Listeners Protest 'French Line' Show

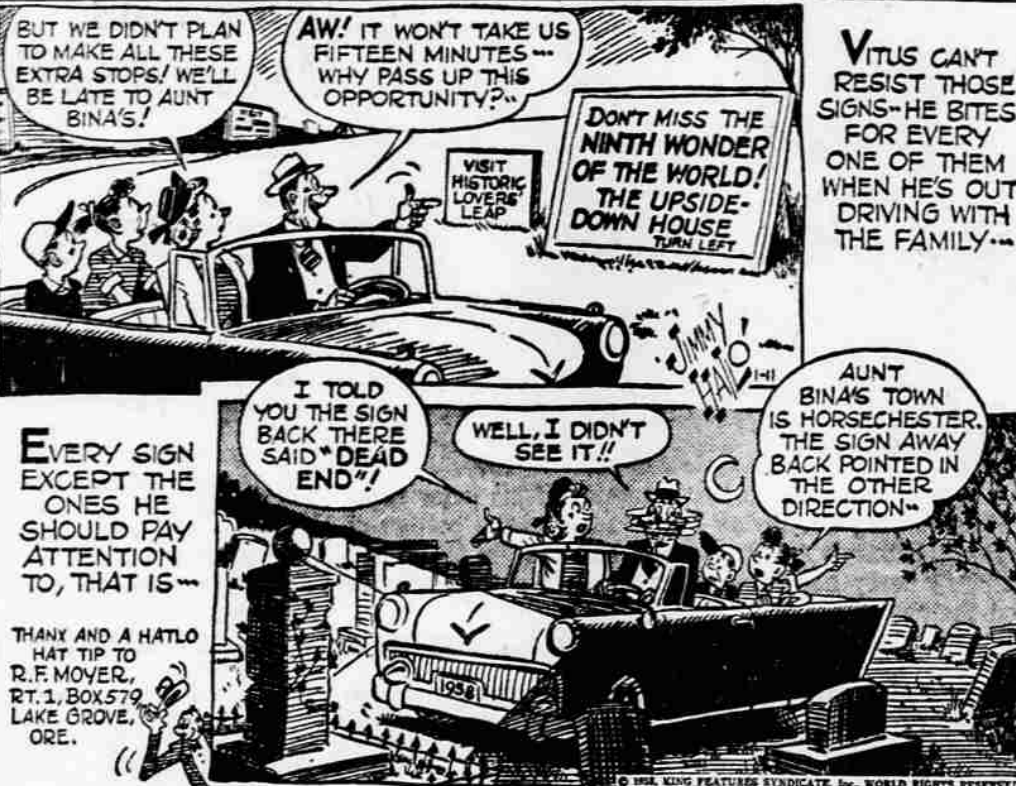
Portland — A Portland television station Friday night succumbed to the pressure of some 1400 listener protests and delayed airing of a controversial movie until all juvenile viewers were presumably in bed.

Frank Riordan, manager of Station KPTV, said one thousand and four hundred letters protesting the scheduled showing of the film "French Line" prompted the station to delay its late movie until midnight. Those who protested the Jane Russell movie asserted it was immoral.

Riordan said "I don't see anything immoral in the movie, but we made the schedule out of deference to those who called and wrote us."

Publisher's Talk Said To Draw Criticism

Little Rock, Ark. — Denver publisher Palmer Hoyt talked on integration at the banquet of the Arkansas Press Association Friday night.

It drew criticism from the PTA defeated by a vote of four-to-two a motion by Keith Tudor, a board vice president, to send Faubus a formal apology.

"My position," Tudor said, "is that regardless of who is right or wrong, we exposed the governor to some undue criticism of his policy at a public meeting."

Hoyt said he did not think Faubus seemed upset when he talked to the governor following the speech.

Faubus, who introduced the Denver Post editor and publisher, said he felt Hoyt had a right to his opinion, but it was another story of an outsider judging southern problems.

