Southern Oregon Cagers Tussle Portland Staters

Ashland—Southern Oregon college basketball teams met at Portland against the Portland State Vikings tonight and Saturday in the first of two games in the Oregon Collegiate conference championship.

The Raiders will enter the series as favorites on the basis of two previous victories over the Vikings at Ashland. But, with the PSC club playing on a more familiar court and having shown improvement in both shooting and ball-handling in recent games, this week ends' assignment looms more rugged for the SOC five.

Portland has hit the hoop from the field at a .464 rate in its last three games. Southern Oregon is second in the standings a game behind Oregon Tech and five in front of third ranking PSC. The Vikings, it is seen are out of the running in the OCC but are still gunning for a berth in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics district play-off.

Employment Clinic Scheduled Monday

Veterans employment clinic will be held in Medford Feb. 17 at the VFW hall, 42 North Front st. at 8 p.m., the county veterans' service officer has announced.

This will be the fourth year the clinics have been conducted in cooperation with the major veteran's organizations and several federal and state agencies. The purpose is to familiarize veterans with job opportunities in federal service as well as private industry, preference in employment and other benefits.

George A. Reid, regional veterans federal employment representative, will head the clinic. He will advise on job opportunities and examination qualifications as well as rights and benefits of veterans preference in federal employment.

Information also will be given by representatives of the Oregon State Employment service; the Veterans administration, the bureau of veteran reemployment rights, the veterans employment representative of the U.S. department of labor; the representative of the department of veterans affairs; the governor's committee on employment of the physical handicapped and others.

Heart Disease To Be Program Topic

Heart disease and its various aspects will be the subject of the public health program on KBES-TV Saturday, Feb. 13, at 5:30 p.m.

In order that the public may ask questions on this subject, the station has arranged to accept calls from 4:30 until the end of the program. These questions will be answered by the panel of doctors discussing heart diseases.

The panel will consist of Dr. Ray L. Casterline, Dr. John R. Reynolds, Ashland, Dr. John T. Brandenburg and Dr. Fred C. Lorish, all physicians and surgeons specializing in diagnostics and internal medicine. The program is sponsored by the Jackson County Public Health association.

Another in Series Of Meetings Held On Rogue Manor

Rogue Valley Manor held another in a series of meetings at the U.S. National bank this week. Executives and employees of U. S. National and the Rogue Valley Bank attended.

George Flanagan, trustee and treasurer, reported occupancy rights to two additional apartments have been sold to local people within the last two days, bringing the total number sold to 79. "As soon as 63 more apartments are sold," Flanagan stated, "construction on the \$5½ million retirement home will begin."

"Thus far rights to 30 apartments have been sold to people of Medford, six to people of the valley outside of Medford, and 12 to people in Oregon but outside of the Rogue River valley. Oregon accounts for 48 apartments, California is second with 22 and all others, from Hawaii to Florida, nine."

Flanagan said the Manor site, on Barneburg hill now has water and sewer connections, and streets have been laid out for the 15-acre area.

Describes Manor

Walter H. Higgins, executive director of the Manor, described what it will be like.

He described each of the 10 floors, and the services to be provided members. These include medical care (except operation and hospital), meals in the dining room, weekly flat laundry service, heavy house cleaning, utilities, including individual thermostat heat and cold controls, air conditioning, and others.

Free bus service on regular schedule to and from Medford is planned. Mel Hogan, president of the board of trustees of the Manor, concluded the meeting with a survey of the financial picture, including costs and protections to members joining the Manor. He stated there are five styles of apartments ranging from \$6,800 to \$23,000, that the costs for food and all services has been established at \$110 per month per member and, that a life-care assurance fund will be set up to protect members and the Manor.

Requirements Listed

Hogan stated requirements for membership are simple, and include: 1. Prospective members must be of good moral character, 2. Condition of health must be good considering age of person; and 3. Applicant must be adequately financed.

Hogan said it is hoped the required number of apartments will be sold within the next 60 to 90 days, thus guaranteeing the start of the building program by early summer, with an expected completion date of late summer, 1959. Other public meetings will be held in Medford by the Manor Board during the next 60 days.

Patric Insists on Trial for Illegally Franking of Letters

Seattle—John Patric shook his fluffy gray beard in disgust Thursday and demanded that the federal government prosecute him.

"I want to be prosecuted," the author told Judge William J. Lindberg. "I've been waiting for this for 20 years." Patric is accused of franking letters without privilege. He contends that if congressmen can send letters through the mail without stamps on them so can he.

Wants To Dismiss Case

The U.S. Attorney's office wants to dismiss the case, according to U.S. Assistant Attorney Joseph McKennon. McKennon said he was awaiting permission from headquarters in Washington, D.C., to junk the suit.

But Patric insists on being prosecuted. "I have that right, don't I, judge?" Patric asked Lindberg. The judge said he would continue the case subject to call. He smiled faintly as he made the decision.

The issue has been whether or not Patric is mentally competent. He refused to cooperate with a psychiatrist appointed by the court and demanded that he be allowed to approve any doctor "who has to determine whether or not I am nuts."

"If the attorney figures he won't have a case against you, Mr. Patric, he has a right to dismiss it," Lindberg said.

Patric, 56, lives with his elderly mother in Snohomish, Wash., but he gets his mail at an address listed as Frying Pan Creek, Ore. That is near Florence on the Oregon coast. He is the author of a best-seller, "A Yankee Hobo in the Orient," and is listed in "Who's Who."

