Since then he has been just terrible. There are constant fights and he was abusive to the children. My eldest daughter got married, mainly to get out of the house.

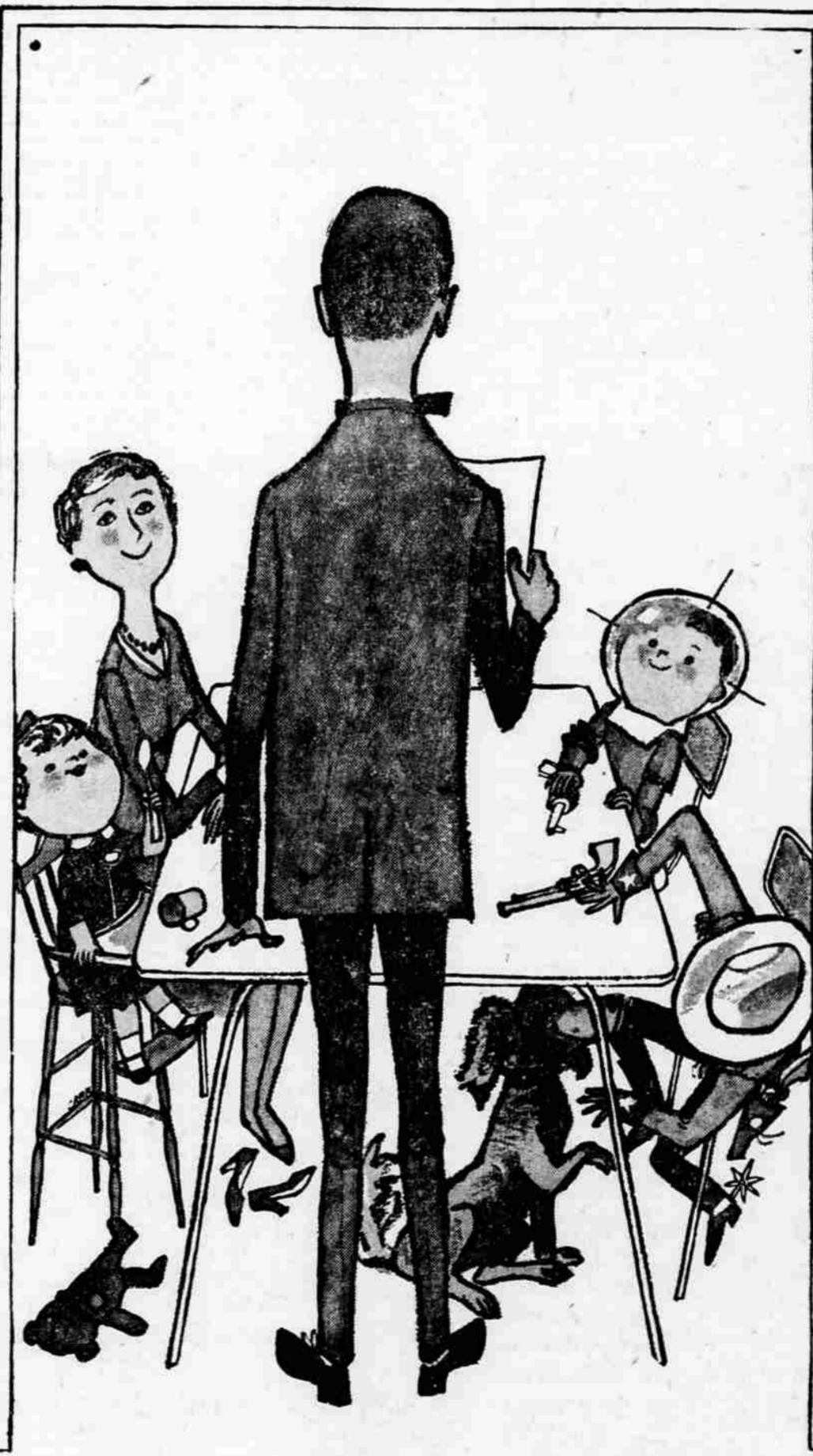
The serving committee included the Houstons and Littlefields.
