Belgian Congo Gets Larger Ore Feeder

Chicago — The Stephens-Adamson Manufacturing Co. has delivered what is believed to be the world's largest ore feeder to a copper mine in the Belgian Congo.

The feeder receives ore from storage bins or hoppers and feeds it to conveying and crushing facilities. It will handle 550 tons of ore an hour. It weighs about 180,000 pounds and is 18 feet high, 52 feet long and 11 feet high.

The feeder is a heavy duty machine. It is made up of a series of manganese steel pans designed to carry ore over horizontal or reasonably inclined planes. The pans ride on two parallel endless chains made of manganese steel.

Leather Industry In Sales Comeback

Chicago — The leather industry, facing the growth of synthetics and the decline of the horse, has made a sales comeback, according to the National Live Stock Producer.

The publication said that in 1925 shoe soles were almost always leather, but that synthetics took over the market by 1951. This added to their financial woes which started when the automobile came. The shoe industry still uses 85 per cent of all leather produced, the bulletin said, but new outlets in leather clothing, accessories and upholstery have helped to pull the leather industry into "broad new markets."

Dr. Miller Author Of Magazine Article

Ashland — Dr. Clifford R. Miller, associate professor of social science at Southern Oregon college, has an article entitled "The Old School Baptists in Early Oregon" published in the December issue of the Oregon Historical Quarterly.

According to Dr. Miller, this is the only historical account published of the antislavery Baptists in Oregon. The article traces the origins of the Old School of Primitive Baptist movement, describes its distinguishing characteristics, and discusses the controversies that grew out of the little denomination's extreme Calvinistic beliefs and unusual church practices. Dr. Miller feels that the ultimate failure of the sect was due to an unprogressive and ultraconservative spirit. The cultural and material growth of Oregon increasingly made its absurdities more obvious and antiquated. By 1890 the Old School Baptists were of less consequence both relatively and absolutely than they were in 1870, and by 1926 they had disappeared from the Oregon scene, he said.

Authorities Drop Assault Charges

Baker — Indictments on charges of assault with intent to kill brought against Wesley Earl Davis, 30, and Jack Norman Gibb, 18, were dismissed Wednesday.

Circuit Judge Lyle Wolff said the indictments were dismissed because of errors. He said they did not specify the weapons used or the means employed.

But indictments charging the two with assault with dangerous weapons and armed robbery still stand.

The two, who had escaped from the Anacortes, Wash., city jail, were captured last month in the rugged Rye Valley area of Baker county.

They had overpowered a state policeman near Arlington and drove his car to Boardman. There they stole another car and subsequently were challenged by a state policeman east of Baker. They overpowered him and took his patrol car, then finally were captured in the rugged country near the Idaho border.

Tributes Paid To KOAC Programming

Eugene — Tributes to the educational programming of KOAC, the state-owned radio station, were heard here Wednesday at a hearing on proposals to dispose of the Corvallis operation.

Representatives of both Eugene and Springfield schools said they use KOAC programs for classroom instruction.

Dean J. W. Sherburne of the General Extension Division of the State System of Higher Education has proposed selling the station and diverting its funds to KOAC-TV, a state-owned educational television outlet. Other hearings will be held in Portland and Redmond.

SONG WRITER DIES

New York — Lew Brown, 64, a member of one of the most successful popular song-writing teams in Tin Pan Alley history, died Wednesday of a heart attack at his apartment here. Brown, with his partners, Buddy De Silva and Ray Henderson, wrote such favorites as "Don't Sit Under the Apple Tree," "The Beer Barrel Polka," "The Birth of the Blues" and "Sonny Boy."

Stock Trading Quiet Despite Adversity

New York — Stocks moved narrowly today with trading quiet despite several adverse business news items.

The most significant of the news developments as the market saw it was a statement by William McChesney Martin, head of the Federal Reserve System, who warned that the recession may be deeper than anticipated. He felt, however, that there would be a business revival. Carloadings declined 15 per cent from a year ago, the House Commerce Committee urged the Federal Communi-

cations Commission to hold off pay television until Congress has an opportunity to act, and Gulf, Mobile and Ohio Railroad cut its dividend. Automobile output rose on the week but was off about 26 per cent from a year ago.