S.F. Reserve Bank Keeps Discount Rate

San Francisco—The San Francisco Federal Reserve bank has decided to keep its discount rate at 3 per cent.

The San Francisco bank is the only one of 12 Federal Reserve banks throughout the nation to keep the 3 per cent rate. The others charge 2½ per cent.

H. N. Mangels, president of the San Francisco Federal Reserve bank, said directors of the bank had reviewed the situation and concluded no change was in order at this time.

He said they felt the failure of wholesale and consumer prices to decline and the possibility of a renewal of inflation should be given more weight than some signs of a slackening of business activity.

The discount rate is the interest charged banks that borrow from the Federal Reserve bank.

RETIRED GENERAL DIES

Southern Pine, N.C.—Retired Brig. Gen. Pearson Menoher, 66, former Army commander in Europe, Japan and Korea and mayor pro tem of this city, died suddenly at his home Thursday. Menoher, a classmate of President Eisenhower's at West Point in 1915, was chief of staff of the XV Corps and the Seventh Army in Europe, commanding general of occupation forces at Kobe, Japan, and deputy commander of the 24th Inf. Div. in Korea.

Boeing Sets B52 Tests Along Coast

Seattle—Boeing Airplane Company said low-level test flights by B-52 jet bombers along the Washington-Oregon coast from Queets, Wash., to North Bend, Ore., would start today and continue for several weeks.

The flights are designed to test adaptability of the B-52 to low-altitude operations. Tests will be made at an altitude of 500 feet and will be directly along the shoreline.

The company said the flights would be at speeds under 500 miles an hour and consequently no sonic waves would be generated.

Journal, Oregonian Sign Union Contract

Portland—A two-year contract calling for a basic wage increase of \$2 a week the first year and an additional \$4 the second year has been signed by the Oregon Journal and the Oregonian with the Portland Paper Handlers Union, Local 40.

The increase will bring day wages to \$83 a week and night work to \$85.50 for 1958.

Eugene—Eugene reported its first 1958 traffic fatality Thursday when Mrs. Aileen Monteith, 32, died from injuries suffered in a two-car collision.

Portland Postpones Transit Vote Plan

Portland—The Portland city council Thursday postponed action on a proposal to place a measure on the May 16 election ballot for eventual public ownership of mass transportation in Portland.

The proposal met with opposition Thursday. Donald Richardson, an attorney for the Street Carmen's Union, said the Union objected because the plan would make bus drivers part of the city civil service and a city transit commission would have no authority to bargain collectively with the drivers.

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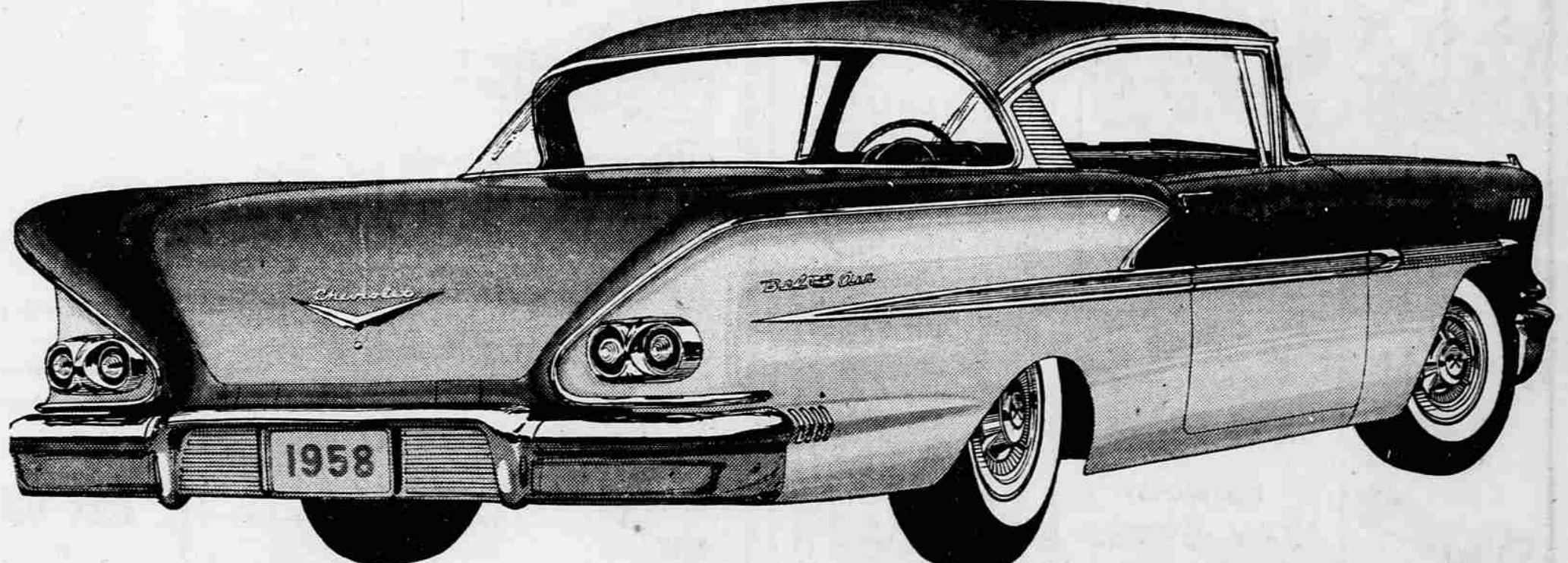
