All boys of grades six through eight in Washington school and their fathers have been invited to attend the meeting, Partridge said. An evening of games directed by Herb Partridge, youth work secretary, has been planned. John Dellenback will lead an informative discussion.

Other Indian Guide tribes have been organized in Roosevelt school. Tribal chiefs are Dr. Laurel Case, Dr. Frank Wilson, Russ Brown and Wayne Struble assist with activities among the newly formed Washington tribes.

Indian Guides is a national program of the Young Men's Christian association. Purpose is to strengthen the companionship between a father and his son.

"It seeks to multiply the number of things that fathers and sons can do together at an age when a boy thinks his dad is the greatest man in the world," Partridge explained. "This is the time when a boy needs the influence of his dad in growing up."

This program was organized in St. Louis, Mo., in 1926. It is based on Indian lore because of the interest to both fathers and sons. The "Y" Indian Guides is a program for the busy but thinking father of today who is concerned lest someone else becomes the chum and confidant of his son, it was explained.
