

Major Leagues Mum On New York Area For Second Ball Club

New York—The major leagues caused a surprise at their meetings Saturday by refusing to approve a new rule on club territory, but top officials said the action did not mean barring New York as the future site of a National league team.

The National and American leagues, meeting first separately and then jointly, had been expected to give "cut and dried" approval to a rule proposal drawn up by a special four-man committee. That rule would have forbidden the location of two major league teams in cities of less than two million population. It also would have ordered that the teams playing in the same city have their ball parks located at least five miles apart.

But objections to the proposal sprang up in both the leagues and the vote was to table it for more study. Baseball commissioner Ford Frick said the committee on territory will continue to hold meetings and may be expanded to six members.

The rejection meant that the present rule on territory changes remains in force for the present, each league voting separately when a team wishes to move into an already occupied area. If the leagues disagree, Frick retains the deciding vote—and he indicated today he will always vote in favor of "open" territory.

"I would oppose anything where an effort would be made to try to close the door," said Frick. "But this should not depend on the whim of the commissioner. We must not rest until we construct a rule we can live with."

It was learned that Lou

Perini, owner of the Milwaukee Braves, had demanded at the National league meeting that New York be expressly declared an open territory at this time. Frick favors such a declaration.

For the first time, Frick officially recognized the transfer of the Dodgers to Los Angeles and the Giants to San Francisco, effective Feb. 1. The commissioner said that the National league will have until Feb. 15 to control the New York area, after which a prospective club wishing to move to New York could do so by obtaining permission from both leagues or by getting Frick's vote in case of a stalemate.

At the same time, N.L. President Warren Giles disclosed he has invited New York City representatives to a meeting next July for the purpose of reporting what progress they have made toward a prospective new franchise may be located.

Men Plan National Crossing

Sacramento—A two-man relay marathon team from Stockton sprinted into Sacramento Saturday to wind up a 50-mile warmup run for a cross-country race.

The duo, running under sponsorship of the Stockton Chamber of Commerce, made the run in five hours, 43 minutes, winning the race from another three-man team by only three minutes.

Victors of the race were Jack Marden, 23, and Charles Curtis, 21, former holders of the world's ten-mile record established last November in 44 minutes, 47 seconds.

The challengers were Jack Briner, 18, Jerry Gleason, 22, and College of Pacific Professor Arner Gustafson, who ran with the boys for the final 25 miles.

A third team—not actually in competition—was comprised of Stockton Mayor Harvey Stull, outgoing Chamber President J. A. Simpson and incoming President Harry Goodfriend.

The cross-country run will be attempted by Marden and Curtis in June. They will try to make the run in 80 days.

Linfield Nabs NW Loop Lead

Corvallis—Oregon State breezed to its fourth Pacific Coast conference basketball victory Friday night by crushing the Washington Huskies 81-58 before 7555 fans.

Forward Dave Gambee hit 20 points to tie for high honors with Washington center Doug Smart, but Gambee's count pushed his three year total to 1259 and established him as the top scorer in Oregon State college basketball history. The old record was 1255 set in four years by Cliff Crandall.

The Beavers controlled the backboards, grabbing 60 rebounds against Washington's 30. Gambee and centers Gary Goble and Wayne Moss got a total of 36 off the backboards. Huskies reserve forward Bill Stady hit seven of eight.

May 24 Rogue Trout Season Opening Set In Final Regulations

Trout fishing season for the Rogue and Umpqua river systems and for coast streams in Zone 1 will open on May 24 this year, according to final regulations adopted by the Oregon state game commission at its annual meeting in Portland Friday.

The date is one month later than opening of the general season which was set for April 26. General trout season and that for the Rogue, Umpqua and coast area will run through Oct. 31. Season for lakes, reservoirs and their tributaries, with some exceptions, within national forest boundaries in the Cascade mountains will be May 24 through Oct. 5.

The month later than usual opening for the river systems designated is aimed at permitting larger escapement to the ocean of downstream migrating yearling salmon and steelhead. Game department staff members recommended the move to protect the migrating fish, which are a decreasing resource in the face of increasing anglers.

Ducks On Top Throughout In Beating WSC Cougars

Pullman, Wash.—The University of Oregon picked up its second Pacific Coast conference basketball win of the season by downing Washington State College 63-45 Friday night.

The defeat for the Cougars implanted them more firmly in the cellar position in the PCC race with just one win and six losses.

The Ducks hit the scoring column first and were never challenged for the lead by Washington State which couldn't seem to hit on either field goals or free throws. Game average for WSC was 26.3 per cent from the field and five of 24 gift shots while the Ducks hit 48 per cent from the floor.

Oregon, paced by the 17 points of sophomore Forward Dale Heron who took game scoring honors, dunked in 14 points against the Cougars' four in the first seven minutes. Then they built up their largest lead of the game, 35-14, with two minutes to go in the half and held a 38-22 advantage at intermission.

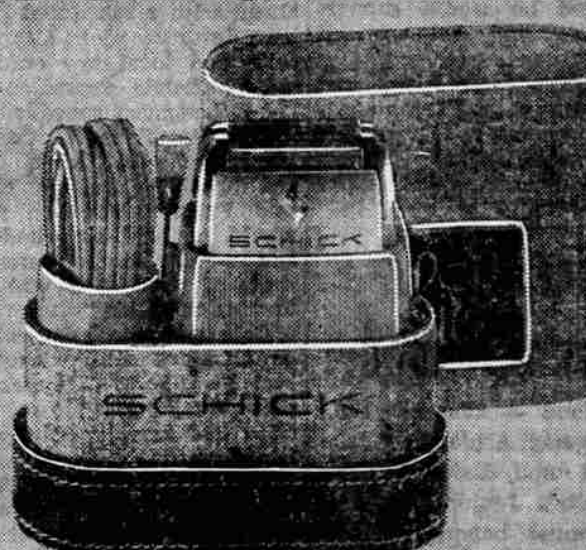