In his speech, Hoyt said the Little Rock integration crisis is part of an "unfolding, implied tragedy" that could end in the disintegration of America.

"Little Rock, whether you like it or not, has become an outpost of America's cold war struggle against alien forces who would enfold behind the iron curtain the billions of off-white people who populate the earth," he said.

Follies Queen May Get Pension Back

Chicago — Pension officials Saturday held out hope for a former Ziegfeld Follies queen who was cut from the old-age assistance rolls when she donated a small bonanza to underprivileged children.

Annabelle Whitford Buchan, 79, known both as the "Gibson bathing girl" and "the peerless Annabelle," and her husband, Dr. Edward J. Buchan, 77, ran into trouble when they turned a \$900 magazine fee over to the Chicago off-the-street club for children last July.

Mrs. Buchan earned the fee by writing a first-person account of the Chicago Iroquois Theatre blaze in which 601 persons were killed in 1903.

The 42-18-38 beauty was playing "queen of the fairy ballet" in "Mr. Bluebeard" when the tragedy happened.

When the federal government heard that Mrs. Buchan gave the \$900 to charity, she and her husband were dropped from the pension rolls for violating a rule that requires pensioners to use their funds on personal living expenses.

Cook County Welfare Director Raymond M. Hilliard said, however, that if a real emergency existed the Buchans can make reapplication and be returned to the welfare rolls immediately.

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Widow Sobs Over Jury's Leniency At Murder Trial

Rockingham, N. C. — Frank Edward Wetzel received a life sentence Friday night for slaying a North Carolina highway patrolman.

The widow of the slain patrolman, on hearing the sentence, sobbed hysterically: "He's going to live! He's going to live! I can't bear it."

A Richmond County Superior court jury deliberated slightly more than three hours Friday before finding the 37-year-old Seneca Falls, N.Y., fugitive guilty of first degree murder in the death of Wister Lee Reece, one of two patrolmen he killed last Nov. 5.

The jury spared Wetzel's life, however, making the life sentence mandatory. Despite a warning by Judge J. A. Rousseau against any demonstrations, many of the large group of teen-aged girls in the crowded courtroom squealed and clapped their hands when the verdict was announced.

Wetzel broke into smiles and several persons shook his hand but the widow of the slain patrolman collapsed and was carried from the courtroom sobbing.

The pretty dark-haired native of Wales whom Reece married in England 13 years ago was treated in an anteroom adjoining the courtroom.

Wetzel, asked by a reporter if he felt he had a fair trial, said, "I don't think I should have been convicted."

The jury of 10 men and two women could have sent Wetzel to the lethal gas chamber by omitting the mercy recommendation.

Wetzel's older brother, William Alvin Wetzel, is to be executed in the Mississippi electric chair next Friday for murder.

Defense attorney John T. Page Jr., gave notice of appeal but said he had not decided whether an appeal might be made.

Soviet Article Says Sputnik Fell

Moscow — An article in the magazine Soviet Aviation said Saturday that Russia's first Sputnik disintegrated and fell a week ago Saturday.

There has been no official Russian announcement on this score, but astronomers the world over said the first artificial earth satellite had met its end.

Russia had officially predicted that the first Sputnik would probably burn up in early January.

The article that appeared today said it disintegrated last Saturday, Jan. 4, exactly three months after being launched. It was said to have completed 1,367 revolutions around the earth.

Jobless In U. S. Pass 8-Year Mark

Washington — More jobless Americans were claiming unemployment benefits two weeks ago than at any time in almost eight years, government figures showed Saturday.

Claims came in during the week ended Dec. 28 at a rate almost as heavily as during the 1954 recession.

The figures indicated to some extent the severity of the downturn in the nation's economy.

President Eisenhower noted the slump in his State of the Union message Thursday. He said, however, there were signs things would get better.

An estimated 2,360,400 workers sought federal-state unemployment insurance in the last week of 1957, according to a labor department report late Friday.

This was the highest total since 2,391,000 in February, 1950. There were 1,467,500 insured unemployed during the corresponding period a year ago.

