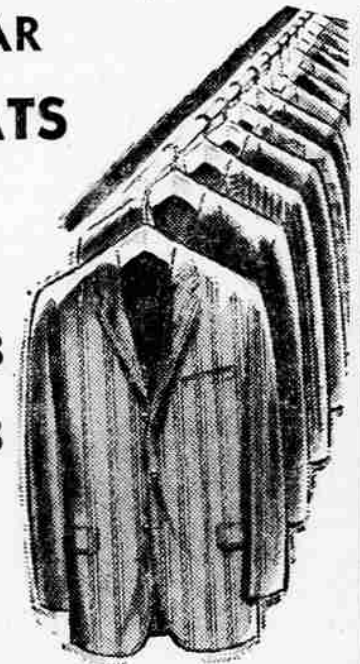
