Shortcut Cheese Souffle Test Kitchen Product

Ithaca, N.Y. — This recipe for "shortcut cheese souffle" comes from test kitchens at Cornell university.

Heat 1 1/2 ounce can (1 1/4 cups) of cream of mushroom soup and 1 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese in a double boiler until cheese is melted. While soup is heating, separate 6 eggs, using a large bowl for the whites. Beat the egg yolks slightly. Stir soup and cheese into egg yolks. Keep mixture warm while beating the egg whites until stiff but not dry. Gradually fold egg and soup mixture into the beaten whites. Fold only until well blended. Pour into an ungreased 2-quart casserole and bake in a slow oven (300 degrees) for 1 to 1 1/4 hours. Serve immediately. Makes 6 portions.

Sweets Between Meals Cause Big Rate of Decay

(Editor's note: This is another in a series of articles published in cooperation with the Southern Oregon Dental Society and the American Dental association in observance of National Children's Dental Health Week this week.)

Doctor, what foods will keep my children's teeth in good condition? What kind of diet will prevent tooth decay?

One dental scientist has said that "American children have the dirtiest mouths in the world."

He meant that their teeth have a high rate of decay—caused in good part by candies and cookies and other sweets eaten between meals.

Each time a child eats sweets, the teeth are attacked by decay-producing acids. Sugars sticking to the teeth are turned into acids quickly by certain bacteria normally present in the mouth.

Sweets eaten between meals are particularly dangerous because they are left on the teeth for comparatively longer periods of time. At meal times, some of the sugar can be brushed off the teeth by so-called detergent foods such as coarse vegetables and fruits.

If a youngster does have a sweet now and then, he should brush his teeth immediately afterward or at least rinse his mouth with water. Dentists say children should keep the sweet cookies and cakes, candies and sweetened drinks for parties and special occasions. For between-meal snacks there are a number of tasty and attractive foods you can substitute: milk, celery and raw carrot sticks, nuts, cheese and crisp, fresh fruits.

Not only are these foods better for dental health but they are also more nutritious than sweet snacks, which usually provide little more than calories.

Myths About Teeth
Among the myths about teeth is the one that says if the body is supplied with large quantities of calcium and vitamin D, tooth decay will be prevented, especially in children. Both calcium and

vitamin D are needed by the body, but a well-balanced diet contains enough of both. And, in large or small amounts, will not prevent tooth decay. A diet good for general health is adequate for dental health.

The fact is that after the permanent teeth are fully formed, what children do not eat is most important for the prevention of tooth decay.

Dr. H. Danielson Speaks at Meeting
