Ullman Urges More Forest Road Money

Washington — Rep. Al Ullman (D-Ore.) told a House appropriations subcommittee Thursday that Congress should grant increased appropriations for forest roads and trails.

"The budget for the coming year," he said, "represents the second consecutive year in which the administration has failed to request the full authorization for forest roads and trails."

Ullman said budget requests during the past two years amount to a deficit of \$6,565,000 below the amount authorized by Congress.

"We can no longer continue to build fewer and fewer access roads each year as we have been doing for the last three fiscal years," he said.
