Stocks in Decline After Recent Highs

New York—Stocks declined today after recent markets had lifted prices to new highs since early October.

The dip reflected in part failure of the Vanguard missile to put a new satellite into orbit. Also profit taking developed in many sections.

A long list of special issues rose a point or more. But the main list slipped back in such groups as the steels, motors, oils, and chemicals. The last had losses running to more than a point in Allied Chemical. Goodyear fell more than a point in a lower tire section.

International Business Machines, the recent buoyant feature, lost more than five points.

Outdoor Thermostat Aids House Heating

Boston—Outdoor thermostats can make home heating systems function more efficiently, according to the Anthracite Information Bureau.

Under a basic law of physics, heat moves from a warm surface to a colder surface.

Use of an outdoor thermostat would warn the heater of lowering temperatures outside. The heater would come on sooner and begin warming the inside air before the effects of outside cold penetrated through the walls of the house.

We feel cold inside in the winter because the heat from our body (a warm surface) continually is drawn off by the walls (cold surfaces).

The so-called cold wall magnetism can only be offset by raising the indoor air temperature slightly to counteract the increased chill emanating from outer walls. Outdoor thermostats would start the heater on its important job sooner than indoor regulators.

Water expands about one-tenth when frozen.

Air Force Planes Hit Over Georgia

Sylvania, Ga. (AP)—Two Air Force jet planes collided near here today but one landed safely and the pilot of the other bailed out before the flaming wreckage hit ground.

The Air Force said a B-47 medium bomber collided with an F86 fighter at 35,000 feet. The bomber made a safe landing at Hunter Air Force Base in Savannah, Ga. Its three crew men were unhurt.

A spokesman for the Air Force at Charleston, S. C., where the fighter was based, reported that 1st Lt. Clarence A. Steward (age and hometown not immediately available) bailed out and called in later from Estill, S. C., and was taken to a military hospital. There was no immediate report on his condition.
