Hollywood — Edward G. Robinson Jr. has been cold, stone sober for six straight months, an achievement that has eluded the 24-year-old son of the movie "mobster" since he was a juvenile delinquent of 15.

To his background of actor, alcoholic and jailbird, young Robinson adds the title "author." And it's possible his autobiography may clear the way for a normal life in the future.

Junior's fortunes already

are looking up. He read the galley proofs in the pokey while serving 60 days on a drunk rap.

Expresses Optimism "I think I'm finally over the hump now," the beetle-browed Robinson said, sipping on a lemonade. "But then I've said that in the past only to have my life go to pieces again. This time I feel like an individual instead of the son of 'Little Caesar.'"

"I do feel closer to my dad, and he seems to have some respect for me." According to Eddie — his friends call him "Manny" — Robinson Sr. has been the bugaboo of his mixed up past.

Wanted Recognition

"My life might have been happier and less complicated if I'd been anyone else's son," he says. "I always hungered for some recognition of my own. It's been a great disadvantage for me to be his boy. But I'm still proud of him, and I realize that I caused most of my troubles myself."

Trouble? This kid invented the word. Junior has been in jail uncounted times. He cost a companion an eye in an auto wreck and served time for drunk driving.

He was thrown out of the family home when he was 17 years old, attempted suicide at 22 and was divorced by his wife, Frances, when he was 23.

Shows in His Face Robinson tells all in his

book, "My Father—My Son." The things he has left out are written on his face — the tragedy of a spoiled kid who thought he had the world by the tail simply because his father was a movie star.

There is hurt in his eyes. He looks at people hoping they will say a friendly word. He behaves as if this might be his last opportunity to straighten himself out. Meeting him, you feel as though you want to help.

"I'm trying to get back on my feet," he sighed. "I guess I had to hit rock bottom before I could start going up again, clearing away the wreckage."
