### Can Children Be Marked

Many pregnant women keep wondering if their child will be "marked" when once they are frightened by something or other. Actually, experts are sure that at such markings cannot take place. Usually, the mother gets her fright during the later months of her pregnancy when the child is already well-formed and hence cannot get a hare lip or a strawberry mark. It might reassure many women to know that, during its life in the womb, the fetus is not part of the mother; it is only in contact with the mother through the "afterbirth," the blood vessels of the mother are near enough to this extent that a such markings cannot take place. Always there is a double barrier of tissue between mother and child.

Many a mother fears that her unhappiness during a pregnancy made her child unhappy, but experts do not see how this could happen. Many pregnant women hope that by reading poetry and listening to lovely music they can influence for good their unborn child, but, again, experts do not see how this could be done—across the tissue barriers in the after-birth.

### Cystic Mastitis

Many women want to know if cystic mastitis can be cured. I fear that the woman will probably have some discomfort with her breasts for much of her life. They may hurt and worry her for a week out of every month. Another question is, is mastitis likely to turn into cancer? I much doubt it, unless the woman has a number of relatives with cancer of the breast. I do not remember reading any statistics to show that the many women with tender or "shotty" breasts are particularly subject to cancer. Quite a few have operations on the breasts when the physicians have difficulty ruling out the presence of cancer.

All women past the age of 35 or 40 should examine their breasts from time to time and the day they find a lump they should go to a physician. Often he can say that the little lump is a smooth, easily movable little cyst or sac full of water which is very probably benign (not cancerous) but often he will find it removed because the only man who can say with certainty that it is not dangerous is the pathologist—the expert who examines very thin sections of tissue under a microscope.

Portland — The Multnomah County Labor Council has voted 91 to 17 to take the Marckx Home Delivery Bakery in Portland off the unfair list of organized labor. The move was interpreted by some delegates as a slap at the ousted Teamsters union which has had a contract with the bakery.

Marckx has been under union ban for years. Removal of the firm from the unfair list was recommended by the council executive board at request of the bakery workers and the stationary workers locals which also have contracts with the firm.
