Most Aircraft Said Built Prior To 1948

Madison, Wis. — The Civil Aeronautics Administration reports that 58 per cent of the 87,531 registered aircraft in the country were built before 1948.

Mud Slide Delays Service To Astoria

Portland — A mud slide between Rainier and Clatskanie Monday night delayed freight service from here to Astoria, it was reported by Spokane, Portland and Seattle Railroad officials. The slide was reported about 6:45 p.m. and covered an area some 50 feet long and 20 feet wide and 20 feet deep. Crews hoped to have it cleared away early today.

ATOM DISASTER LAW

London — The government said today it will enact legislation holding private owners of nuclear reactors financially responsible for accidental atomic disasters up to \$14 million in personal or property damage. Sir Ian Horobin, parliamentary secretary to the Ministry of Power, said "All owners of such reactors will be subject to the same duty as the Atomic Energy Authority of preventing damage to property or personal injury from radioactive contamination."

FORGETS CLOTHES

New York — A 55-year-old man waltzed gaily up Third ave for 11 blocks in 19-degree cold Monday clad only in a right shoe and left sock and singing "Melody d'Amour" at the top of his voice. At Bellevue Hospital he said he was Edward Sullivan of Hudson, N.Y., and had been drinking around town since Sunday. He couldn't remember what happened to the rest of his clothes.

MISSILE IDENTIFIED

Naples, Italy — A mysterious "missile" which streaked through the sky Friday night turned out today to be a World War II German rocket accidentally discharged from a scrap dealer's foundry. Police said scrap dealer Giuseppe Fiammingo explained that his workers had mistaken the two-foot-long rocket for a harmless piece of steel tubing and dropped it into the foundry furnace. The heat ignited it and sent it screaming through the roof into the sky where it was sighted by the Vesuvius observatory. Fiammingo said he didn't know about the rocket until he returned from a business trip Monday.

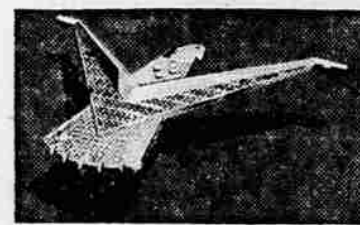

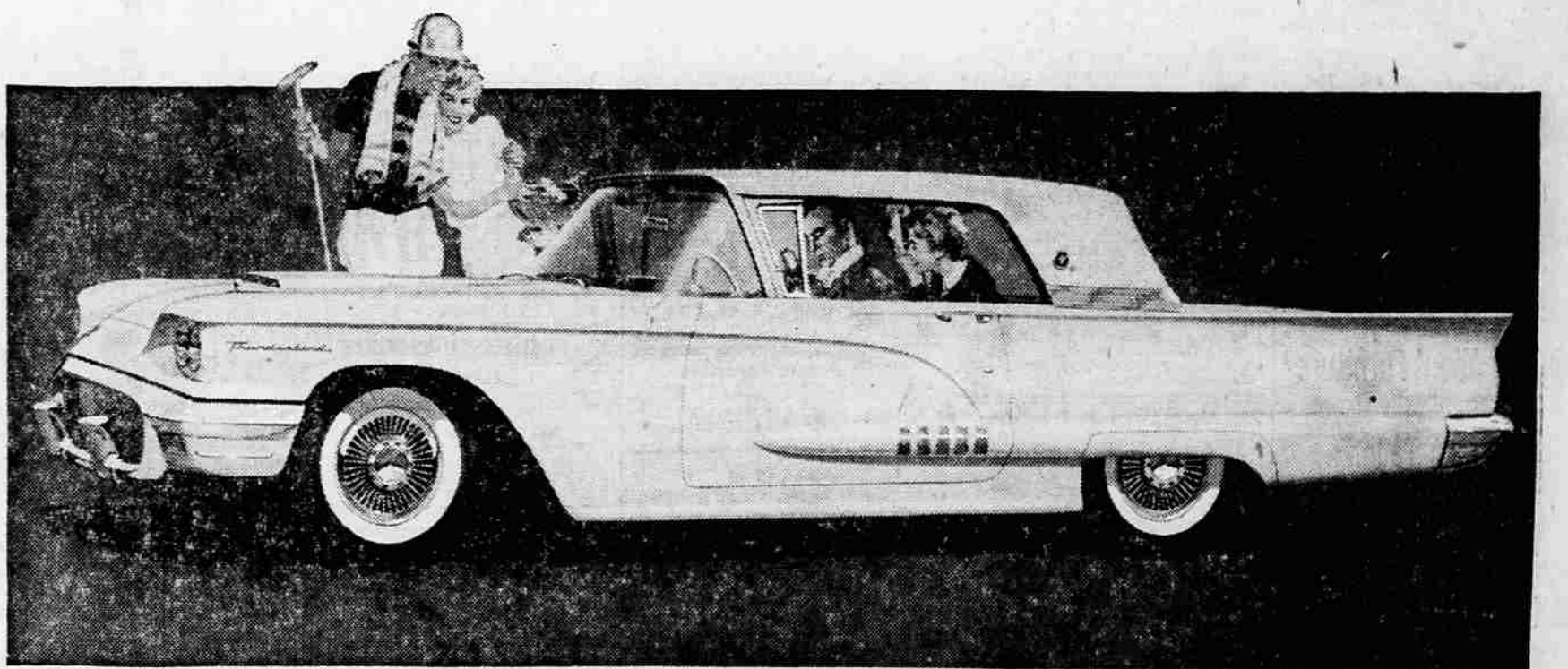

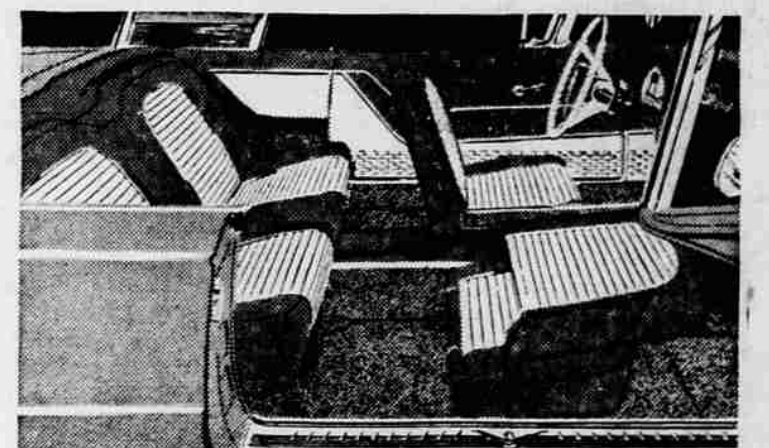
