

'Peace Dollar' Catching on Fast as Individuals Join in Cause of Peace

New York — Will the individual citizen grab at the chance to do something tangible about promoting the cause of peace?

A remarkable show of public desire is taking place in New York—As part of President Eisenhower's "People-to-People" program, a local bank decided on a trial-run drive to get people to carry a U.S. silver "peace dollar" as a symbol of national peace dedication.

It ordered 25,000 of the silver dollars bearing the word "peace" from the Treasury department through the Philadelphia mint. This special dollar can be had for \$1, and the idea is for travelers abroad and Americans at home to carry it as a pocket-piece and conversation-maker in the cause of peace.

The Chase Manhattan bank made them available in its main office and 99 branches the last three days of last week. By Friday, the bank had to order 50,000 more. The drive began with presentation of the coins to Blanche Thedon, opera singer and Byron Janis, pianist, who will help represent the U.S. at the Brussels World's Fair.

The dollar was minted only from 1921 to 1928 and from 1934 to 1935. There is a girl's head, a symbol of liberty, on the front. On the reverse side is an eagle on a mountain on which appears the word "peace". It is the only coin issued by any country in this century so inscribed.

Aside from the presentation to the two artists, the bank has told its customers

about the dollar only in pamphlets in the various branches. The idea of a coin as a symbol of international peace, friendship, and understanding came from Vernon Brown, curator of the Chase Manhattan money museum of 75,000 pieces in Rockefeller Center.

Shasta Daylight Delayed by Slide

San Francisco—Southern Pacific's southbound Shasta Daylight was to arrive eight hours late today at 7 a.m. because of a slide that cut the airlines under the train.

The slide took place Tuesday night at LaMoine, a railroad point 22 miles south of Dunsmuir, Calif. Aboard the train were 176 passengers.

The sharp-pointed rocks cut the airlines under the engine and the first five cars causing the train to come to an immediate stop. None of the cars was derailed and none of the passengers were hurt.

The passengers were put in the train's last four cars and taken back to Dunsmuir. Crewmen worked through the night clearing the tracks and moving them about a foot around the slide. Other workmen repaired the air lines.

The train was supposed to have arrived at 11:30 p.m. Tuesday.

NO ALTERNATIVE

Atlanta — Employees of the Atlanta Gas Light Co., are brewing their coffee on an electric hot plate to conserve gas.

President Eisenhower launched the People-to-People program in September, 1956, calling on private citizens to work out methods of promoting peace. Many committees of citizens have been formed under the general chairmanship of Charles E. (Electric Charley) Wilson, the business executive who bossed war production and defense mobilization in World War II and the Korean war.

Brown heads the Numismatic (money study) committee of the program. He says he doesn't know whether other banks across the country intend to follow suit. He did not expect the peace-dollar program to catch on as fast as it has.

Wilson said the quick sale of the coins "shows that a search for a road to peace is in everybody's mind—this is a hard-substance sign of peace—a visible evidence of a need. If it's just influence thinking, that's our major job in the world today—to keep peace uppermost in people's minds."

He said the People to People directors were considering spreading the gospel by a membership drive of some sort.

"Working for a road to peace is a new role for this fellow Wilson," he said. "Twice I've quit my business and gone to serve the mechanism for war. Maybe if we could get millions of citizens in a membership, striving together, it could help create a climate in which the world diplomats could get something done."