The department said the year-end increase followed the seasonal pattern but was "substantially larger than usual."

Every state but two reported increases in insured unemployment. Most blamed it on widespread plant shut-downs for inventory, production cutbacks in metals, machinery and auto manufacturing and further slackening of outdoor work.

Four Year Old Dies Of Skull Fracture

St. Paul, Minn. — A 4-year-old boy died of a skull fracture in a St. Paul hospital Friday night after his father allegedly beat him with a belt buckle. The victim was Ronald Lee Thompson.

His father, Lee Thompson, about 35, has been taken to Ancker hospital for observation. Police were unable to determine why the child had been beaten.

Detective L. L. Byrne said Thompson became hysterical when he found out the boy had died. Byrne quotes Thompson as saying: "I killed him. I killed him. He didn't have a chance."

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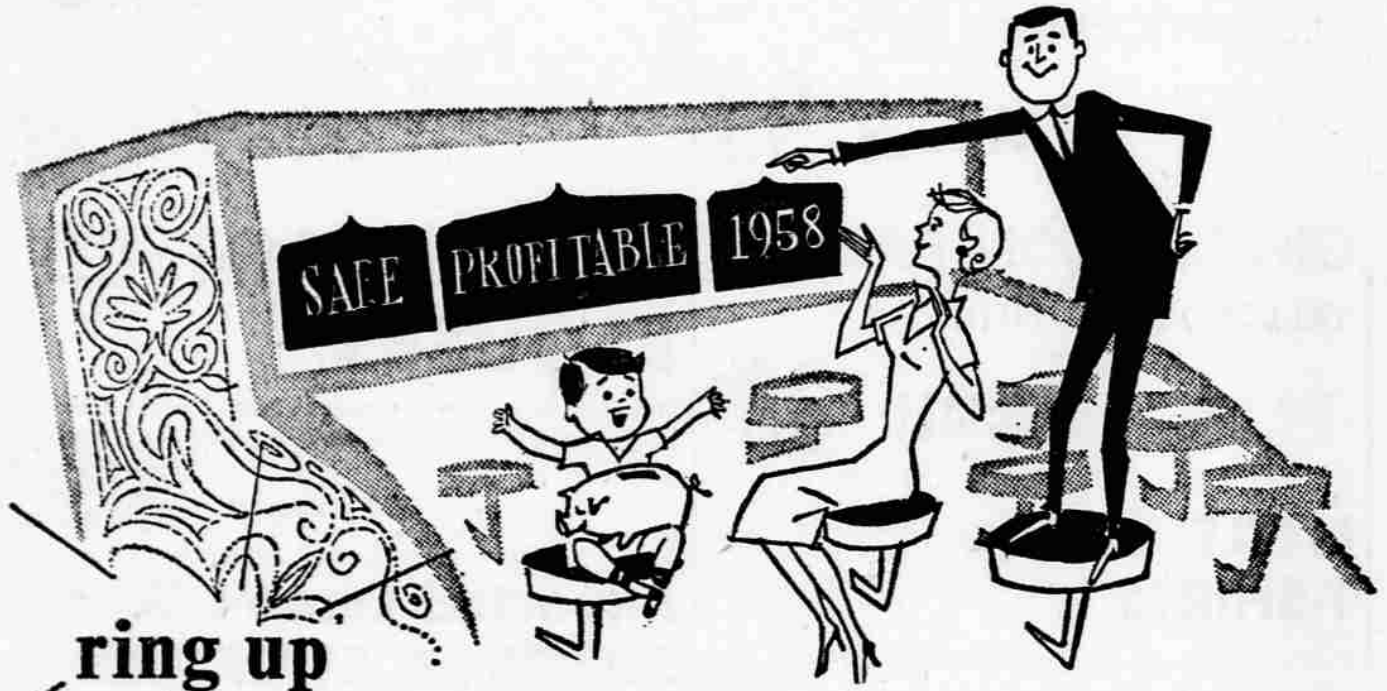
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
