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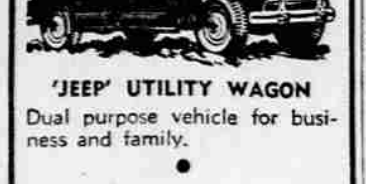
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Roadkings, Big Y Vie On EP Floor

"Where's the ball" is what the opponents will try and seek when captain Sonny Mitchell trots out the Roadkings with their dizzy fast passing attack and quick shooting to pile up a lead so they can really go to work and put on their basketball routine of comedy acts.

The Roadkings with one of the most outstanding records in 26 seasons of play have racked up 3,074 wins with but 202 losses. And this season with the same club that racked up another 149 wins will be seen tonight.

Al Kaline Inks Detroit Papers For Same Pay

Detroit—Al Kaline, "anxious to be the best ball player in the league," has signed for 1958 with the Detroit Tigers.

The 23-year-old outfielder "signed on our terms," General Manager Johnny McHale said late Monday. Kaline immediately left for a visit with relatives in Baltimore before heading south for the Tigers' early camp at Lakeland, Fla. It was believed he received neither a raise nor a cut from his plus-\$20,000 salary.

Kaline, after a phenomenal 1955 season when he hit .340 and became the youngest player ever to win the American League batting championship got off slowly in 1956 but wound up strong with a .314 average, 27 home runs and 128 runs batted in.

Ted Williams, the last major leaguer to hit better than .400, last summer predicted Kaline and Mickey Mantle of the New York Yankees have the capabilities of reaching that peak.

Yardley Gains In Point Race

New York—George Yardley of the Detroit Pistons averaged 35-points in his three most recent outings to gain slightly on Dolph Schayes of the Syracuse Nationals today in the National Basketball Association's individual scoring race.

Yardley scored 105 points in the three games to lift his first-place total to 1516 and his average to 27.1. Schayes, who scored 98 points last week, has 1434 points and a 25.6 average.

OSC Wins Wild Tilt Over Idaho

Corvallis—Oregon State posted its seventh Pacific Coast conference basketball victory Monday night by belting Idaho 70-51 in a rough and tumble game.

Six players were retired on fouls, one ejected for roughness and another carried off the floor with a banged knee. Still another, Larry Cople of OSC, lost three teeth.

OSC had 26 of the 45 fouls committed in the game and four Beavers fouled out within the last 10 minutes.

The game was tied at 4-all after about 10 minutes of play before Oregon State took a lead for the rest of the game. The Vandals nibbled at the margin toward the close of the half and OSC finished with a 26-21 halftime advantage.

OSC spurred ahead at the opening of the second half blanketing Idaho for four minutes. The Beavers built a 15-point lead, lost it, and finally built it back and kept it.

With 10 minutes to go, OSC forward Dave Gambee fouled out and was followed by teammates Ted Miller, Jim Anderson and Gary Goble. Idaho's John Liveous was retired at three minutes and guard Gary Simmons went out one minute later.

Vandal forward Bob Walter was carried off with an injured knee. Idaho guard Dave Damiano was ejected in the final seconds for roughness. Cople was hurt as he went high in the air for a lay-up in the final 10 seconds.

OSC nabbed 54 rebounds against Idaho's 26 and out-shot the Vandals with a .350 against a .333. High honors went to Idaho guard Whylon Coleman with 14 points. For OSC, center Wayne Moss and Ken Nanson, tied with 13 each.

New Captain Claims U.S. Will Grab American Zone Of Davis Cup Competition

Los Angeles—Perry Jones, 68-year-old new captain of the U.S. Davis Cup team, declared today, "I may be a little conceited, but I figure we certainly are going to win the right to represent the American zone in Australia this year."

Jones made the statement as he prepared to give his new job what he called "the best try I know how and not with the idea that we're going over there just to go through the motions and lose."

Concerning plans and ideas to restore U.S. Davis Cup prestige, he said he had a lot of ideas as to who might be on the team and what might be done, "but I am not in a position to discuss them until after I've talked to Victor Denny in Seattle."

Denny, United States Lawn Tennis Assn. president, announced Jones' appointment Sunday. Jones replaces Billy Talbot who headed the U.S. team from 1954 through 1957.

Jones said there has been "a great deal of talk that we should use on the team only those players with the four best records."

"But there is another school of thought that we should just look around for the most promising young players—who wouldn't necessarily be the best in 1958—but who the selection committee believes might be the best play in 1959 or 1960 if given experience."

"Some people think we should be satisfied to build for the future rather than for immediate prospects," he continued. "I'm not saying this is my opinion. Until all the officials have decided, I can't express an opinion for or against."

He declared there are many fine prospects all over the country. "The woods are full of them. People just come out of no place," he said.
