

Black Tornado Nips Cavemen To Sweep Conference Series

Field goals by Lowell Dean and Bilbee Lane in the concluding hectic moments snipped a persistent Cavemen challenge here Saturday night and the Medford high basketball quintet nipped Grants Pass 43 to 42 in a down-to-the-buzzer Southern Oregon conference struggle.

Medford's Black Tornado was out in front most of the distance but had to fight from behind in the final portion of the closing quarter to accomplish a two-game week end series sweep over the Climate city gang.

The Tornado was in command 39 to 35 with three minutes remaining in the conflict. But Dick Hayes made five of six free shots for Grants Pass awarded on personal infractions by Medford's Dean, Don Peck and Jerry Anderson. Result was a Grants Pass lead of

40 to 39 with 1 minute 39 seconds left on the clock.

Rebounder Sinks
Seven seconds later Paul Lindquist of the Cavemen fouled Anderson. The Medford forward missed the chance but Dean grabbed the ball on the rebound and whipped it through the net. Medford headed 41 to 40.

Two other free tosses by Anderson wouldn't go in but with 36 seconds remaining Lane drove in for his bucket. He was fouled on the shot by Fred Thomas but missed the free. With 26 seconds to go Dean failed to make a free point on another Thomas personal.

With 14 seconds left Mike Sparlin swished a jumper for Grants Pass to end the scoring. Medford got the ball and held it.

By the Medford victory, in a game which had fans screaming and screaming, and by Klamath Fall's 67 to 30 ramble over Crater, a three-way tie for third place has resulted among Medford, Grants Pass and Crater. Ashland, which rested over the week end is just one game ahead in second spot. Klamath paces the loop by three games over Ashland.

One More Foul Toss
Tornado players picked up one more free point than Grants Pass to realize their Saturday decision. Each club collected 15 shots from the Medford put in 13 of 28 gift tosses and Grants Pass 12 of 15.

It wasn't until the second stanza that Medford could go on top of the scuffle. The Tornado passed the Cavemen at 17 to 16 on corner goal by Tom Hamlin and kept the upper hand until Hayes' fourth quarter series of foul throws.

Second period was Medford's best of the night. The Tornado went into it lagging 9 to 12 and rolled up 19 markers to eight by GP for a 28 to 20 halfway score. Medford made good on six of 15 shots from the field and seven of 11 casts from the free mark and mounted up their score to head twice by 10 points although the Cavemen offensively went into a ball control pattern. The Cavemen went scoreless 4 1/2 minutes while Medford ran up 15 points.

Lead Narrowed
Reluctant zone defense by the Cavemen and erratic play by the Tornado was the third quarter picture. Grants Pass outshot the home club 11 to eight and whacked its deficit to five tallies. Medford led just 36 to 31 going into the final quarter. Tornado margin had been cut once to 32 to 31 in the third session but Anderson canned a jumper and Lane a fast break bucket from the field.

Jerry Putnam hit from the side in the first minute of the last canto but charged with his fifth and banishment foul a minute later and Dean put in the free heave. Jim Smith collected a driver for Grants Pass for 37 to 35 with Medford ahead and then Dean made it 39 to 35.

Grants Pass lost its second regular when Lindquist was blown for a fifth infraction—the one which set up the Dean rebound goal putting Medford back in the lead.

Dean and Lane were the Medford scoring leaders with 16 and 12 points respectively. Sparlin had 11 and Hayes 10 for GP.

Medford had the edge on the backboards 34 to 20 with Dean having 12 recoveries and Hamlin nine. Lindquist and Sparlin each had five for the Cavemen.

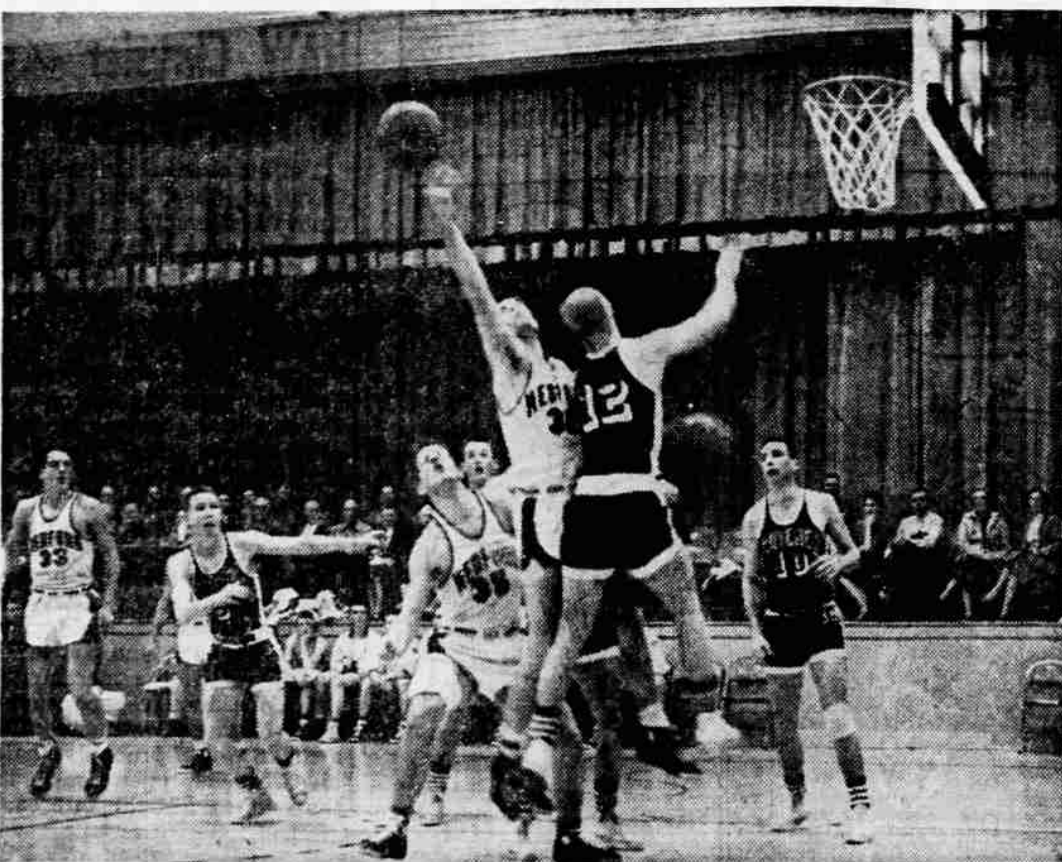
Grants Pass had a 405 field shooting average and Medford 37.5.
