But Blackie guarded off barking dogs and kept the postman company through rough snow, sleet, rain and all the rest.

Two postmen, Herbert Lawrence and Patrick Hartnett, have a running argument about who was the first postman honored by Blackie's company. Blackie won't say. "She plays no favorites," Gombash said.

Blackie grew up as the pet of John F. Lavuhan Jr., 18. But when John began spending less time around the house, Blackie started spending her time with the postmen.

"Blackie seems to know that Sundays and holidays she doesn't have to report," Gombash said. "But she's right on the dot Monday through Saturday noon."

"Blackie reports at 8:45 a.m. and checks out at 4:30 p.m."

Fossils Reported In Antarctic Waste
Moscow—Soviet Antarctic explorers have reported finding fossils and other evidence that the frozen waste land once harbored flourishing plant and animal life in prehistoric times. They also reported discovering mineral deposits.

In the Los Angeles-Long Beach metropolitan area nonagricultural employment averaged 2,179,000 wage and salary workers in 1957, a new high and three per cent above the 1956 record.

In the San Francisco-Oakland area nonfarm employment was slightly higher in 1957 than in the previous year.

Teamsters Plan To Avoid Conflict

Miami Beach—A high Teamsters official said the Teamsters want to avoid open war with the AFL-CIO and hope their expulsion will be revoked.

Harold J. Gibbons, vice president of the giant truck union and right hand man of Teamsters boss James R. Hoffa, made the statement on the eve of a union executive board meeting.

Hoffa arrived with other union leaders in advance of next week's pow wow at the Castaways motel here. The Teamsters' meeting place is about 15 miles up the beach from the hotel where the AFL-CIO executive council is holding its session.

Gibbons said there were no peace talks scheduled between Hoffa and leaders of the federation. AFL-CIO President George Meany said he could not feel less about Hoffa's presence and described the 44-year-old Detroit labor leader as the main stumbling block to re-admission of the truck union to the federation.

Gibbons said the Teamsters wanted to continue their "good relations" with the AFL-CIO that he said have existed since the ouster of the union two months ago on corruption charges against Hoffa and others.

The Teamsters board meeting starts Monday and may continue through Wednesday. An expanded organizing drive was expected to be approved.

More Payrolls Aim of Group

Grants Pass—An industrial development corporation for attracting new industries to Josephine county was approved recently during a meeting of the Citizens' Advisory committee in Grants Pass.

The new organization, to be known as Industrial Development Inc., will be a profit-making organization, it was decided. Authorized capital of \$150,000 is proposed. Part of it will be raised now.

Following investigation by a special committee plans for the project had been formulated and recommendations made to the advisory group.

Shares in the corporation will be valued at \$25 each with a \$100 subscription or purchase minimum. Aim is to get 250 stockholders, it was explained.

The organization should earn a return of at least 6 per cent for investors, a spokesman said.

The new organization in Grants Pass is patterned after the McMinnville industrial development group which has 1,000 subscribers in its corporation with capital investment of \$252,000.

Brewery Workers Erroneously Charged

Miami Beach, Fla.—The United Press reported incorrectly Feb. 7 that the AFL-CIO Executive Council had approved an investigation of corruption charges against the Brewery Workers.

The dispatch should have stated that it was the Jewelry Workers International Union which faces an investigation by the AFL-CIO Ethical Practices committee.

Quality Problem Faced By American Education

Baltimore, Md.—Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower, president of Johns Hopkins university, says that although American education faces a "tremendous qualitative problem" the quality problem is even greater.

Eisenhower, speaking on an ABC-network television show, "The Johns Hopkins File 7," said that the quantitative problem is felt at every level of education and will become greater. He said today there are about three million students in institutions of higher learning in this country and that the figure apparently will double in the next 15 years.

Eisenhower said that more than half the college and university students in public institutions are going to have to take an even greater share of the load because private schools cannot bear the increasing costs of educating students.

Hopkins, Eisenhower pointed out, is now engaged in a 10 year drive to raise \$76 million but he said emphatically that such funds would not permit the school to enlarge its enrollment of about 2,500 by more than 300. He added that even this could be done only in fields where expansion seemed feasible, such as the humanities and the social sciences.

War Budget Cut By Red Chinese

Tokyo—Communist China said its military budget for the current year will amount to \$2,100,000,000, a reduction of \$224,000,000 from last year's.

The Hsin Hua (Red) China news agency said the People's Congress in Peiping rejected the budget from Gen. Kan Sau-Chi, deputy chief political commissar of the Red Chinese army.

It quoted him as saying the military expenditures would amount to roughly 15 per cent of the total budget.