Niagara Visitors Lose Vantage Point

Niagara Falls, N.Y. — Tourists visiting the scenic Niagara Falls area have lost one of their vantage points for viewing the lower river and the famed Whirlpool Rapids.

A bluff constituting part of Whirlpool State Park was blasted into the gorge late in 1957 because it had become a danger area, undermined by cracks and crevices. The area had been roped off for many months as a precautionary measure.

The point of land was linked with Indian legends. According to one story, the area was used as the wedding grounds for all area Indian marriages. A rug of bearskin would cover the shelf, and the ceremony would be held at the river's edge while tom tom music furnished wedding music.

Another legend had it that Indians convicted of tribal crimes were tossed into the river from the bluff.

Cleveland Zoo Has Rare Cross-Breed

Cleveland, Ohio — The Cleveland zoo has a rare cross-breed which, for want of a better name, is labeled "It."

The animal is a cross between a Himalayan tahr — a species of mountain goat — and a fat-tailed Karakul sheep. Lighter in color than the sheep, the beast has a heavily matted wool and a goat-like head.

Zoo officials said the animal came about because the tahr formed the habit of leaping six foot fences to pay visits to other paddocks, including that of the sheep.

Dr. T. H. Reed, acting head of the National Zoo, Washington, D.C. said there is no record of such a cross-mating.

NO CHARM NEEDED

Portland, Maine — The city of Portland announced it would sponsor a weekly "charm school" for high school freshmen and sophomores. The program was canceled, however, when nobody showed up to take the course.

Anita Ekberg Foe Of Sack Dresses

Portland — Swedish film star Anita Ekberg says she wants nothing to do with sack dresses.

"I wouldn't be caught dead in one of those gunnysacks!" she said Wednesday during a brief stopover at Portland International airport.

"A woman was meant to have a waistline," she said. "If you are a woman, why not look like one, instead of hiding it?"

Miss Ekberg was en route from London to California via Pan American's new Polar flight.

Damages To Car Paid After Delay

Pittsburgh — Mrs. Harper H. Smith, 80, recently received \$24 restitution for damages to her car. The vehicle was broken into by four youths in 1957.

Explaining the delay in payment, Clerk of Courts Thomas E. Barrett said that about 5,000 restitution cases were recently transferred to his office from the county probation office.

Mrs. Smith's case dated Dec. 19, 1957, was among those in the transfer. Barrett said he located the four defendants, each of whom agreed to pay \$6 restitution.

New Provisions of Law to Be Discussed

Information on new provisions in state unemployment compensation laws which relate to counties and cities will be discussed at a meeting in the Jackson county courthouse Friday, Feb. 14, at 10 a.m.

New provisions allow for coverage of employees in local government agencies. The changes were made by the 1957 session of the state legislature and went into effect Jan. 1.

Man Realizes Ambition To Own Steam Engine

Grand Junction, Mich. — John Pugh's "toy" is a puffing 10-ton steam engine built in 1913.

Pugh, a toolmaker who lives on a farm near here, realized a life-time ambition when he bought the engine in 1952.

"I'd always wanted a steam engine since the first time I saw one when I went to the depot with my father as a boy," he said.

Druggist Carries Tax Fight To Customers

Omaha — Druggist M. B. Blackburn has taken his case against the Internal Revenue Service directly to his customers.

In his display window, he has placed a 98-cent toy suitcase designed to hold doll clothes. Below it is a sign: "I say it's a toy; the Internal Revenue Service insists it is luggage. As luggage, I must collect a 10 per cent luxury tax on every one I sell."

Blackburn said he had sold more than 1,500 of the doll clothes bags as toys without collecting tax. Then came an IRS audit and Blackburn had to pay the 10 per cent tax.

About 19 million checks are written in the U.S. on an average day, and the average face value of each check figures out to about \$30.
