Philadelphia—Maj. Gen. John B. Medaris, chief of the Army ballistic missile agency in Huntsville, Ala., on the urgent necessity for the United States to achieve manned control of space:

"The blunt truth is that we are in a race against time with an adversary of no mean capabilities, who has committed to his effort a far greater percentage of his total resources than we have so far mustered."

New York—White House Assistant Sherman Adams, on why the nation should support President Eisenhower's call for a non-governmental East-West cultural conference:

Conference on Small Business Problems Set

Corvallis — How research and development can help small business will be the keynote next month for an Oregon small business conference at Oregon State college.

The three-day conference, scheduled March 13 to 15, was organized to help small businessmen of the state learn how to use research and development to solve many of their business problems.

The conference is a follow-up to a national conference called in September by President Eisenhower. State conferences were recommended by the national leaders and the Corvallis Conference on Research and Development for Oregon Small Business is the first announced by any state.

First-Day Sessions

First-day meetings will be built around how research can help small business, importance of research in the American economy, and how small business can get started on a small-scale in research and development programs. "Negotiated Government Research Contracts" will be topic for the dinner address.

The second-day sessions will include discussions on research agencies available to small business. These include commercial organizations, research institutes, educational institutions and state and federal agencies. Sources of research and development information will draw emphasis in the afternoon.

Question-and-answer periods on various phases of research and development are scheduled for the final morning of the conference. Businessmen will be given opportunity to discuss their individual problems and programs with conference speakers and visiting authorities.

Milton H. Mater, president of a Corvallis manufacturing firm, is conference chairman. Milosh P. Povich, assistant dean of engineering at Oregon State college, is program chairman.

West Berlin's Lonely Women Easy Swindle Target; Man Jailed 13th Time

Berlin — Police arrested "The Heartbreaker" the other day for the 13th time.

He has the prosaic name of Paul Mueller, is 60, has thinning grey hair, prominent features and wears glasses.

He has a timid, retiring manner, looks like a rural laborer and has no resemblance to anyone most people would consider a lady-killer.

But police who were on his trail for 18 months dubbed him "the heartbreaker" with good reason.

They called him one of the most dangerous examples of the "marriage swindler," who preys on West Berlin's 490,000 lonely women.

Rehearsals Start For Annual Kapers

Professional director is Bob D'Arcy of Lassen Productions, Hollywood, Calif. He outlined features of the show to Kiwanians yesterday at their luncheon meeting at Rogue Valley Country club.

"Krazy Kapers of 1958" will have a magazine review theme. Scenes in the first act will depict certain magazines or features of magazine publication. Second act will concern a television magazine and will be a telecast review with the Kiwanis chorus participating.

The production will have all local talent. Proceeds will go largely toward financing a dental clinic which is scheduled to open March 1 in the county courthouse.

Tickets are available from any Kiwanian. Special children's prices will prevail on Wednesday night of the show and all seats will be general admission. Reserved seats will be available for the Thursday, Friday and Saturday performances when there will be no lower price for youngsters.

Because of the shortage of marriageable men, "marriage swindling" has become a well-paid profession here.

Looks, fine clothes, grooming, money, a good job are not needed.

In this city of lonely women all you need for the job is lack of character, some ruthlessness and the ability to promise marriage to girls who want a husband.

Women Want Husbands

There are very many women who do want a husband. Most of them have no chance of getting one.

Of West Berlin's population of 2,200,000 men number 900,000 and women 1,300,000. This gives a surplus of 400,000 women.

But that figure tells only part of the story. Unmarried women above 21 number 490,000. Of these, 243,000 are widows, 75,000 divorcees and 170,000 single girls who were never married.

Most marriage swindlers use the same method as Mueller.

Police say he met his victims by putting advertisements in lonely hearts columns. Many German newspapers and magazines run columns of "husband wanted" and "wife wanted" advertisements.

Numerous marriage bureaus also cater to the needs of lonely people and provide a fertile field for adventurers.

The marriage swindler meets a lonely woman through an advertisement or an agency, quickly proposes marriage and sets a date for the wedding.

Shortly before the wedding, however, he borrows money to meet a financial obligation or to make a down payment on a home or to meet some wedding expense.

With the money in his pocket he is off to answer another advertisement and repeat the process.

Library To Compete With Din of Traffic

Leominster, Mass. — The din of traffic in the business district will have to compete against classical music.

The Public Library plans an experimental program of broadcasting such music through loudspeakers outside the building.

The records to be played will be selected from the library's collection. Library trustees said they hoped the broadcasts would stimulate increased borrowing of the records.

Museum Visited by 1,203 in January

Jacksonville — A total of 1,203 persons visited the Jacksonville museum during January, Miss Mary Hanley, curator, has announced. The total compares with 1,139 in January last year, and brings the total since the museum opened July 10, 1950, to 274,206.

Visitors came from 24 states, the territories of Alaska and Hawaii, and from Australia, Holland, Canada and Thailand. There were seven groups of Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Bluebirds and Cub Scouts.
