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Gold Hill Dinner Observes Scout Week; Man Praised

Gold Hill — About sixty parents and Cub Scouts of Pack 43 attended a Blue and Gold dinner, Feb. 11 in the Hanby school cafeteria held in observance of National Boy Scout week, and to honor H. D. Force who has been associated in Gold Hill scouting promotion for several years. He resigned recently as cubmaster of Pack 43. Mr. Force's youngest son, Dave, a sixth grade student at Hanby, has completed cubbing and became a member of Boy Scout troop 43 last month.

Mr. Force was not aware that the occasion had been planned in his honor, and was surprised when prior to the dinner, Ogden Kellogg, chairman of the pack committee, presented him a tie clasp with scouting emblem, on behalf of the Cub Scouts and parents in recognition of his service to Pack 43 during the several years he had served as Cub Master.

Mr. Force expressed his appreciation for the tribute and stated that he first became a Boy Scout nearly 47 years ago in Jacksonville where he lived during his boyhood. He recalled that Rev. Mr. Johnston pastor of the Methodist church in Jacksonville at that time, was his first scout master.

After coming to Gold Hill, where he has spent most of his life, Mr. Force continued his activities in the scouting program here, and in addition to being recent cub master of Pack 43, has served many times as a committeeman. He was scout master of the Gold Hill Boy Scout troop about 20 years ago, while his eldest

son, Bill Force, was active in scouting. He is now with United Press in Portland. Also interested in scouting activities and doing her bit 18 years ago, is his wife Elinor, who served as a den mother for several years, while their second son, Jack, was a Cub Scout.

Mrs. Force remarked that Gold Hill youths are fortunate now to have the opportunity to further their interests in the scouting program by having available cubbing, scouting and the explorer program. It is through the combined efforts of many civic leaders here in the community that more interest has been given in recent years to maintaining the three divisions of scouting.

Mr. Force has been postmaster for Gold Hill since 1935. Besides his interest in scouting, he has been active in church and other civic affairs. An ardent sportsman, he has always been interested in the promotion of all athletics, in addition to hunting and fishing. He has been president of the Gold Hill Rod and Gun club for the past several years, and is an active member of the Gold Hill Parent-Teacher association, of which he is a past officer. The PTA is sponsoring group for the Cub Pack 43. Mr. Force has for many years been an active member of Gold Hill Odd Fellow Lodge 120 and holds an elective office at this time.

The Force's home is on Fourth avenue overlooking the Rogue river. Besides their three sons, they have one daughter, Miss Judy Force, an eighth grade pupil at Hanby school.

Following the tribute to Mr. Force, a program was held in conjunction with National Boy Scout week. The history of boy scouting was presented by Ogden Kellogg Jr., Boy Scouting was first started in England 58 years ago and had its beginning in America 48 years ago.

The evening's entertainment was provided by Dic Walsh, Medford artist and cartoonist, who donated his time for the occasion.
